Engineering

- The Highway 6 Interceptor Sewer project has established the grade for the carrier pipes for the 2 bore locations. The contractor is working on installing the carrier pipe now. MA Concrete construction will begin the open cut potion of the sewer next week.
- Staff met with the RTPO and other local agencies to make recommendations for funding of the Multi-modal Options Funds. A follow-up meeting is scheduled for February 3, 2020 to finalize the recommended projects for the funding. Formal board action is anticipated at the February 24, 2020 board meeting.

Human Resources/Tourism

• The Fruita Tourism Advisory Council met this week and received a review of 2019 from Slate Communications and planned for 2020. There is one vacancy on the board, and we will be accepting applications for the next 3 weeks.

Parks and Recreation

- Staff participated in a conference call with the consultants for the Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails (PHROST) master plan update to kick off the process.
- We had a great turnout for Night at the FCC last Friday! 330 5th-7th graders attended and enjoyed live music, games, swimming, and pizza. The next Night at the FCC is scheduled for March 27, 2020.
- We also had a great turnout for the Denver Nuggets Skills challenge last Saturday, 40 kids participated in the event and showed off their basketball skills.
- If you have been to the Rec Center lately, you may have noticed that we are experiencing some technical difficulties with the four TVs in the cardio area upstairs. Staff is working with Charter to resolve the issue, and we hope that the TVs will be fixed soon. Good news though, the TVs on the treadmills are still working and have cable access.
- Four Beavers have been trapped and removed from Snooks Bottom Open Space. Traps are still in place in case there are more members of the beaver family still homesteading at Snooks.
- Fruita Community Center will be gathering this Sunday evening for their annual All-Staff Meeting. It's a great time to review accomplishments in the prior year, share what is planned for the coming year, review any policies and procedures and finally recognize staff for years of services and individual accomplishments.

• One of the suspects in the 2018 Family Dollar robbery was convicted of 13 felony and 5 misdemeanor counts. Sentencing is pending.

Public Works

- Xcel Energy is scheduled to do some electrical upgrades along Highway 340 starting next week to extend 3-phase power to the City's lift station near Redcliffs subdivision. This was part of the 2019 capital budget that included upgrading the controls for the lift station and carried over into the 2020 calendar year.
- Public Works continues to build upon the work order system implemented last year with 537 work orders completed in 2019 and 45 already completed in January of 2020. In looking back, it is interesting to see that less than 30% of the work orders were for preventative maintenance measures. This is something that we will continue to track in an effort to reduce corrective (more expensive) repairs where possible.


