Tuesday's City Council Workshop

Prior to the Council workshop is an executive session at 6:30 pm. The workshop will begin at 7pm. There are four items on the agenda for the Workshop meeting on Tuesday night. We will begin by discussing any outstanding issues for the 2020 Budget, and then discuss the lodging tax. The meeting will conclude with an update on the 5-2-1 Drainage Authority, and the Village at Country Creek Speed Limit Discussion.

Fruita in Motion: Comprehensive Plan Open Houses

This week, the Planning and Development Department and I hosted two open houses on the Community Plan Update. We had good turnouts at both Fruita Monument High School and at the Church of Latter-day Saints. To date, we have hosted several open houses at local schools and met with many community groups to hear feedback on the proposed plan. Due to the recent illness spreading and with the holidays, we (City and Shelledy Administration) have decided to cancel the open house at Shelledy Elementary School that was scheduled for December 2nd. They will be sending an email to parents about the change and encouraging them to visit <u>www.fruitainmotion.org</u> to participate in the same exercises. We will continue to leave the planning boards up at the Fruita Community Center as well during the busy holiday week that we typically experience more visitors than average.

Transportation Impact Fees (Continued)

On Tuesday November 12th, the Planning Commission voted 5-2 recommending approval of the Amending Chapter 19 of the Fruita Municipal Code regarding Transportation Impact Fees. This application is considered a Land Use Code Amendment, which is a legislative action, where a recommendation is provided by Planning Commission and a decision is finalized upon second reading by City Council. The Planning Commission discussed this Land Use Code Amendment at length during deliberations and spent a lot of time evaluating the potential outcomes. The Fruita City Council will hear this application on December 17th, 2019. The packet for that

meeting will be posted as always, the Friday prior and will include minutes from the Planning Commission meeting and any other comments received. Like always, we very much appreciate those taking part in the public process.

General Updates

- This week, Odette and I met with all full-time employees in every Department and presented on the proposed 2020 Budget and answered questions from staff. In addition to an overview of the proposed 2020 budget, we discussed the structure of our government, vision, goals, values and continued emphasis on priorities of the "Community First" approach; "Prioritizing Existing" employees, amenities, services; and planning for the future; "Mastering Our Trades" in each position and "Continuous Improvement" as tied to performance measures and goals. We also celebrated accomplishments of this year as we set the stage for 2020.
- The Grand Valley Transit is offering Ride Free Saturdays for the holiday shopping season beginning on Small Business Saturday on November 30, 2019. All Mesa County residents and visitors can ride the GVT fixed route all day Saturday for four consecutive Saturdays, starting November 30, 2019 to December 21, 2019. The GVT will also take passengers to Fruita on December 14th for the Holiday Christmas and Parade of Lights and Craft Fair. The full flyer is provided below.
- Save the Date the Fruita Chamber of Commerce has scheduled the Annual Awards Banquet for Saturday, February 8th, 2020 at 5:30 p.m. For more information, you can visit this <u>link</u>.
- With the recent illness spreading around the Grand Valley, Mesa County Public Health hosted a Facebook Live Q & A to answer questions from the community on the outbreak. - The Fruita Youth Initiative has released the Spring 2020 schedule for the Start the Conversation Fruita events. The next Start the Conversation event will be on December 18, 2019 and the topic will be on Marijuana use, and the Spring discussions will focus on resilience and happiness, stress management, suicide prevent, and social media use. - Led by the Employee Engagement Committee, the City will be gathering items of need at the Civic Center for the residents of The Oaks in Fruita for Christmas.

Engineering

• J.2 Road is being prepped for paving. If the weather holds, plans are to pave next week prior to Thanksgiving.

Parks and Recreation

• Due to the illness outbreak that shut down our local schools at the end of the week, staff has implemented a cleaning plan to disinfect the Fruita Community Center daily and as best as possible. We will continue to do this until we are comfortable that the virus is under control in the area.

- There were 6 landscape architects and 5 artists who submitted to work on the Round-a-bouts for the City. Staff will be assembling a selection committee, mostly from the Arts and Culture Board to select an architect and artist moving forward.
- Two members of the Arts and Culture Board and staff meet with a local resident to review artwork to be potentially donated to the City of Fruita. Discussions will continue.
- Proposals for the Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails Master Plan are due next Wednesday, November 27th. Proposals will be reviewed on December 2nd and selected consultants will be invited to interview in-person on December 16th.
- Christmas Lights will be turned on next Wednesday, Thanksgiving Eve. Thanks to the parks crew for all their hard work over the past several weeks setting up lights. We are all anticipating a spectacular show.

Stop the Spread

A HIGHLY CONTAGIOUS ILLNESS IS SPREADING THROUGH OUR COMMUNITY

THE MAIN SYMPTOM IS VOMITING

PROTECT YOURSELF

When someone vomits, tiny particles go into the air. These particles are not visible to the eye and it takes very few of them to infect another person. These particles can live on hard surfaces for weeks.



THINK ABOUT A SPRAY BOTTLE'S MIST

Particles from an infected person's vomit or feces can spread and be ingested by others up to **25** feet away.

If you have been around someone who was sick, there's a good chance you may have come in contact with some of these particles. WATCH FOR SYMPTOMS AND ISOLATE YOURSELF FOR UP TO 72 HOURS TO STOP THE SPREAD OF ILLNESS.



IMMEDIATELY CLEAN UP

If you've been exposed to the vomit or feces of an infected person, use a disposable mask or cover your face and use gloves to immediately clean up the area.



USE BLEACH TO CLEAN

- Clean up the visible waste with a disposable cloth.
- Disinfect the area using a product that says it is effective against norovirus.
 - Remember particles can travel up to 25 feet so pay special attention to walls and other surfaces.
- To make your own, use 1 cup of bleach per 1 gallon of water.
- Leave the bleach on the surface for at least 1 minute or follow instructions on the product.



AVOID PUBLIC PLACES IF YOU THINK YOU HAVE BEEN EXPOSED

- · This illness is hitting people very quickly.
- To help stop the spread, it is extremely important to stay home if you are sick.
- . Do not return to work, school, or child care until you are symptom-free for at least 24 hours.

Symptoms: Primarily vomiting, some diarrhea and fevers Duration: 12 - 24 hours Concerns: Rapid person to person spread, dehydration in extreme cases. Closure of all DS1 schools

Feeling Sick? A HIGHLY CONTAGIOUS stomach bug is going around the community.

The virus is mainly causing vomiting and spreads easily from person-to-person.

What can you do?

- Wash your hands often with soap and water.
- If you are sick with vomiting or diarrhea, stay home and remain home for at least 24 hours after symptoms have ended.
- If you think you've been exposed to the virus through clean up or contact with vomiting or diarrhea, watch for symptoms and consider limiting interaction with others for at least 24 hours.

Cuando alguien vomito, pequeños partículas se propagan por el aire. Estas particulas no pueden ser vistas por nuestros ajos y que aparte se necesitan salo unas cuantas para infector a una persona. Estas partículas pueden vivir en una superficie dura durante semanas.

TENGA UNA BOTELLA DE ROCIADOR A LA MANO

Estas particulas del vómito y del excremento de una persona infectada pueden propagarse y ser ingetidas par otras personas a una distancia por otras personas a una distancia de hasta 25pies.

Si ud ha estado cerca de alguien enfermo, es muy posible que su cuerpo haya estado en contacto con estas partículas.


