 with representatives from the Colorado Parks and Wildlife about potential partnerships for
 recreational opportunities. It was a very productive meeting, and the City will continue to
 explore this partnership as well as others to seek a sustainable solution for the mountain
 resources.
- We had a great turnout for Beer or Rootbeer with the City Manager at Copper Club on Wednesday night. We discussed a variety of issues, from downtown development to improving our roundabouts, and much more. It was great to hear from everyone and discuss ideas for Fruita. Our next City Manager engagement meeting will be Coffee at the Fruita Starbucks on September 5, 2019 at 7:30 a.m., we hope to see you there.
- The Colorado Municipal League has announced the Municipalities District meetings for this fall.
 These meetings are an opportunity to speak with other municipalities in our area and share
 information and ideas. Our district's meeting will take place on September 11, 2019 from 4:00

- Staff and I met with our regional representatives from the Department of Local Affairs this week
 and discussed our current grant projects and pending grant applications. We should know the
 status of our supplemental funding request for the Highway 6 project and the Land Use Code
 update within a few weeks.
- Thank you to everyone that participated in the Comprehensive Plan's Community Character
 Workshop on Thursday night. The group discussed the future of Downtown Fruita, the Highway
 6 & 50 corridor, and potential areas of transition in Fruita. All the information collected from


