Fruita Municipal Election 2020 (continued)

Last Monday was the final day for candidates to submit to run for Mayor or City Council. All signatures have been validated and we have one candidate for Mayor. Current Mayor Joel Kincaid is running unopposed for a second two-year term. Four candidates are running for three at-large, 4-year City Council seats, including alphabetically Matthew Breman, Dave Karisny for second term, Ken Kreie for a second term and Heather O'Brien. A candidate orientation is scheduled for Monday, February 10 at 7pm at the Fruita Civic Center. In addition, also on the ballot will be a question related to a proposed lodger's tax. 
