Red Cliffs Clean Up Project

This past weekend, hundreds of members from the Victory Life Church and City staff participated in a neighborhood clean-up project at Red Cliffs Mobile Home Park. Code Compliance Officer David Oliver and Building Maintenance Supervisor Todd Patton, arranged for several dumpsters to be used for trash disposal, and provided a dump-truck for hazardous waste and television disposal. There was a massive

turnout by Victory Life Church Volunteers, and they cleaned up yards, trimmed trees, raked leaves, and generally helped residents clean up properties. Contractors from the church also provided 8 other dumpsters, front-end loaders, bobcats, forklifts, new swamp cooler covers, carpet steam cleaner services, and even built fences and decks for residents. School District #51 Votes on Boundaries for Fruita Elementary Schools

On Tuesday, the School District #51 Board voted in favor of scenario two for the Fruita elementary school boundaries. Scenario two is: Placing a boundary along Ottley Avenue/K Road and having students who live east of the Shelledy Elementary boundary and north of Ottley attend Monument Ridge and having students who live east of the Shelledy boundary and south of Ottley attend Rim Rock Elementary, plus 60 children who live south of I-70 in Fruita would go to Shelledy Elementary instead of Loma Elementary. Under this scenario, projected 2020-21 enrollment would be 476 for Appleton, 260 for Loma, 345 for Monument Ridge, 345 for Rim Rock, and 475 for Shelledy. Full news story and map can be found here.

General Updates

Following City Council approval Tuesday night, today we have submitted the Mesa County
 Federal Mineral Lease District grant to improve the Railroad crossing at 16 Rd. Presentation to the board will be next week.

- We are monitoring and preparing for possible levels of responses to the COVID-19 virus for City operations and will stay connected with weekly updates with the Mesa County Health Department.
- The Spring 2020 City Link is complete and should be arriving at homes and businesses early next week. We will also be posting it online and sending out the link then as well.
- In February, Fruita residents recycled 46 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. The full report can be found below. Great job, Fruita!
- The Grand Junction Economic Partnership has announced that the 2020 Western Colorado Economic Summit will take place on Friday, April 24, 2020 at Colorado Mesa University (CMU). For more information, you can visit GJEP's website here. If you're interested in attending, please let Deb know.
- The Mesa County Economic Update from CMU for the first quarter of this year is now available and can be found here. A few highlights from the report, Mesa County GDP continues to grow at a strong rate (4.7%), and Dr. Nathan Perry is forecasting that the economic growth will continue but at a slower rate for this year.
- Also, this weekend, the Fruita Historic Preservation Board, along with several other
 organizations, is sponsoring the "Celebrating 127 Years of Women's Right to Vote in Colorado"
 program at the Lithic Bookstore downtown. That flyer also be found below.
- We appreciate the Chamber and candidates for Mayor and City Council hosting and participating in the Candidate Forum last night.
- Just prior to the forum, we had a good turnout for our Bike with the City Manager on Thursday afternoon. The group discussed our partnerships, current planning efforts, and economic development. It was a great discussion, and also, spring-like weather conditions! Thank you to all that came and rode with us.



Administration/Finance

Preparation for the municipal election is underway. We will be assisting Palisade and sharing
costs of the election equipment. Equipment is delivered and prepped. Required TABOR
statements are being mailed today. Ballots will be mailed between March 16-23.

Engineering

- The 16 Road Trail connection project is progressing with utility construction complete and subgrade prep for the trail.
- Staff submitted a grant application to Mesa County Federal Mineral Lease District for improvements to the 16 Road rail crossing of the Union Pacific Railroad. This is the entrance to the industrial park and these improvements will greatly improve the safety of the crossing with these widening improvements.

Human Resources/Tourism

- The City of Fruita is currently hiring for three positions A Maintenance Custodian (Part Time), 3 Seasonal Public Works Maintenance Workers, and an Administrative Specialist for Parks and Recreation. To find out more about each position, you can find the job postings here.
- We will also be hosting the St. Mary's Bloodmobile at the Civic Center on Tuesday, March 24, 2020 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. accepting blood donations.

Parks and Recreation

- Roxie McConnell will be retiring from the City of Fruita on March 30th. Roxie has been with the City of Fruita for many years, starting off in Administration and most recently with Parks and Recreation (for over 15 years in Parks and Rec). She has served our community with poise and dedication and has been a consistent and positive force for Parks and Recreation and the City in these many years. In many ways, she is the glue that has kept Parks and Recreation running. We will be hosting a farewell lunch for her on Monday, March 30th at Noon at the Fruita Community Center. Anyone is welcome to come by and share your appreciation for her service to the Fruita community
- Parks has hired 2 seasonal and 1 variable hour employees as we prepare for the upcoming spring and summer seasons.
- Parks staff has also expanded that area and frequency of where we contract out weed control services. We have included Snooks Bottom Open Space and the Riverfront Park areas as well as the Lower Little Salt Wash and Kokopelli Trail sections. We hope this will improve our control of weeds in 2020.
- The Fruita Youth Initiative is accepting applications for the 2020/21 Fruita Youth Action Council. Youth must be in 6th 12th grade during the next academic year. See the attached flyer and fact sheet below. The link to apply for the FYAC can be found here.



Avoided 128 Metric Tons of Greenhouse Gas Emissions


