Tuesday's City Council Meeting on November 5, 2019

The meeting on Tuesday will begin with members of the Grand Junction Economic Partnership providing an update on the progress of the Foreign Trade Zone. There are five items on the consent agenda, and only one public hearing scheduled. Budget presentations will continue with an overview of Personnel changes next year, and a summary of proposed 2020 Capital Projects and the Capital Improvement Plan. We will conclude with a discussion on a potential lodging tax question.

General Updates

- We are working closely with the Grand Junction Economic Partnership and the Business Incubator Center with a prospective company highly interested in making Fruita home.
- We had a small but good turnout at the Coffee with the City Manager at Judy's Restaurant this week. We heard from a few new residents and discussed a variety of City projects and goals. - The Request for Proposals for the Land Use Code update close today at 5p.m. and we will begin reviewing next week.
- We had a group participate at the Civic Center today in the annual State Demography Summit via live webinar, learning about very interesting growth stats in the state and our area.
- Veterans can ride the Grand Valley Transit free all month in November with an ID or discharge papers. The full flyer is provided below.
- The Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) has released the Midpoint Report for the Your Transportation Plan. As part of the community engagement process, CDOT received over 9,000 completed survey and more than 17,000 map comments. CDOT has compiled all this information into a report that can be viewed at this <u>link</u>.

- Next Tuesday afternoon, we will be presenting our K.4 Road Grant Application to the Department of Local Affairs.

Administration

• Work continues preparing the draft 2020 budget, grants and asset management. The proposed draft budget can be found <u>here</u>.

Engineering

- The Highway 6 Sewer Interceptor project has started construction. This week, crews drilled holes along the alignment of the sewer that will be utilized for dewatering wells. MA Concrete Construction is the contractor for the project. Their subcontractor Clayco Inc is preparing for boring at the east end across the Independent Ranchman's Canal and Highway 6 and Union Pacific Railroad.
- On Tuesday, Project Manager Chris Dehmel celebrated 19 years with the City of Fruita. Thank you for all your dedication and hard work Chris!
- With several projects underway within the city, there are a few road closures. Fremont St.(18 ½ Road) continues to be closed north of Brandon Estates Subdivision with the construction of Oak Creek Estates and the new Monument Ridge Elementary school. Asphalt paving is scheduled to begin next week in that area. J 2/10 Road is closed east of Fremont for utility installations for Grand Valley Estates Filing II Subdivision, where crews are prepping the roads for roadbase this week.

 The Trails Maintenance Crew finished up 6 weeks of work – 3 weeks at 18 Road and 3 weeks at the Kokopelli Trail System. Members of the Fruita Trails Initiative will be getting together in the next couple of weeks to review the program and work completed. In the meantime, thank you to COPMOBA, BLM, WCCC, Over the Edge and especially Anne Keller at Hot Tomato who spent a significant amount of time coordinating the crew's efforts.

- Shelledy Elementary Gym on December 2nd 4pm-6pm




What is a Comprehensive Plan?
