TID BITS:

Engineering

- Kokopelli Trail Phase II Reed Wash bridge abutments had the first stage poured this week. Trail continues to be installed along the south side of I-70 near the Loma Interchange.
- Bids were received last Friday for the Rim Rock Trail Improvements Projects and the low bidder was Frontier Pipeline of Grand Junction with a bid of \$150,288.86.
- Staff continues to work with 5-2-1 TAC on White Paper update and options for the 5-2-1 to move forward with finding a mechanism to fund valley-wide drainage improvements. The next board meeting for the 5-2-1 is on August 6 at 2:00 pm to discuss the options.

Planning & Development

Major Subdivisions

- Soren Estates is currently under construction.
- Pinewood Estates is currently under construction. Sewer and Water connections have been completed. Roads and sidewalks should be coming soon.
 - Sunset Pointe Subdivision has been submitted and is under review.
- Iron Wheel Major Subdivision will be before City Council August 7, 2018.
- Oak Creek Minor Subdivision (located at 18 ½ & K.4 Rd) is currently under review
- Garden Estates Major Subdivision (located at 910 Adams Drive, south of I-70 and west of 18 Road in Fruita, Colorado.)

Site Design Review

- Munchies Restaurant: Currently under construction.
- FHE (Frank Henry Equipment): Construction is underway.

- Dolan Storage Units: proposing about 30 new storage units along Highway 6 & 50. Staff is working with the applicant on their application.
- Brandon Commercial Phase III has been submitted for review

Special Projects & Code Amendments

- Oak Creek North Annexation (The project is located on the northwest corner of K 4/10 Road at the intersection with 18 ½ Road.)
- Oak Creek South Annexation (The project is located on the northwest corner of K 4/10 Road at the intersection with 18 ½ Road.)
- Fruita Collar Club Conditional Use Permit- dog boarding/daycare facility located at 110 E. McCune Ave

Public Works

- The I-70 lift station that pumps 90% of the City's wastewater experienced an electrical failure on Wednesday morning that resulted in the station being down for about 5 hours, which resulted in an overflow of the collection system. This resulted in a closure of the adjacent trail while containment and cleanup efforts were completed. Additional backup electrical systems are being evaluated to prevent this type of failure in the future.
- The pedestrian bridge at Little Salt Wash Park was repaired this week to eliminate some gaps in the wood decking caused by shifting of the timbers that had developed.
- The City received the 2018 bridge inspection reports this past week from the structural engineers hired by CDOT as part of the Off-System Bridge Inspection Program. No immediate concerns were identified, but these reports did identify some deficiencies and maintenance recommendations for the bridges that staff will incorporate into the capital improvement plan as part of the 2019 budgeting process.


