# Tuesday's City Council Workshop Cancelled

At this time, the City Council workshop originally scheduled for March 24 and the City Council meeting originally scheduled for April 7, 2020, have been canceled. The next scheduled City Council meeting is for April 21 at 7pm. The City Council approved at the March 17 City Council meeting a resolution allowing the City to hold remote, electronic Council meetings as needed. As with any public meeting a minimum of 24 hours public notice is required, and the notice would include how the public can participate as well. In addition, all Boards and Commission meetings for the remainder of March, the month of April and first week in May have been canceled with hope to resume soon after.

## 2020 City of Fruita Municipal Election

Ballots for the upcoming municipal election were mailed this week and have reached residents. There is a drop-box at the Civic Center to turn in ballots, or they can be mailed in using the envelope provided with the ballot. Ballots must be received by April 7, 2020 at 7pm, after which they will be tallied and reported. We have received 21 ballots as of 3/19/2020.

## **Coronavirus Update**

It is no surprise, but a consistent reminder that the Fruita community is AWESOME! This has been a tough week to say the least. I am humbled by how amazing the majority of our community is responding to such a unique and uncharted reality with response to COVID-19. During times like these, we rely on training and focusing on the tried and true principles and basics that lead us to sound, effective decisions. I assure you that our team is functioning in this manner and I am proud of the expertise and leadership that is provided behind the scenes to maintain core services, make critical decisions and communicate. As always, we work in partnerships with many other groups and agencies and those continue to be strong. While we are all feeling the impacts to this temporary reality, the many precautionary measures to limit exposure or spread is our best effort to impact the outcome; however, we feel for those who are lonely, scared, or in need. We feel for our small businesses that are essential to the local economy and are encouraged and

applaud those who are trying their best to continue to shop local within the restrictive precautions we are all following.

I encourage the City Council and the public to continue to review our continuous updates found at <a href="https://www.fruita.org/covid19">https://www.fruita.org/covid19</a>. At this site, you will find all City updates related to the COVID-19 response as well as links to other essential sites to follow, which include Mesa County Health Department, the State of Colorado, and the CDC. In addition to City information, the City is following the guidelines of each of these agencies. We are in constant coordination with these and many other agencies receiving regular, direct communication from them.

Lastly, I want to address the topic of a Declaration of Emergency. As the City Council is aware, this is a formal action that I as the City Manager have the authority to issue, by state statute, our Emergency Operations Plan, and your vote last Tuesday. If issued, we would schedule a City Council meeting for the Council to ratify within seven days. In an effort to avoid eliciting undue panic with such an issuance, I wanted to clarify why we would issue this declaration. First, we would issue if the County does, which is common practice and to support the local declaration. Mesa County plans to issue such a declaration if there are confirmed community transmissions of additional positive tests (to the current isolated one case) or a declaration of the Governor for a shelter in place—neither of which have occurred. Second, if there is a type of federal or state aid for the City, Fruita residents or local businesses that would require such, we would issue. To date, this is not the case of any pending aid requiring such, so we are ready and monitoring, but not issuing, simply to issue.

## Fruita Community Center, Fruita Police Department, and City Shops Closed Indefinitely

As of March 18, 2020, the City of Fruita Police Department and City Shops building are closed to the public until further notice. These closures are purely precautionary and will allow our staff members to conduct a deep cleaning of each facility. The Fruita Community Center ("FCC") has been closed since March 15, 2020. Again, this closure was a preventative measure and we are not aware of any patrons at the FCC have been test positive for the Coronavirus or have exhibited symptoms. All recreation programming is also postponed until April 6, 2020, but this is subject to change.

With the FCC closure, we have received a number of questions regarding billing of monthly passes and prepaid memberships. For those patrons who are set up with automated monthly billing through a credit card or automatic debits to checking/savings accounts, the FCC will NOT be automatically debiting bank accounts or charging credits. We anticipate that automatic billing will be re-instituted in April. For those patrons who have prepaid for a 3-month or 12-month membership to the FCC, your membership expiration will be extended to reflect the length of the closure.

# Community Center Staff Create Public Way to Donate and Distribute Perishables and Learning Materials

Let's spread some Fruita love! Outside of the community center there will be carts with learning materials and food. They will be out Monday- Friday 7:30-4:30 and Saturday 8:30-4:30. ## **General Updates**

- Greg Wolfgang, who has been in the role of acting Grand Junction Field Manage for the Bureau
  of Land Management is now appointed as the permanent Field Manager. We have enjoyed
  working with Greg and look forward to continuing to work with he and the local team.
- Will keep this brief as much of the work has been continuously working on the response.
- However, with the exception of the Community Center and programs, all services have continued and have remained busy.
- Construction in the city and planning permits have not slowed.
- Staff are conducting meetings via video conference. We have tested out remote working and other means to keep 6-feet distances and maintain continuity of operations.
- Internal policies related to teleworking, leave (in accordance with new federal laws) are being finalized and implemented.
- Community Center staff are providing lots of helpful Facebook posts for people going stir crazy at home.
- Food Bank of the Rockies distributed about 100 boxes of food to residents outside the Community Center Thursday.
- Agape Food Bank at the Civic Center distributed Wednesday outside the building.

- Staff was able to perform a variety of deep cleaning/de-sanitizing of the Community Center this week. Staff treated it as a mini-maintenance week, and much time was spent on ensuring that the facility is more than adequately cleaned during the closure.
- With our parks open, playground equipment is being thoroughly cleaned daily with a disinfectant power wash and the park restrooms that remain open are regularly cleaned as well.

# Public Health Recommendations (As of 3/9/20)

- If you are experiencing symptoms like a cough, fever, or respiratory problems, call your health care provider FIRST. Do not go to the emergency room. Emergency rooms need to be able to serve those people with the most critical needs. If you are having a medical emergency, call 9-1-1.
- Do not go to a health care facility in person unless directed by phone or if it's a medical emergency. If you are in Mesa County and believe you were exposed to a confirmed case of COVID-19 or if you are a health care provider with questions, call 970-254-4120.
- · Stay home when sick.
- Practice excellent personal hygiene habits, including hand washing, covering coughs and sneezes, and avoiding touching your face.
- Stay away from people that are ill, especially if you are 60 and older, or have underlying medical conditions, or if you are pregnant.
- · Avoid non-essential travel to impacted areas. Stay up-to-date on travel advisories.
