Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting will begin with five proclamations as the City celebrates Teacher Appreciation Week, Police Week, Grand Valley Bike Month and Bike to Work Day, and Colorado Public Lands Day. We will also honor an outstanding teacher and student from Fruita 8/9. There are five items on the consent agenda, two legislative hearings, and no quasi-judicial reviews. The meeting will conclude with a presentation on the North Fruita Desert Master Plan.

CDOT Maintenance on Aspen Avenue and Highway 340 Next Week

On Sunday May 12th, CDOT will be out in Fruita for restriping the Highway 340 roundabouts and other highway areas. They will also be reconfiguring the striping on Aspen Avenue along the frontage of City Market (Highway 340 to Plum St.) There will no longer be a free right off Highway 340. Northbound traffic turning right onto Aspen will be required to yield to eastbound traffic into a single lane. The work will be performed at night as to not disrupt daytime traffic.

Bike to Work Day

Next Wednesday, May 8th, is Bike to Work and School Day. Our community bicycle tour will be starting at Civic Center Park at 6:30 a.m., and we will ride through to the State Park to Heritage Park led by Mayor Kincaid—bring your families along and join us. There will be a free community breakfast at Civic Center Park and Heritage Park from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. The breakfasts are sponsored by Colorado Canyons Hospital and Med Center, and the food will be provided by Tacorado and Bestslope Coffee. General Updates

- It is going to be a busy weekend in Downtown Fruita. The Fruita Fat Tire Festival, Girls on the Run, and 18 Hours of Fruita are all this weekend. For the Fat Tire Festival, Aspen Street will be closed between Circle Park and Peach Street. Mulberry Street will also be closed between Pabor Avenue and Aspen Avenue. Temporary closures and delay in traffic for the short Girls on the Run event will also occur. Each event attracts around 2,000 attendees each.

- We hosted our ED Partners (GJEP, BIC, Workforce Center and Fruita Chamber yesterday to coordinate development efforts.
- Dan and I participated in an interview with the Sentinel regarding the Fruita community, growth and the Fruita In Motion comprehensive plan for a future story in the next couple weeks.
- I will be spending some time Friday engaging and welcoming the companies in town for the Fruita Fat Tire Festival.
- Provided below is the monthly Planning and Development report from April of 2019.
- For our next City Manager engagement event, I will be hosting a short hike to the top of Opal Hill next Thursday, May 9th at 10:00 a.m. As always, the hike will be casual and there will be plenty of time to take questions and discuss Fruita. If you want to join, we will meet at Snooks Bottom at 10:00 a.m.

Administration/Finance

- Completed Management's Discussion and Analysis for inclusion in the financial statements.
- Submitted or in the process of submitting a number of quarterly grant reimbursement requests and reports that include the Lagoon Project, Community Plan Update, SH 6 Sewer Extension, Best and Brightest Intern program, and Kokopelli Trail.

- Submitted the annual financial reports for State Highway User’s Tax Fund (HUTF) and Conservation Trust (lottery) funds.
- Began work on credit rating presentation to S & P for issuance of bonds.

Engineering

- In mid to late October, a scour mitigation project will be under construction for both the Big Salt Wash and Little Salt Wash crossings of Interstate 70. Work will continue until about April 1, 2020. Construction access will be from I-70. However, there will be trail closures of the Lower Little Salt Wash Trail during construction. A detour route will take pedestrians and cyclists over Highway 340. There is no anticipated closure of the Kokopelli Section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail.
- Maple Street Sewer Replacement Project will commence after school is out of session (likely first full week of June). Sewer lines will be replaced in Maple St. from Pabor Ave. to Ottley Ave. Additional work on the project includes an overlay of asphalt on Maple St. from Pabor Ave. to Ottley Ave. and on Ottley Ave. from Maple St. to N. Orchard St. Construction is expected to continue into early August.

Human Resources/Tourism

- Odette hosted our first Supervisor Training of 2019 this week, and we covered updates from each Supervisor and Department, reviewed goals, values and priority projects for the year, hosted a speaker from Colorado Christian University, discussed joining Alliance for Innovation, and had a brief training on meeting facilitation and time management delivered by Management Analyst Shannon Vassen.

Parks & Recreation

- The Fruita Youth Action Council started off action-oriented. 10 youth (6th – 11th graders in 2019/20 school year) spent 2 days and a night floating the Ruby-Horse Thief Section of the Colorado River. Lead by staff from the Colorado Canyons Association (who were unbelievably amazing guides), staff from Fruita Parks and Recreation and our very own Councilor Leonhart, these river travelers discussed some of the issue facing Fruita Youth and discussed action steps on how to address them. They also discussed how to be leaders in the community and generally bonded as a group. Of course, nothing can create bonds like being the wilderness and on the river experiencing hurricane force winds and rain – we always knew there was a thing as ‘Fruita Tough’ but now we really know what it is. In short it was an amazing experience for all who



attended and a great way to kick-start of the Youth Action Council. BTW – we have some amazing youth in Fruita who really want to make a difference for their community.

- This week the Colorado River had a rain surge of close to 20,000 CFS. With this surge, the Colorado River topped the Kokopelli Section of the CRT where Reed Wash underpasses I-70. We



temporarily closed the trail while it was under water but have now re-opened it. Parks staff will continue to monitor river flows and the trail for the coming run-off season and close the trail when needed.

- The 9News Health Fair sponsored by Family Health West and hosted at the Fruita Community Center, while down in overall attendees from 2018, was the second most attended health fair in the state of Colorado. There were 748 attendees at the 2019 Health Fair. Thanks to Family Health West for coordinating and providing this event for the Grand Valley residents.

- The outdoor pool is getting ready to host school swims and then officially opens May 25th the summer crowds. It will be open longer this year past Labor Day due to the closure of the indoor pool for a two-week period for the re-plastering project prior to maintenance week.

- Mike the Headless Chicken Festival this year will not have a car show. Unfortunately, the group that typically holds this part of the event will no longer be participating. While we are working with groups who may pick it up in the future, it is not likely to occur this year.
- Athletic programs continue to grow, K-1 soccer has more participants than ever at 80.




