Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We have a light agenda for the meeting Tuesday. It begins with two presentations, the first from the Commander of the American Legion Post 2009, and the second from the Executive Director of the Colorado National Monument Association. There are seven items on the consent agenda, and no public hearings or administrative items. The meeting will conclude with an executive session.

General Updates

- City sales tax continues to trend up for the year and was up 25.39% in November 2019 over November 2018. Thru November 2019 City sales tax was up 13.83% over the same period in 2018.
- County sales tax (12.19% increase in October) and the use tax on motor vehicles (39.84% in November) were also up last month. When compared to last year, the lodging tax is down slightly (1.55% overall) and also the use tax on building materials is down.

- Exciting news this week, Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) announced that they will be hosting a listening tour for the GOCO 2020 Strategic Plan at the Fruita Community Center next month. GOCO is trying to get feedback for the new strategic plan that will be used for the next five or more years. - Fruita Monument High School is hosting a Community Open House on Wednesday January 22, 2020 from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m. The purpose of the event is to highlight the changes from the recent construction and to discuss all of the school district projects from the 2017 bond measure funds. A few highlights from the newsletter is that the district will continue with safety improvements at Fruita Monument High School as well as other maintenance projects at the Fruita Middle School and Fruita 8/9 School. Also, the Board will be meeting with the District's demographer in February to discuss the boundaries for Monument Ridge Elementary School.
- We have also scheduled the dates to recognize students and teachers from each Fruita school at 2020 City Council meetings beginning in February.
- One last School District update, the D51 Foundation 8th Annual White Iced Celebration will be on February 1, 2020 at Colorado Mesa University. More information on the benefit event can be found [here](#).
- Congratulations to the new Fruita Area Chamber of Commerce Board President, Kodi Imondi! There was a great introduction in the Weekly Connection this week, and more information on the Board can be found [here](#).
- I had a chance to meet with the new Superintendent of the Colorado National Monument this week to discuss continued partnerships.
- I attended the GJEP Board meeting this week and expressed appreciation to the board for their support of incentives to match the state strategic fund incentives for Canfield Bikes. Development in Fruita will be the focus of GJEP's next Sentinel article and their radio show on KAFM Business Beat Jan. 28 at noon.
- Dan and I met with a business prospect and representatives of the Fruita Business park to discuss a business development.
- Since we did not receive the DOLA grant last year for K.4 Rd, we are working up options for tackling our budgeted street projects this year to discuss with City Council at the February 4 meeting.

Engineering

- The casing pipe has been advanced the full length of the highway and railroad bore for the Highway 6 Sewer Interceptor Project. Installation of the carrier pipe will begin after all the casing pipe cleaning and elevations have been established.

Parks and Recreation

- On Wednesday (January 15th) The Fruita Youth Initiative hosted the first Spring session of "Start the Conversation." The session was presented by Mind Springs Health where they talk about Resiliency and Happiness. The next "Start the Conversation" session is on February 19th where Primary Care Physicians will talk present on Stress Management and Wellness.

- Night at the FCC is tonight! The FCC Will close its doors tonight at 7pm for 5-7th grade students to come and be youth.
- Nuggets Skills Challenge is at the FCC tomorrow morning.
- The contract with GreenPlay is signed and we are off and running to develop a Fruita Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails (PHROST) Master Plan. Staff is scheduled to have a kick-off meeting on Monday to set schedules and discuss the planning process.
- Staff presented the CPW Non-Motorized Planning Grant Application to Colorado Parks and Wildlife early this week. We certainly hope the presentation went well and we were able to address any questions CPW may have had regarding our funding request to prepare Cultural and Paleo survey work in the North Fruita Desert. This is the next step in being able to construct new trail at the 18 Road trail system.
