- We met with a prospective company this week who is highly considering relocating and purchasing property in Fruita. We have follow-up visits in the works.
- We met with another mountain bike company regarding the Fruita Trails Initiative and maintaining and building new trails.
- We met with the new Museum Director to discuss our current lease and partnerships with Dinosaur Journey.
- Dan Caris and I presented to the Fruita Rotary Club and discussed in depth the Fruita in Motion Comprehensive Plan.
- I attended the Greater Grand Junction Sports Commission Board meeting and passed on the Tourism Board's swag items for the Rim Rock Run participant packets.
- I was also able to meet with the new Assistant Superintendent of the school District and discuss the many partnerships we have with the local schools.
- In partnership with the Fruita Chamber of Commerce we hosted the annual Fruita Economic Development Forum at the Civic Center Thursday night and Gabby with SE Group engaged the group on the comprehensive plan related to development.
- In September, Fruita residents recycled 48 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. The full report is provided below.
- We had a small but productive group at Beer with the City Manager at Suds Brothers Tuesday night. It was great to hear from local business owners and managers, and we discussed the Community Plan and collaborative marketing efforts.
- Staff attended the Associated Governments of Northwest Colorado (AGNC) Board of Directors and Members Meeting at the Fruita Community Center on Wednesday. Staff heard legislative updates from state and federal representatives. Also, there were speakers from the Colorado Air and Space Port, Colorado Mesa University, and other agencies. Avoided 134 Metric Tons of Greenhouse Gas Emissions




261,770 Gallons of Water
