Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Tuesday's City Council meeting includes a 5-minute presentation from Fair Maps Colorado, the consent agenda and the public hearing for the proposed Iron Wheel Subdivision.

TID BITS:

- We submitted the grant application to the Department of Local Affairs for the two-year Best & Brightest program this week.
- We held a meeting in Fruita with our Economic Development partner agencies in the valley to coordinate efforts.
- Attended the Fruita Chamber Government Affairs committee meeting.
- Met with the Superintendent of the Colorado National Monument to regarding long-term plans and our master planning process during 2019-2020.
- We met with the realtor for much of the developable land in the Industrial Park to coordinate efforts, zoning and leads. She and the owners of the land are working to update the Vitality Film video on the park to include the new cable wake-board park and the FHE expansion.

Engineering

- Reed Wash Bridge was set Wednesday morning. Concrete decking and approach concrete to follow.
- Submittals are coming in on the Highway 6 Interceptor Sewer in anticipation of a mid-to-late August construction start.
- Adobe Falls has completed sewer infrastructure.
- Pinewood Estates is prepping for concrete placement.
- Meeting with applicant on Sunset Point to go over review comments.
- Rim Rock Trail Improvements project is underway. Contractor plans to complete the section between Arches Drive and Rim Rock Elementary School by the August 15 start of school. A detour through Vista Valley's Wolf Creek Court will be maintained for the section between Pine Street and Arches Drive once school begins.

Planning & Development

• We have issued permits for 69 new dwelling units through July this year. 2017 totaled 46. Full report is below.

- Pinewood Estates is currently under construction. Sewer and water connections have been completed. Roads and sidewalks should be coming soon.
- Iron Wheel Major Subdivision will be before City Council August 7, 2018.
- Oak Creek Minor Subdivision (located at 18 ½ & K.4 Rd) is currently under review.
- Garden Estates Major Subdivision (located at 910 Adams Drive, south of I-70 and west of 18 Road in Fruita, Colorado) is under review.

Site Design Review

- Munchies Restaurant: Currently under construction.
- FHE (Frank Henry Equipment): Currently under construction.
- Dolan Storage Units: proposing about 30 new storage units along Highway 6 & 50. Staff is working with the applicant on their application.
- Brandon Commercial Phase III has been submitted for review.







