- The Grand Valley Drainage District Board voting is scheduled for Tuesday, May 7th from 7am 7pm at 722 23 Road.
- The new Ruby-Horsethief camping map is now available for free download at Avenza Maps Store. It is georeferenced so people will know where they are don't miss their campsite. The new map is provided below.
- The Fruita in Motion (comprehensive plan update) Steering Committee meets tonight with our consultants and we will provide updates next week. The chalkboard collecting thoughts from the public continue to rotate at local businesses and also will be at the Community Center this weekend.
- The Fruita in Motion <u>website</u> is live and includes a story map and will continually be updated as to results of engagement sessions and providing upcoming dates for community engagement.
- The Planning and Development Department will be hosting a free workshop on Saturday, April 27th at 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the Community Center. The topics that will be discussed are the Community Plan and projects that we are working on. Also, there will be free coffee and snacks! The flyer is provided below.
- The Fruita Chamber of Commerce has released the schedule for the Fruita Farmer's Market. It will be held every Saturday morning from June 22, 2019 to September 21, 2019 at Fruita Civic Center park from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Fresh produce, handmade crafts from local artisans, and live music! <u>The flyer can be found here.</u>
- The Mesa County Federal Mineral Lease District has awarded \$1.5 million dollars from a special grant request for the Mesa County Jail Expansion Project. Because of this, the grant cycle for Spring and Fall of 2019 has been cancelled.
- Mayor Kincaid, Mayor Pro Tem Buck and I hosted the Navy Command Staff Wednesday to brainstorm ideas for activities they can participate in during Navy Week in July.
- Staff and I met with representatives of the builders, developers and realtors regarding the recent study and implementation of new transportation impact fees and will update Council on this at the workshop Tuesday.
- I participated in the D51 Foundation Board annual planning session this week and we continue to focus on funds for technology in the schools and professional development for teachers.
- Staff, Mayor Kincaid, Mayor Pro Tem Buck and I are scheduled to attend the GJEP Western Economic Summit Friday.


