Tuesday's City Council Meeting on September 17, 2019 at 7:00 p.m.

The meeting on Tuesday will begin with a Proclamation on Red Friday Hero Day and two presentations, one from the Fruita Youth Advisory Council and the other from the Arts and Culture Board. There are six items on the consent agenda, and two legislative hearings. The meeting will conclude with four quasi-judicial hearings, one on the recapture fees of Highway 6 sewer line and three items on the Iron Wheel Development (continued form August 6, 2019 meeting).

Fruita in Motion: Plan Like a Local Update

The Fruita in Motion Steering Committee had an engaged and productive discussion regarding the draft land use map, infrastructure needs, and transportation needs. We are gearing up for the Fruita in Motion Draft Plan Party Oct. 3 from 4-7:30 pm in Civic Center Park. The Steering Committee will not meet in October and November as Dan and I will be meeting with many community groups to continue getting feedback on the draft plan. Most of the Fruita schools have agreed to host a night with parents, students, and teachers as well as promote the Oct. 3rd event. We will also be meeting with many community organizations, HOAs, and partner agencies.

Thursday night, Mayor Kincaid and I attended the ribbon cutting and grand opening of the expansion of the Colorado Canyons Hospital and Medical Center and Mayor Kincaid read the proclamation declaring Sept. 12, 2019, Family Health West Day. Boards and Commissions Vacancies

The City of Fruita is accepting applications to fill vacancies on the Livability Commission and the Historic Preservation Board. General Updates

- City sales tax, for the month of July, are up 16.85% from last year, and for the year are up 15.88% overall. After a slow start to the year, lodging tax was up 47.68% in July compared to last year, and is now up 4.95% for the year.

- The Associated Governments of Northwest Colorado Economic Development Summit this year
 will be held on September 27, 2019 in Rifle. A few of the topics include current economic
 trends, trends in various energy industries, location neutral jobs, and more. To view the full

- Councilman Karisny and Shannon attended the Colorado Municipal League district meeting in Parachute on Wednesday night. The agenda for the meeting included recapping the legislative session, discussing the state's ballot measures this year, what to expect from the upcoming legislative session, and heading updates from other municipalities. - Jennifer Seal and I met with a representative of CareerWise this week and will be sharing information with local businesses on how to have high school apprentices, as well as exploring any synergy of the program with the Fruita Youth Initiative.
- Planning & Development Director Dan Caris, Public Works Director Ken Haley, and Councilman
 Dave Karisny are on the steering committee for the Grand Valley Transit Regional Transportation
 Plan. Ken and City Engineer Sam Atkins attended the open house at the library for this plan this
 week too.
- Exciting news for FWorks, this week, there were four new dedicated desks installed upstairs.
 Each of the news desks are reserved, and the Business Incubator already has a waitlist for new desks once they become available. There is still open seating memberships available at any time. Below is a picture of three of the new desks.



Administration/Finance

Work continues on the 2020 budget. Per the City Charter we will present the first draft of a
balanced budget at the Sept. 24 Council Workshop. Following the workshop, we will be sharing
budget narratives and presenting more detailed information on each area, fund and department
during the Council meetings in October- December.

• Service to the Encanto Irrigation Line was restored on Wednesday as planned.

Human Resources

- The City of Fruita is accepting applications for a Wastewater Operator at our Wastewater Treatment Facility. Applications are due by September 30, 2019, and the job announcement/description can be found here.
- We had 14 blood donors at the St. Mary's Blood Drive at the Civic Center on September 10th! Next blood drive at the Civic Center will be on November 12, 2019.

Parks and Recreation

- The Youth Activities Supervisor position has been filled. We are excited to share that Brittany Kline will be starting in her new role on September 23rd. She is coming from the Department of Human Services where she worked in Child Services.
- The Trails Maintenance Crew is off and running. The crew of three spent the week with COPMOBA, BLM and Western Colorado Conservation Corp staff getting trained on trail maintenance. The crew will start their initial work at 18 Road and then move to the Kokopelli Trail System. They are scheduled to work on trails for the next 6 to 8 weeks.
- The Fruita Youth Action Council had a productive meeting this past Tuesday. They selected a FYAC logo (see below), further defined the By-laws, provided feedback on the playground at the

new elementary school, and learned about the State-wide Rise Above program.



- One last reminder, the Fruita Community Center will be closed next week, beginning Monday, for the annual maintenance week. The FCC will reopen on Monday, September 23, 2019.
- There are two great events at the FCC this weekend! The Bike Rodeo is on Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m., and all kids that are new to riding are welcome. Come down and learn how to ride safely, and you can also register and inspect your bike. The first 100 kids will receive a free helmet. If your kid does not have a bike, we will also have some onsite so that everyone can participate.
- Dog Daze is this Sunday night from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Bring your pup down to the Community Center for a night of swimming, playing, and socializing. Entry to the event is any donation, and all proceeds go to the Roice Hurst Humane Society.


