#### Tuesday's City Council Meeting on October 1, 2019 at 7:00 p.m.

The meeting next Tuesday will begin with two presentations, the first from Colorado House of Representatives District 54 Representative Matt Soper, and the other from the Downtown Advisory Board about a potential community bonfire next month. There are six items on the consent agenda and two quasi-judicial hearings scheduled. After that, there will be two budget presentations on the Marketing and Promotion Fund (and our marketing strategies by Slate Communications) for next year and the Planning and Development Department. Consideration to support a Colorado Parks & Wildlife grant matched by the Fruita Trail Initiative Partnership is also on the agenda.

#### October 3<sup>rd</sup> Community Draft Plan Party

Following the event, Planning & Development Director and I will begin a roadshow throughout the community to gather additional feedback before the steering committee and consultants make changes and bring through the public process of Planning Commission and City Council in 2020. 

Staff will present to the Fruita Chamber Government Affairs on Sept. 30, Dan and I will also present to the Chamber Board on Oct. This means it will go to Planning Commission on November 12<sup>th</sup> and City Council on December 17<sup>th</sup>.

- We had a good turnout for our hike up Dino Hill on Tuesday afternoon. The conversations were great, and we discussed short-term rentals, weed mitigation throughout the City, and the Comprehensive Plan.

- We attended the Library Director open house Tuesday and Councilwoman Leonhart shared updates with the Fruita Youth Initiative and invited their participation.
- I hosted about 90 first graders from Rim Rock Elementary Thursday. They also visited with Lower Valley Fired Department and Officer Bob. While at the Civic Center they learned about City services and participated in our Fruita in Motion comprehensive plan process by identifying their favorite places in Fruita and what they love about Fruita.







#### Administration/Finance

• Work continues on the 2020 Budget. The first two budget presentations are scheduled for next week with many to follow.

#### **Human Resources**

• The Fruita Tourism Advisory Council met on Thursday and formally made recommendations for which special events to fund next year. These recommendations will be brought to the City Council next Tuesday for discussion. This year, we received seven special event funding applications, with a new one application coming from the Fruita Fourth Friday.

#### Parks and Recreation

- Brittany Kline, our new Youth Activities Coordinator started this past Monday and has hit ground running. She has been actively learning about childcare licensing (for DinoMites Camps) as well as learning our internal processes such as utilizing RecTrac (Recreation Management Software System).
- Parks staff has had another busy week this time preparing for activities and events surrounding the Fruita Fall Festival. Among many other things the downtown has been cleaned up, electrical has been powered up and disc golf course has been mowed.
- The 'Start the Conversation' session on QPR (Question, Persuade and Refer suicide prevention)
  was cancelled this past Wednesday due to the instructor having an illness in the family. We are
  working on rescheduling the session to another date and will get the word out on that as soon
  as it is scheduled.
- The Fishing is Fun Day is scheduled for next Saturday, October 5<sup>th</sup> at Snooks Bottom. CPW and Fruita Parks and Recreation staff will be on hand to help youth learn how to fish. The first 50 youth who register will receive a fishing pole and tackle box.
- The FCC re-opened this past Monday and it looks good as always. Thanks to all the staff who wore grubbies all week and cleaned the cracks and crevices to keep the FCC in top notch shape. As mentioned last week, staff patch 37 spots in the pool plaster, totaling over 110 patches in the last several years. We believe the patches will hold until next August when we intend to shut the indoor pool down for 2 weeks and re-plaster the entire pool.
