Tuesday's City Council Workshop

It is going to be a busy workshop next week. We will begin with an update on the 521 Drainage Authority and the Grand Valley Drainage District Refunds, and then have a brief discussion on Boards and Commissions. After that, we will discuss two updates from Finance and Administration, and then we will review Planning and Development updates. The meeting will include with considering providing a Letter of Support to the Grand Junction Urban Trails Committee for the Made to Move Grant, and discussing signing on to a letter to fund the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Recap of Fruita in Motion Open House

We appreciate the 100 or more people who took time to join us for the open house last night. We had a great turnout with engaged residents who shared a lot of constructive feedback that will help shape this plan out. Soon, SE Group will summarize the results and we will share on www.fruitainmotion.org, and then they will work closely with the Steering Committee to draft policies and future land use maps for review with the public, Planning Commission and Council during a tour of community engagement in the fall.

- Coffee with the City Manager will be held next Tuesday, May 28, 2019 at 10:00 a.m., at Aspen Street Coffee. As always, this is an opportunity for the public to discuss anything Fruita while exploring our local businesses. We hope to see you there.
- We have updated our Fruita data with 2018 numbers. Last year, we saw an increase in visitor
 count for most our hiking trails, as well as more visitors at Kokopelli, the North Fruita Desert,

- We submitted a request to DOLA to extend the grant for the Kokopelli section of the Riverfront trail in order to construct the two connections to the Business Park, we were recently approved for, during the winter when water is not in the drainage canal that we will have to cross.
- Ken and I had a great time cooking and serving breakfast this morning to our Public Works staff to wrap up Public Works week—we have awesome employees!
- The Colorado West Land Trust shared that they thoroughly enjoyed their annual picnic at Snooks Bottom Sunday.
- The first, and hopefully annual, Pabor Day was a huge success! We appreciate the many
 - volunteers with our Downtown Advisory Board, Historic Preservation Board and many other residents and staff who made this happen. I had a chance to attend the history bike tour and scavenger hunt with my son and had a great time.
- The Business Incubator and Alpine Bank will be hosting the Business Showcase of 2019 on June 6th, 2019 from 4 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. It is free to attend and will highlight many of the businesses of the GJ Incubator. More information can be found here, and the flyer is provided below.



Administration/Finance

- Staff has been busy with review and analysis of garbage collection proposals and online credit card payment proposals.
- The State passed SB 19-262 which will result in an additional distribution of Highway User's Tax Funds in 2019 of approximately \$53,000. This is in addition to the additional \$33,000 distribution from SB 18-001. These are non-recurring funds that are allocated to streets and roads.

Engineering

- This week, the new Engineering Intern Kellisha Ostler started. Kellisha is a CU/CMU Civil Engineering Student and will be a great addition to the department. Welcome Kellisha!
- The re-striping of Aspen in front of City Market is likely to occur by CDOT after Memorial Day weekend and we have notified them about the festival occurring.
- We plan to re-advertise the Highway 6 interceptor project June 9th with a bid opening in early July.

Human Resources/Tourism

• At the FTAC meeting this week we discussed upcoming The Fruita Farmers Markets and the Fruita Fall Festival in depth. The Farmers Markets this year will be held every Saturday morning from 8:30 to 12:30 p.m. at the Civic Center. There will be live music, and already, almost 40 vendors have signed up to participate. The theme of the Fall Festival this year will be "Fall in Love with Fruita" and will be September 27-29, 2019. Also, Pabor Day had over 200 in attendance! Great work to everyone who organized and participated in the event.

Parks & Recreation

- Staff are gearing up for Mike the Headless Chicken Festival next Friday and Saturday. Last year we had over 18,000 in attendance so should be a big weekend.
- The new Verizon Wireless tower is installed on top of the Community Center hidden behind matching façade and the logo. It will be online in a month or so.
- We are participating in the Mesa County Trails Advisory committee and received over 70
 applications for the Trail Coordinator we will assist in the selection process.
- Staff met with the Greater Grand junction Sports Commission this week to evaluate and assess the ending of the Rim Rock Marathon this November.



Fruita named a Bronze-Level Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists

Fruita, Colorado --- Today, the League of American Bicyclists recognized Fruita, Colorado with a Bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community (BFC) award, joining 476 communities across the country in building better places for people to bike. With today's announcement of ten new and renewing BFCs, Fruita joins group of communities that are transforming the American landscape and leading on livability measurements important to community members.

"We applaud communities like Fruita for making bicycling a safe, comfortable, and convenient option for transportation and recreation," said Bill Nesper, Executive Director of the League of American Bicyclists. "We are inspired by leaders who see bicycling as a way to build more vibrant, healthy, sustainable and connected communities and be a part of the solution to many complex public health and safety challenges faced at both the community and national levels."

The League of American Bicyclists' Bicycle Friendly America program sets the standard for how communities evaluate their quality of life, sustainability, and accessibility, while allowing them to benchmark progress toward making biking better. With this latest round of new and renewing awardees, there are currently 476 Bicycle Friendly Communities in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. The Bronze-level BFC award recognizes Fruita's commitment to improving conditions for bicycling through investments in bike infrastructure, education programs, and promoting and encouraging bicycling through events and pro-bicycling policies.

The City of Fruita also just completed the 4.5-mile Kokopelli section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail. This portion of the trail was completed with single-track sidewalk off shoots and connects the whole community to public lands, specifically, the Kokopelli Trail System. Cyclists can now ride all the way from Palisade to Moab via the Riverfront Trail and the Kokopelli Trail.

More than 800 communities have applied for recognition by the Bicycle Friendly Community program, which provides a roadmap to making biking better for communities of all shapes and sizes. The rigorous application process is an educational tool in itself, and includes an opportunity for local bicyclists to provide input on their experiences and perceptions of bicycling in their community.

The five levels of the BFC award – diamond, platinum, gold, silver and bronze, plus an honorable mention category and a no designation level – provide a clear incentive for communities to continuously improve. Awarded communities must renew their status every four years to ensure that they not only maintain existing efforts, but also keep up with changing technology, national safety standards, and community-driven best practices.
