Monday and Tuesday's City Council Workshops

Monday night, we will be hosting a joint workshop with the School District 51 Board of Education. The agenda for this meeting is to discuss the new elementary school, infrastructure around the school, the process for determining the boundary of the school, and we will provide updates on the education projects that we are working on. The focus of Tuesday's workshop will be an overview of the draft 2020 budget, and we will end with a brief update on the Highway 6 Sewer Extension Project.

Groundbreaking of New Fruita Elementary School


On Wednesday afternoon, the School District 51 Board of Education and leadership invited Mayor Kincaid, City Councilors Ewing, Kreie, and Leonhart, and me to participate in the groundbreaking of the new school in Fruita, Monument Ridge Elementary. Construction is well underway, and the new school will be a 62,000 square foot, two-story building serving pre-school through fifth grade. Monument Ridge is going to be a great addition to our community, and we are excited to be working with the School District on this project. Boards and Commissions Vacancies (continued)

The City of Fruita is accepting applications to fill vacancies on the Livability Commission, the Historic Preservation Board, and the Downtown Advisory Board. The mission of the Livability Commission (click each board name for more information) is to gather community input and make recommendations to the City Council regarding the eight domains of livability that support healthy aging and improve the quality of life, economic health, and lifestyle of the Fruita community members. The purpose of the Historic Preservation Board is to protect and preserve the City's architectural, historic, and cultural heritage and provides educational opportunities to increase appreciation of Fruita's unique heritage. The Downtown Advisory Board advices the City Council and serves as a coordinating body for the advancement of downtown Fruita. General Updates

- This week, the City of Fruita was awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Department of Local Affairs
 for the Land Use Code and Design Standards update. We will be releasing for a Request for
 Proposals for the consultant today for the project and will keep you updated as we move
 forward.
- Walk and Roll to School Day will be held on Wednesday, October 2nd, 2019. The Mesa County
 Health Department and Urban Trails Committee members will meet up with participating
 schools to ensure that students are safe will traveling to school. Both Shelledy and Rimrock are

- Last week, we posted a story on the Pollock Fire in the Black Ridge Canyon Wilderness. This
 week, the Bureau of Land Management issued a press release stating that lighting caused the
 fire. There are no closures or evacuations at this time, but there may be some smoke visible
 from the interstate, the McInnis National Conservation Area, and the Kokopelli Trail System.

Administration/Finance

• In preparation of Tuesday's workshop, Finance staff has been working all week on the budget and finalizing the draft. I am not quite sure if Margaret has even left her office.

Engineering

- The Sidewalk Replacement Project was awarded to Adcock Concrete, Inc. In the amount of \$18,315.
- Trip Hazard Mitigation Project which involves grinding concrete sidewalk in areas that have shifted creating a tripping hazard was awarded to Precision Concrete in the amount of \$9,890.

Human Resources

- The City of Fruita is accepting applications for a Wastewater Operator at our Wastewater Treatment Facility. Applications are due by September 30, 2019, and the job announcement/description can be found here.
- The City is also accepting applications for a Building Maintenance Worker I. More information can be found here, and applications are due Friday, September 27, 2019.

• Tourism and Special Event Funding Applications are due this afternoon by close of business! If you need an application, you can visit this Link. The Fruita Tourism Advisory Council will review these applications next week and recommend which events to fund to the Council in October.

Parks and Recreation

- The Fruita Community Center has been closed this week for its annual maintenance week. Much has been accomplished and project updates and photos have been posted on the Fruita Parks and Recreation Facebook Page.
- As part of maintenance week this year, staff had hoped to have the indoor pool re-plastered.
 However, due to the contractor schedule and an unfortunate death in their management, the
 plaster project is being moved to August 2020. In the meantime, staff patched 37 new areas in
 the pool, making 111 patches since the issue was first discovered in 2018. Staff believes the
 patches will last until the project can be completed next August.
- Recreation Staff is excited to welcome Brittany Kline, who will start on Monday as our new Youth Activities Coordinator
- Youth Athletics is in full swing. Soccer and Flag Football games have started at Little Salt Wash
 Park this month. Due to the increasing participation in programs, Reed Park has set of goals so
 that soccer teams can get a quality practice at that site. The Flag Football field has been moved
 and they are now playing games in baseball field #1 at LSW. In addition, Fruita Little League Fall
 Ball has been utilizing LSW.
- Last push with Special Events in 2019:
 - O Anna Banana High School Invitational is today. Parks staff have been preparing and cleaning up Snooks Bottom in anticipation of 17 high school teams racing there. Due to the heavy rains and hail two ago, Parks received assistance from Public Works and filled in some areas that had eroded and were safety concerns. The road and parking lot were also graded, fencing was mended and weeds / trail edges where mowed.
 - O Fruita Fall Festival is the following week and preparation has already started. Namely Parks staff have been working in earnest to get the Disc Golf Course ready for a Fall Festival tournament. A 4-person crew has been at the disc golf course this week and labor alone has been over \$3,000 to prepare the course. The entire site for the most part has been mowed and weeds have been removed. The Grand Valley Disc Golf Club will host a volunteer day tomorrow, and fine tune and get to the smaller stuff that Parks crew may have missed or couldn't get to.
 - Other special event coordination has been focused on the last Food Truck Friday in October, the Tour of the Moon, and the Rim Rock Marathon in early November.

Lightning caused Pollock Fire in the Black Ridge Canyons Wilderness

Grand Junction, Colo. – Fire officials with the Upper Colorado River Interagency Fire and Aviation Management Unit are assessing the current Pollock Fire located in McInnis Canyon National Conservation Area in Mesa County.

The Pollock Fire was started by lightning on September 12, 2019. It is about a ¼ acre in size burning in the Black Ridge Canyons Wilderness Area south of I-70 near Loma and Fruita, CO. The fire personnel are on the ground assessing possible suppression tactics. Firefighter and public safety is the primary objective.

There are no evacuations or closures at this time. No structures or resources are currently threatened. Smoke may be visible from the I-70 corridor, Kokopelli Trail loops, Devils Canyon Trails, Pollock Canyon Trails and the Rattlesnake Arches Trail. Recreational users of the trail systems in Rattlesnake Canyon, Pollock Canyon and Devils Canyon are urged to use caution in the area. Smoke could affect the air quality in the area. Please do not call 911 to report Pollock Fire behavior. Please call 911 for emergencies only.

The Upper Colorado River Interagency Fire and Aviation Management Unit includes Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service firefighting resources that cover 5.8 million acres along the Interstate 70, Colorado River and Roaring Fork River corridors from the Continental Divide to the Utah state line. The UCR includes the White River National Forest and the BLM's Colorado River Valley and Grand Junction field offices. The UCR cooperates with other federal and state agencies, local communities, and fire departments on a wide range of activities including fuels treatments, fire prevention, and suppression.
