Tuesday's City Council Meeting

For the meeting next week, there are no proclamations/presentations or administrative updates. There are four items on the consent agenda. There will be two legislative hearings, one on Oak Creek and the other on an ordinance amending the Fruita Municipal Code. There are also two quasi-judicial hearings regarding Oak Creek on the agenda.

Fruita in Motion: Plan Like a Local

Working with our consultants, we conducted 8 stakeholder meetings with close to 100 community members to kick off the high-level discussions around updating the City's Comprehensive Plan. Stakeholders included all Fruita school principals, superintendent, asst. Superintendent and facilities; city council; planning commission; the advisory steering committee; livability commission; business owners; partner agencies; city staff; and the development community. It was energizing listening to the thoughtful feedback and genuine love and desire for maintaining the things the community loves. This officially kicks off the update process that will go throughout the rest of the year with many opportunities for the community to participate and many efforts reaching out to all groups within the community to gather feedback to create the Community's Comprehensive Plan.
