Re: WEEKLY INFORMATION UPDATE

Tuesday's City Council Workshop

Items on the agenda include: (1) an update on the sidewalk replacement program, (2) Planning & Development updates, (3) discussion on the code related to political signs, and (4) an update and discussion on various items related to lodging tax.

Fruita Police Department

I am proud of our officers and work they do to keep our community safe. Tuesday we celebrated the department's re-accreditation. As you are aware, and will see in the many news stories below, tragic events in our country at schools, threats within our school district and a recent incident late Thursday night in Fruita have definitely increased concerns with school security. Many of us have children in the school systems and this is close to home. It brings comfort that our department and with your support, the City of Fruita for many years has willingly funded school resource officers in addition to the district's security officers. Fruita has two dedicated School Resource Officers who are well known in both the schools and the community. It is also refreshing to know that they devote a considerable amount of time training on an ongoing basis.

The Police Department responded to an incident on Thursday night in the 900 block of 19 Rd in which a reportedly intoxicated and suicidal male was discharging a firearm within his residence. Due to the nature of the event, assistance was requested from the MCSO and GJPD SWAT teams. The male was not located in the residence; however the weapon was secured. Due to the proximity to the Fruita 8/9 and Fruita Monument High Schools, along with some misinformation circulating on social media, some residents expressed concerns for student safety. Police and School District personnel worked closely together. There was no connection to the schools, and no known threat to the schools. However, the Police and School District Security had an increased presence at the schools on Friday.

The Police Department also received an unrelated, vague, anonymous tip on Friday about "something" possibly occurring at a scheduled FMHS/GJHS basketball game Friday night. Given Thursday's events, along with a threat investigated by GJPD at GJHS, the decision was made to postpone the game until Saturday.

- Thanks to our crews who started work early (3am) earlier this week to clear primary roads from the snowfall.

- Current pending development projects in the review process include: the Fruita RV Resort, Soren Subdivision, Pinewood Subdivision, Imondi Wakezone, Iron Wheel, and Sunset Point Subdivision.
- Staff had a productive meeting last week with Mesa County to coordinate projects.

- We continue to work on the multi-year capital plan and staffing plan while identifying projects with future grant cycles. Much focus has been put into moving the Lagoon Redevelopment Concept Plan into reality.
- 438 participated in the annual Sweetheart Run Saturday!
- Flagging of about 2 miles of singletrack that will be off the new Kokopelli section of the Riverfront trail was completed Saturday.
- Sunday morning the Mayor, Dan and I were able to meet with a prospective company in town and GJEP to discuss opportunities in Fruita. This was a second visit.
- The new Accountant position is also posted.
- The Fruita Tourism Advisory Council met this week and set a planning session for April.

- We met with the Business Incubator this week on the Fruita-Works Co-working space progress—
