Re: WEEKLY INFORMATION UPDATE

Next City Council Meeting on a Monday, Not Tuesday: Monday, Jun 18 is a regular City Council meeting at 7 pm in the Civic Center that would normally be on Tuesday, but the Tuesday, June 19 was cancelled at the beginning of the year and rescheduled for Monday, June 18 to accommodate those attending the annual CML Conference. Chief Krouse and Mesa County Emergency Manager Andy Martsolf will present to Council on general emergency management procedures. We will also have on the agenda the first reading for rezoning the proposed Iron Wheel subdivision property and hear from our Auditors.

2018 Fruita July 3rd Fireworks Cancelled & New Event Created

After much discussion with staff and the Lower Valley Fire Department, it was determined that the July 3rd Fireworks show will be canceled due to extreme fire conditions. Many factors went into making this tough decision early, including the low moisture content in the ground and plant fuels, the ability to store the fireworks until next year without cost, and staff's ability to plan another event on July 3rd to celebrate our Nation's Birthday. Staff is looking into event alternatives (E.g. live music, food and games) and information will be provided early next week. A Press Release will be sent out to the local media sharing this same information.

CML 2018 Laws Enacted Affecting Local Governments Publication

The 2018 Laws Enacted Affecting Municipal Governments publication has been posted online and is available to anyone to download for free by clicking this link: http://www.cml.org/laws-18. This year, CML tracked 263 of the 729 bills and resolutions introduced. Of the 43 bills that CML supported, over 72 percent passed. Of the 29 bills that CML opposed, 100 percent were defeated or were amended such that the League dropped its opposition.

As always, the "Laws Enacted" publication focuses on selected acts that have a particular significance for municipal operations, services, and powers — it is not a comprehensive listing of all new legislation enacted into law affecting municipal government. Those attending the "2018 Legislative Update" session at the CML Annual Conference will hear about some of these bills directly from CML's advocacy team. - I enjoyed hosting and speaking to the Young Professionals Network of the Grand Valley Wednesday and sharing the Fruita story and participated in the Regional Economic Diversification Summit in Montrose today.
- Due to the large audiences going to the state park for the Riverfront Concert series, CDOT requested that the organizer find a way to eliminate the parking occurring on the side of Highway 340 in certain sections near the park entrance. Public Works and Police identified a way to cone and sign off those sections for the remaining two concerts to solve the issue.
- We began discussions with the Greater GJ Sports Commission this week regarding the progress of the Rim Rock Marathon and Mayor Kincaid and I will meet with them and the Colorado National Monument on the 25th.
- We will also be meeting with Family Health West on the 25th regarding future plans they have.
- We are working with Waste Management to evaluate better options for the Civic Center dumpsters and recycle bins.
- Last night was a big turnout for the two concerts—at the Civic Center and the State Park. The Civic Center concert followed the annual Bike Rodeo.
- The Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to provide an opportunity for interested developers to demonstrate their capability to develop a project located at the Lagoon property is due Friday 7/6/18.
- Sunset Point PUD Preliminary Plan was submitted on 6/1/2018 and is currently under review.
- Pinewood Estates subdivision is under construction.
- Adobe Falls subdivision will be starting construction in the coming weeks.
- Soren Estates subdivision' pre-construction meeting was held this week and they will be starting construction in the upcoming weeks.
- FHE's new building is currently under construction.
- Munchies paid their planning clearance and will be starting construction.
- Staff issued 4 new residential planning clearances this week.
- Current pending development projects in the review process include:

 - Peach VRBO CUP
 - Verizon Cell Tower FCC CUP

- Concrete on Phase II of the Kokopelli Trail starts this week. Bridge piles for the Reed Wash crossing are complete.
- Advertisement for the improvements to the Rim Rock Trail begins this Sunday with a bid opening on June 29.
- Engineering Intern Jim Hallgren started this week. He is a Civil Engineering student at Colorado School of Mines.
- Advertisement for the Cedar Way Infrastructure project will go out in early July with an anticipated bid opening in late July.
- Chis Dehmel tested a way we may be able to efficiently identify infrastructure deficiencies while in the field at their locations posting issues from a smart device to GIS maps.
- The 5-2-1 Drainage Authority is trying to schedule a board meeting for mid-July, which will most likely focus mainly on discussions about how to proceed with a valley-wide drainage solution now that a ruling has been made regarding the GVDD fees.
- The new Dam Safety Engineer responsible for the Fruita Reservoirs is scheduled to complete her annual inspection of the dam at Reservoir #2 next week.
- Crews have made considerable progress on the chip seal project this week with chips now on Pine Street and various residential streets. All chips should be down by end of June and we will work with the County to do fog coat and final striping prior to start of school in August.
- Staff is interviewing and reviewing consultants who submitted for the sewer rate study to make a selection as soon as possible.
- The Fruita Youth Initiative is hosting a community cookout on June 26th. (Flyer below)
