- Maple Street Sewer design continues. Construction of the sewer and road improvements will be scheduled for June – August fitting the construction in when school is out of session.

Public Works

- Fruita had its first snow event of the season this past week, which provided a good test of the snow removal equipment with 6 separate breakdowns reported during the event. Fortunately, crews responded early enough that they were able to manage the event well and no significant safety issues resulted.
- Staff has finished their review of work order systems and will be moving forward with Dude Solutions, which seems to best meet the immediate work flow needs of the various divisions and has strong asset management tools that will assist in future planning.

Parks & Recreation

- The annual Arts and Craft Fair will be held this Saturday from 10 am 3 pm at the Fruita Community Center come down and find those stocking stuffers and other gifts. Later that evening, the Chamber's Parade of lights will be held with many floats, including one from the Fruita Parks and Recreation Department fyi...there's live entertainment on our float!!!
- December 14th 20th, the Fruita Health Club will be moving to a new location. In an effort to keep their patrons exercising through the Holiday season, they will be utilizing the Fruita Community Center during their shutdown. We are happy they reached out to us with this request and are happy we can help them out.
- Executive Director Jennifer Stoll has resigned from the Greater Grand Junction Sports Commission. She has been an extremely valuable asset for the Grand Valley, resurrecting the Rim Rock Marathon and attracting numerous other sporting events to our region. With Jennifer's resignation and the passage of 2A in Grand Junction, the Sports Commission is evaluating how the next several months and years will look. As you may know, the City of Fruita

has been an active participant in the Commission and its development. City Manager Mike Bennett will be meeting with the executive board and partner jurisdictions to discuss next steps of the GGJSC.

Administration

- With final adoption of the 2019 Budget, staff is working on preparing the final budget document with the goal of having it posted to the website and to the City Council and staff by the end of the year.
- Billie Nix will be attending the Grand Valley Leadership Academy in 2019.
- Margaret Sell and Deb Woods will be attending a webinar on the new liquor law legislation next week.

Municipal Court

- Mamie Alsup has joined the City of Fruita as the new Municipal Court Clerk. She is on board and has started training with Lisa Hamilton. Lisa will be retiring at the end of the year. Mamie has her work cut out for her following Lisa's excellent lead, but we are sure she is up to the task.
