This week, the City of Fruita was awarded a \$5,000 grant from AGNC to complete crosswalk improvements at the intersection of Grand Avenue and Fremont Street. The funding, along with money that we appropriated for this project, will be used to install flashing beacons at the crosswalk to alert oncoming drivers of pedestrian traffic and use. 

Avoided 127 Metric Tons of Greenhouse Gas Emissions


