On Monday, we were excited to hear Senator Gardner announce that the Bureau of Land Management will be relocating its headquarters to Grand Junction. Senator Gardner stated that "Today is a historic day for our nation's public lands, western states, and the people of Colorado. Relocating the BLM to the Western Slope of Colorado will bring the bureau's decision makers closer to the people they serve and the public lands they manage". #### **General Updates**

- On Wednesday morning, Mayor Pro Tem Buck and I attended the GJEP Board of Directors meeting. We received updates on economic developments, including the BLM relocation, and worked on preparing the upcoming planning retreat.
- This week, I also attended the Greater Grand Junction Sports Commission Strategic Planning Meeting. The bulk of the discussion at this meeting was focused on the Executive Director's work plan for the upcoming year.
- Our marketing company, Slate Communications, will be hosting a Business Toolbox for local businesses entitled: "Growing Your Digital Presence and Attracting Visitors" next Tuesday at FWorks. The session is free to attend, and Slate will be discussing how to use Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Yelp, Trip Advisor, Google Business, and more. It is from 8:30 to 9:30 on July 23, 2019. - The Chamber is looking for volunteers for the 2019 Fruita Fall Festival. If you are interested in volunteering, you can email the Chamber <u>here</u>.
- On July 24<sup>th</sup>, the School District will be hosting a "Stuff the Bus" fundraiser and BBQ at the Academy Mortgage Locations in Grand Junction from 11:00 to 2:00 p.m. The fundraiser is for school supplies for children in need. - As of last Thursday, the entire Kokopelli Section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail is officially open, even at Reed Wash. While the trail is open and free of water, there is still a High-Water Danger Warning in place, and the National Weather Service is warning that water will approach sections of I-70 near Fruita, and considerable agricultural flooding is likely. - The Livability Commission met on Thursday to discuss updates and potential future projects for the group. It was a great discussion, and we have a lot of ideas moving forward.
- Thursday, the Fruita in Motion Steering Committee had a productive and in-depth discussion with the consultants regarding economic development. The next meeting will focus on parks, trails and open space in August.
- Also, Thursday Ken, Councilman Karisny, and I attended the 5-2-1 Drainage Authority Board meeting and workshop discussing next steps following the pending drainage study. It is likely that a report to each of the City Councils will be happening in August or September.
- The City has joined the Alliance for Innovation. I was heavily involved with this local government association during my career prior to Fruita. We were invited to participate in their pilot program that focuses beyond the resources they provide for all departments, to focus on a journey of innovation and continuous improvement. We are currently undertaking an innovation assessment and soon recruiting employees to form an innovation team.
- Staff are also working on further improving and developing performance measures that track specific efforts to improve our most important items we track. This is part of the budget process for 2020.
- This week we met with our DOLA representative to discuss current grants and projects we are considering requesting grants for in the future.
- Next Wednesday, on Wednesday July 24 at 10 a.m., you are invited to attend the Palisade Plunge Trail Groundbreaking at: Palisade Rim Trail parking, SH 6 & North River Road.

Unfortunately, our leadership team and I have a very important meeting we cannot reschedule during this time.

#### Administration/Finance

- Staff is working on development of 2020 Budget. An overview of the 2020 Budget process will be presented to the City Council at the July 30 special workshop. The Council will review and provide input and feedback on budget policies, significant operational changes anticipated in the 2020 budget and capital project needs.
- Online payment processing is on track and scheduled to go live on August 1.

#### Engineering

- Sewer installation on Maple Street is wrapping up. Concrete work has begun with asphalt paving coming soon.
- Mesa County will be holding an open house meeting for the design phase of a couple of bridges in the area. One bridge (culvert) is located at 18 ½ Road at the Little Salt Wash crossing (just south of L Road) and the other is located at 16 Road at Grand Valley Irrigation canal. The meeting is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, August 14<sup>th</sup> from 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm at the Fruita Community Center.

#### Human Resources/Tourism

• Just a quick reminder, the FTAC meeting originally scheduled for next Thursday, July 25, has been cancelled. Instead of the regular meeting, FTAC will be having a retreat with Slate Communications on Monday to discuss marketing efforts, goals setting, and measurement tools. The meeting will be at City shops from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

#### **Parks and Recreation**

- Tom attended a GOCO meeting in Montrose this week learning about grants in partnerships with schools.
- New treadmills have been installed at the Community Center. The new cardio theater is being installed today!
- The Arts & Culture Board have successfully highlighted local artists at the City's Farmer's Market booth this year. The Downtown Board will man the booth on July 27.

#### **Public Works**

- Additional inspections of the Old Fruita Bridge were completed this week. It does not appear
  - that the fire compromised the structural
    integrity of any of the steel members.
    However, it is recommended that some of
    the damaged decking be removed for safety
    reasons and staff is working with a
    contractor to develop a plan and identify
    costs to do this safely, as well as in
    communication with the State Historical
    Society regarding financial assistance we
    may be able to apply for.
- The sewer collections staff will be conducting a pilot study this coming week that will use three different treatment methods to evaluate how well they mitigate H<sub>2</sub>S levels in the system. This is part of the planned H<sub>2</sub>S project for 2019 on the gravity sewer main west of 16 Road and is working toward selecting a final treatment system.
- Fruita Reservoir #2 is now completely empty. Crews were on the mountain fixing two water line breaks, one on the piepline from Enoch and one crossing the road about a mile downstream from Reservoir #2.
- The east doors at the Civic Center are now fully operational with electronic access hardware installed by FWorks. This system provides better access control to the building after hours for City, FWorks, and other users.
- Last week staff replaced the awnings on the City Shop building reusing materials to save money and provide a longer lasting solution. Always impressed with the innovation of our staff.
