Tuesday's City Council Meeting and Workshop

We will begin our meeting by recognizing students and teachers from Fruita Middle School. Following that, there are two items on the consent agenda, one quasijudicial hearing, and one administrative update on the new Work Order System for Public Works. After the meeting our workshop will include two topics, an update on the refinancing of FCC Bonds and an overview on conflicts of interest.

Fruita Youth Initiative

Key Leaders of FYI met yesterday to receive a report from Ture Nycum on the successes of FYI thus far. Some of the recent successes include better communication and partnerships with local schools and Mesa County Public Health, the integration of Positive Youth Development in Parks and Recreation, the identification of community issues surrounding youth substance abuse, participation in community education sessions, and the creation of the Fruita Youth Action Council. The partnerships between the City, business community, local schools and school district, Mesa County Public Health and other community stakeholders is a huge success that we want to continue. While the Communities that Care process may be too tedious and focused on process more than outcomes, Mesa County Health Department has worked with the state to enable us to continue to build on our successes and focus on the outcomes identified without all the CTC steps. Over the next few months we will onboard the new CTC facilitator with the Health Department and prepare for the next steps of the process.

City Manager Engagement Series

This Tuesday we kicked off the first Explore Fruita with the City Manager. The purpose of this series is to motivate residents to explore and discover Fruita with me while discussing current topics or questions that they may have. A small group joined us at the Community Center and rode the new Kokopelli section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail to Loma and back while discussing items like growth, our comprehensive plan process, community engagement, etc. Provided below is the

General Updates

 Grand Valley Irrigation is on track to turn on the water into the canals April 1st. The City of Fruita will turn on city operated irrigation systems on April 8thand should have water running by April 10th. Private subdivisions will need to contact their HOA for a start date.



- Peter Booth officially resigned from the Museum of Western Colorado this week after serving as
 the Executive Director for the past six years. Mike Perry has agreed to step-in as the interim
 Director until a replacement has been found. Mike previously served as the Executive Director
 for the Museum of Western Colorado and we are fortunate to have him on board to keep
 operations running smoothly until a replacement is found.
- SE Group is working on fully creating the story board website for the Comprehensive Plan update.
- We received the final study for the Lagoon site and will be evaluating and working with our partners on next steps.
- Councilman Karisny, Sam, Ken and I attended the 521 Drainage Authority Board Workshop #2
 this week focused on discussing the recommendations from the consultant for forming one
 drainage group for the valley. The next workshop is scheduled in April.
- We continue to work on future staffing and capital needs internally in preparation for the budget process.
- We continue to work with the School District on the new elementary school and high school addition. They are planning to host an open house in Fruita to showcase plans for the new elementary school—date and time to be out as early as next week.
- Council members Buck and Karisny and I attended the Building a Better Colorado non-partisan
 focus group of leaders throughout the valley to focus on discussions on the Gallagher
 Amendment, TABOR Amendment and Amendment 23. It was an engaging interactive process.
 We will provide handouts Tuesday night.
- Mayor Pro Tem Buck and I attended the GJEP Board meeting this week and they are gearing up for the Western Colorado Economic Summit April 19th with keynote speaker Stephanie Copeland, Managing Partner of Fourpoints Funding and CEO of the Governance Project (former Executive Director of OEDIT). Mayor Kincaid and Mayor Pro Tem Buck are registered as well as members of staff and I.

Engineering

- With irrigation water coming next week, Dirtworks Construction was contracted to complete the piping of three (3) irrigation crossings associated with the Highway 6 Sewer Extension project. The work is complete and ready for irrigation water.
- Maple Street Sewer project has a mandatory pre-bid scheduled for Tuesday, April 2 at 1:30 pm.
 The bid opening is currently scheduled for Friday April 5 at 1:30 pm. Both meetings are to be held at the Civic Center.
- Paving on Cedar Way north of Aspen Ave. was completed this week which was the last of the work on the Cedar Way Infrastructure project.

Human Resources/Tourism

- FTAC met this week and received a report from George Gatseos regarding the Fat Tire Festival
 and 18 Hours of Fruita. The 18 Hours of Fruit race sold out in November. Both events will be in
 first weekend in May and last year's change to place the demo vendors at 18 Road Trails has
 increased attendance. More events and vendors selling products will be in the downtown area
 this year.
- One week from today we take over the Colorado Tourism Office Instagram account "Visit Colorado" for a week. Be sure to follow, like, and share the posts. They have 143,000 followers.

Parks & Recreation

- There were 25 applications received for the Fruita Youth Action Council! We are expecting to accept 15 of those applicants for the council.

Public Works

- Public Works is officially fully staffed with all seasonal help that started this week.
- Crews worked this week on cleaning/burning irrigation ditches and prepping for the start of the
 irrigation season. GVIC is scheduled to start filling the canals on April 1, and the City irrigation
 systems will start being turned on the week of April 8th.
- The blower project at the WWRF was completed in January of 2019 and, in the first full month of operation, we have been seeing a cost savings of roughly 15% in electricity as a result. This exceeded our projections and, if these trends continue, we are projecting a savings of up to \$25k for 2019. This project has also allowed us to better control our treatment process and has resulted in some of the best nutrient treatment results we have been able to achieve.
