Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The agenda includes a couple proclamations followed by a presentation from Pete Firmin, Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) on CPW fee increases. We have a large consent agenda, 5 public hearings and one administrative presentation.

Public-Private Partnership Agreement with Cores is Executed

The agreement is executed! Looking forward to next steps. First will be initiating the Phase One studies and quickly working on the next phases of a real estate agreement, design, marketing, grant application, etc.

Fruita Teen Vaping Prevention Event for Teens and Parents

See the attached flyer on a Vaping prevention presentation created to educate parents on vaping and the impacts it is having on our youth. The presentation will be held on Thursday, January 31st at 6:00 pm at Fruita Middle School. To remove the barriers of parent participation, dinner and child care for preschoolers and up will be provided. Parents are asked to register – the link can be found on the flyer. Vaping paraphernalia will be on hand so parents can see and hold and know what vaping products are and parents will learn how to talk to their youth about vaping. This is part of the Fruita Youth Initiative.

General Updates

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- November City sales tax revenues were up 6% over Nov. 2018; YTD thru Nov. revenues were up 13.4% thru the same period in 2018. If oil & gas related sales tax revenues were removed, the YTD would be about 4% up.
- All 5 Fruita school principals were eager, excited and are committed to recognizing student(s) and teacher/staff of the month at specific Council meetings in 2019 beginning with the Feb. 5th City Council meeting.

Honor the Past – Envision the Future FRUITA

- Fruita residents recycled 53 tons of cans, bottles, paper and cardboard in December. See full report below.
- Enjoyed speaking to and interacting with the FMHS AP Government class this morning.
- The Chamber Business After Hours we hosted last night in F-Works filled the house. Management Analyst Shannon Vassen conducted an interactive trivia game with prizes and the event was very well attended.
- Shannon has begun working on setting up a community engagement series with the City Manager where we will invite interested residents to discuss particular subjects via bike, walking, hiking, in local coffee shops, etc. The idea would be to post and promote a schedule of different times, settings and topics and to allow for different schedules and groups of people. The plan is to also have a Council member attend and likely one of the Department directors depending on schedules and topics.
- Shannon is also monitoring legislative matters through the Chamber's Government Affairs Committee, AGNC and CML.

Engineering

- A request for design/build services for new pumphouses at Reed Park, Prospector Park, Heritage Park, and the Civic Center went out this week with a due date of January 25, 2019.
- Cedar Way Infrastructure Improvements continue with sewer line construction work in the alley east of Cedar Way north of Aspen Ave.
- For safety reasons, temporary lighting at the new FCC east parking lot is installed and expectations are the permanent lighting will be installed in the next few weeks.

Public Works

- Maintenance crews were busy most of this week with snow removal operations. This has
 included using roughly 6,500 gallons of deicer and 200 tons of sand for icy conditions in the past
 month. Crews are still working to clean up snow piles and address icy areas, as well as
 addressing drainage issues as the snow melts (maybe next week?). Their efforts are much
 appreciated as staff has already expended over 65 manhours of overtime already this year on
 snow removal and have adjusted work schedules to meet the maintenance demands.
- Staff completed initial interviews for open Maintenance Worker positions and will be offering jobs to two applicants that we are excited to have join the team.
- The I-70 Lift Station now has two new holes in it...but don't worry, these holes were drilled into the structure as part of planned improvements that will improve maintenance access and allow staff to clean the lift stations in a safer manner.

Parks & Recreation

- Parks is one of the highest rated services in Fruita and to maintain that level of service, Parks staff is taking some time this winter to develop a POST Maintenance Plan that will provide staff with guidelines, standards and maintenance schedules to provide a system of parks, open space areas and trails that are consistently cared for in a quality manner. Staff just reviewed a draft outline and is now in the process of creating guidelines, schedules, etc.
- The elevator at the FCC was repaired this week and is now fully operational. We understand this caused some concern and inconvenience with some of our patrons and we thank them for their patience as we worked to have it repaired.
- The amp for sound system that plays music and provides a PA system for the entire FCC is also being repaired or better yet, replaced.

Finance/City Clerk

- Participated in a conference call and preliminary discussion and analysis of potential refinancing of FCC Sales and Use Tax bonds.

Police

- Corporal Schimek's promotion took effect January 6th and he is now filling the role of a patrol supervisor.
- Officer Hackley successfully completed field training and is on solo patrol.


