General Updates

- Mayor Kincaid, Councilman Kreie and I attended the Chamber's President's Dinner Monday.
- I filmed an interview clip in the area's BLM recruitment video this week.
- We had a positive conference call with Gemini Adventures whose events in Fruita continue to grow and expand.
- We continue to progress on the Lagoon Redevelopment Plan.
- We met with consultants for the North Fruita Desert Master Plan as they comb through the nearly 1,000 survey responses and next steps of work on the project.

Engineering

- Curb, gutter and sidewalk is scheduled to be installed along the south and west side of Cedar Way this week with paving prior to Thanksgiving.
- Staff attended a meeting with CDOT for signal timing on CDOT facilities. The City of Fruita has signals at 4 locations that are operated by CDOT. They are located at Highway 340 and the westbound ramp, Highway 340 and Aspen Ave.,

and at the intersections of 18 and 19 Roads with Highway 6. CDOT is evaluating the timing of these signals and all others in the valley to optimize the timing and reduce delays. Implementation dates will be provided at a future date, but will likely occur in the middle of 2019.

Code Enforcement:

On October 29, 2018 through November 1, 2018 Dave Oliver (Code Enforcement Officer) attended the American Association of Code Enforcement Officers, National Conference, in Broomfield Colorado. Code Officers from around the country were meeting to decide changes in By Laws and elect new Officers. Classes were offered in the various roles we play in the community and the Cities we serve. Dave attended classes that addressed Squatters, Vacancies, Blight and Local Governments, Communication, Homemade Explosives and Human Trafficking. These classes were taught by experts, respected in their various fields. Dave also was able to talk to vendors that could be useful to the Fruita Planning and Development Department, specifically new software that could help with our growing community and keep track of our growing short-term rental businesses. Dave met code officers from all parts of the country and cities of all sizes.

Parks & Recreation

- FYI had a Key Leader meeting on Thursday this week and shared a draft of the Resource Assessment Report this is a report that identifies the various resources in the area for youth and further identifies programs and strategies that FYI should implement. It is still very much a draft and will be continually worked on over the next couple of months.
- The FYI Key Leaders also gave the head nod that City Council should consider creating a Youth Advisory Board. FYI needs to have youth involvement and this would be an excellent method of fulfilling that need. FYI members are further defining the roles and expectations of a YAB and will discuss with City Council soon.

LIVABILITY COMMISSION

The newly formed Fruita Livability Commission is the result of the City of Fruita being designated an Age-Friendly, Livable Community by AARP. This designation includes more than 300 towns, cities and counties nationwide. In fact, Colorado has been designated a Livable State along with only two others: New York and Massachusetts.

The mission of the Commission is to continually gather community input and make recommendations to the City Council pertaining to the eight domains of livability that support healthy aging and improve the quality of life, economic health and lifestyle of the Fruita community members. Consequently, the Commission will target improvements in eight domains meant to influence and improve the health and quality of life of those in our community. These eight domains of livability and what they represent include:

- 1. Transportation: Safe and affordable modes of private and public transportation
- **2. Housing:** Availability of home modification programs for aging in place as well as a range of affordable housing
- 3. Outdoor Spaces and Buildings: Availability of safe and accessible recreational facilities
- **4. Social Participation:** Access to leisure and cultural activities, including opportunities for all residents to socialize with their peers and with others outside their age groups
- **5. Respect & Social Inclusion:** Programs that promote ethnic and cultural diversity and well as multi-generational interaction and dialogue
- **6. Civic Participation and Employment:** Paid work and volunteer activities for all residents to engage in the formulation of policies relevant to their lives
- **7. Communication & Information:** Access to communications technology and other resources so residents can connect with their community, friends and family
- **8.** Community Support & Health Services: Access to health care facilities, clinics and professionals, and programs that promote health, wellness and active aging

At this time, the Commission is developing its membership by reaching out to members of our community to encourage their participation in this effort. Please consider joining us by attending the <u>next Livability Commission meeting on Thursday, November 15, 2018 at 4:00 pm in the Civic Center Council Room at 325 E. Aspen Ave., 2nd Floor. This will be an informational meeting so that you and others considering appointment to the Commission may learn more about our plans and have your questions answered.</u>
