Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting on Tuesday will begin with the consent agenda, and there are no legislative or quasi-judicial hearings scheduled. Budget presentations will continue with presentations on Outside Agency Funding Requests, the Parks and Recreation Department, the Community Center Fund, and the Police Department. Consideration of a Great Outdoors Colorado Grant for the Colorado National Monument Association is also on the agenda.

Community Draft Plan Party Recap (continued)

The community came out in large numbers last week to participate in the draft plan party. By our count, there were approximately 150 people that came out to share their ideas and thoughts on the how the community should grow. It is awesome to witness such positive and thoughtful engagement with a process that focuses on the community, and not any one goal or issue. I truly appreciate the large amount of work our resident-based Steering Committee, Planning and Development staff and the SE Group put in to making this such an effective and engaging process for residents to participate in. SE Group has added the boards that were used at the event to <u>www.fruitainmotion.org</u> and is working on an interactive way to participate online too. Planning & Development Director Dan Caris and I began the roadshow of further community engagement this week. We will solidify the full schedule next week as well and that will also be posted on the website. Photos from the event can be found <u>here</u>.

General Updates

- City sales tax continues to trend upward for the year. In August, sales tax revenues were up 14.43% over August 2018, bringing the year-to-date totals up 15.67% over the same period in 2018.
- County sales tax and use tax on motor vehicles continue to trend up from last year and lodging tax and building use taxes are down from 2018.

- I spoke to the Fruita Lion's Club this week regarding the Fruita in Motion Plan.
- Dan Caris and I also spoke to the Fruita Chamber Board regarding both the Fruita in Motion Plan and the proposed transportation impact fees.
- Dan Caris also presented to the Mesa County Planning Commission regarding Fruita in Motion this week.
- Staff met with Grand Valley Transit MPO staff regarding the current multi-modal funds available. I will provide a brief update during City Manager updates Tuesday night.
- Work on establishing the Foreign Trade Zone is progressing and we will soon be scheduling an update at a future Council meeting on this work and the official request for funding (which the City has set aside for a few years now) will be coming.
- The Fruita Youth Initiative committees have begun their first meetings to work on identified goals.

Engineering

- Kokopelli Trail Extension at 16 Road to connect the south end of 16 Road to the Kokopelli Riverfront Trail is under contract with MA Concrete Construction Inc. Construction will likely start in December and be completed in early spring.
- Additional funding through the Department of Local Affairs was approved recently for the Highway 6 Sewer Interceptor Project. MA Concrete Construction Inc. is also the contractor on this project. Work will be performed through the winter with a completion deadline of April 1, 2020.

Parks and Recreation

- The Fruita Community Center continues to be busy, and as of last month, visits are up 4,400 over last year.
- Also, we had another successful Night at the FCC last week! We estimate that over 200 youth attended, and there was live music, games in the gymnasium and swimming. The next Night at the FCC will be on November 15, 2019.
- Last Saturday, Parks and Recreation with the help of the Colorado Parks and Wildlife Department hosted a Fishing is Fun Event at Snooks Bottom. Over 60 participated in the event

and 50 youth walked away with new fishing poles. Oh, and Snooks Bottom Lake has 2,700 new inhabitants (Rainbow trout) although after Saturday there are a few less trout - Thanks to CPW for stocking the lake and all of their help!

• With the freeze this week, the Parks crews were busy winterizing our parks. The crews have been working on the irrigation lines, drinking fountains, and restrooms to prepare for the cold temperatures.

Public Works

- Public Works staff were busy winterizing swamp coolers, water lines and other facilities this week in advance of the freeze last night.
- Road crews continue to crack seal streets when temperatures allow. This week they were able to crack seal the asphalt on Honeysuckle Way, Peach Way, and at the Fruita Bike Park.
- Wastewater staff successfully transferred all flow from the south oxidation ditch to the north oxidation ditch at the treatment plant this week. This was an extremely involved process in balancing biological treatment throughout and required operators to work a 15+ hour shift to make it happen. This will now allow us to perform some needed maintenance and be better prepared in the near future when both oxidation ditches will need to be operational.
- As the busy seasons for road maintenance and irrigation are nearing an end, we are gearing up to spend more time on staff development. This includes making sure that staff are maintaining appropriate certifications and a preparing a training schedule for the coming year.


