Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting on Tuesday will begin with four items on the consent agenda, and there are no scheduled public hearings. 2020 Budget presentations will continue with a summary of the Enterprise Funds, the Public Works budget, other funds, and an overview of the entire proposed 2020 Budget. On the administrative agenda, Ture Nycum will give an update on the upcoming PHROST (Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails) Plan update and will discuss forming a steering committee for the update. The meeting will conclude with an executive session.

Transportation Impact Fees

On Tuesday November 12th, the Planning Commission voted 5-2 recommending approval of the Amending Chapter 19 of the Fruita Municipal Code regarding Transportation Impact Fees. This application is considered a Land Use Code Amendment, which is a legislative action, where a recommendation is provided by Planning Commission and a decision is finalized upon second reading by City Council. The Planning Commission discussed this Land Use Code Amendment at length during deliberations and spent a lot of time evaluating the potential outcomes. The Fruita City Council will hear this application on December 17th, 2019. The packet for that meeting will be posted as always, the Friday prior and will include minutes from the Planning Commission meeting and any other comments received. Like always, we very much appreciate those taking part in the public process.

Land Use Code Request for Proposals

The City has received several submissions for the 2019 Land Use Code Update. We are currently working on evaluating the submittals and narrowing down the applicant pool for interviews. We are excited to get this project started and looking forward to onboarding a consultant.

Update on the Fruita Youth Initiative

The Fruita Youth Initiative (FYI) continues to make great progress on the Community Action Plan for Fruita. Once complete, the Community Action Plan will identify risk factors among youth in the community, a timeline to implement the plan, community initiatives, and more. The FYI hosted a meeting with staff and

community partners this past Thursday to review the initial draft of the plan. Several subcommittees have also been meeting often and making progress on specific programs and issues relevant to the plan. The involvement from the community has been great.

Regional Planning Commissioner Training

Last night some of our Planning Commissioners participated with staff in a training hosted in partnership with the City, GJ, Palisade and the County. The training was very effective and informative. Andy Hill from the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) led the discussion. Andy manages the Community Development Division under DOLA. The topics that were covered during the training consisted of: why Plan and Planning Authority, Roles and Responsibilities, Long Range Planning and Implementation, Effective Meetings and Decision Making, and Legal and Ethical Issues.

Rare Mosquito Found in Fruita (continued)

Last month, the Grand River Mosquito Control District (GRMCD) trapped a <u>single Aedes aegypti</u> mosquito in the Fruita area. According to them, this mosquito is typically found in tropical climates and can transmit a variety of diseases. The discovery was a concern since it was the first time this mosquito species was found in our area. The GRMCD increased surveillance efforts and evening fogging operations in the Fruita area because of the discovery. With the freeze, the GRMCD does not believe that are any mosquitoes left and will monitor this specific area of Fruita closely next year. General Updates

- City sales tax continues to trend upward for the year and were up 6.58% in September from last year. For the year, City sales tax is up 14.5% overall.
- County sales tax (6.58% YTD) and use tax on motor vehicles (12.58% YTD) are also up from last year. Lodging taxes and use tax on building materials continue to be down when compared to 2018.
- In September, Fruita residents recycled 47 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. The full report is provided below.
- Speaking of recycling, the City of Fruita is one of 29 cities throughout Colorado that is being
 featured as a top city for recycling by Eco-Cycle, Inc. Eco-Cycle, Inc. released a 2019 State of
 Recycling in Colorado report that highlights Fruita and other cities throughout the state for

Avoided 133 Metric Tons of Greenhouse Gas Emissions


Recycling these materials helps create cleaner air!
