Coronavirus Update

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow www.fruita.org/covid19 for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- **COVID-19 Cases.** Mesa County continues to see slight increases in the number of COVID-19 cases. As of Friday afternoon, there have been 87 confirmed cases. Unfortunately, The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment reported that new outbreaks are beginning to emerge in the San Luis Valley, El Paso, Boulder, and San Miguel Counties. The state is encouraging residents to consider the amount of risk involved when participating in group activities, and created this <u>image</u> to show the risks and benefits of everyday activities.
- Mesa County Phase 3 Waiver Request. It is our understanding that Mesa County Public Health has submitted a phase 3 variance request to the state and is awaiting a response before releasing the details once approved with modifications or as submitted.
- CARES Act Funding. As I reported Tuesday night, Fruita stands to receive up to \$1,133,143 in CARES Act funding for unanticipated, unbudgeted expenses between March 1 Dec. 31, 2020, related to COVID-19 response efforts. An IGA with Mesa County is being drafted to bring to City Council for a special remote meeting at noon on July 6, in order to submit our required opt-in step with the state on July 7. Staff is also working with our ED partners and internally on identifying many possible uses of these funds, in addition to the tracked and projected COVID-related expenses. We are also following the US treasury and state guidance on what expenses qualify as well since the eligibility requirements are narrow in scope.
- Fruita Small Business Emergency Loan Fund Update. I did clarify with the Business Incubator Center that the loan criteria requiring businesses have Fruita physical address does allow for owners who have a Mesa County physical address and the business is located in the City of Fruita to qualify in addition to the other qualifications. The BIC was to contact any applicants that fit that category to clarify.

The BIC is working with 54 Fruita businesses either with this loan fund, survival plans, our other loan fund or other loan funds they administer.

General Updates

- **Special City Council Workshop.** As we discussed on Tuesday, our special workshop that was scheduled for this upcoming Tuesday has been rescheduled. We have reserved the Community Center meeting rooms for July 13, 2020 meeting engaging Black Lives Matter, Black Citizens and Friends, and Right and Wrong.
- *City Link.* The Summer 2020 City Link is now available! To cut down on the spread of the germs, this issue will not be mailed and is only available online. You can find it here.
- **GVRTC Meeting Recap.** At the GVRTC Board meeting on Monday, the Board discussed how to use the \$5.4 million in CARES Act funding over this year and the next two years. After much discussion, the Board agreed upon scenario two, which will decrease Fruita's contribution to the Regional Transportation Planning Office 57% this year and 52% next year. - **USDA Disaster Designation.** Last Friday, the United States Department of Agriculture granted a disaster designation for Western Colorado counties following the April freeze. This approval grants farmers in Mesa County access to USDA tools and resources to help with losses from the freeze. A press release on the designation can be found here.
- *Fire Restrictions*. Beginning today, Mesa County is implementing Stage 1 Fire Restrictions. These restrictions apply to all of Mesa County including BLM land (except for U.S. Forest Service land). These restrictions prohibit the personal use of fireworks, campfires outside of designated fire pits or fire rings, agricultural open burning without Sheriff's permit, the use of explosive targets, or smoking outside near combustible materials. - Annual CML Business Meeting. I participated as the City's voting representative and received an
 update from CML on bills CML both supported and opposed during the Colorado legislative
 session.
- Meeting with Police Department. City Attorney Paul Wisor, Chief Dave Krouse, HR Director Odette Brach and I met with the Police Department to discuss and answer questions related to the recently passed SB 20-217 "Enhance Law Enforcement Integrity" bill. We are also putting together a summary of what this bill requires that Fruita PD policies already accomplish and any changes over the next few years we will make in response to it to provide City Council and the public. I'm incredibly grateful for our team of police officers, the entire department, and the support the community regularly shares with them.

Administration

- Staff completed working with the Auditors on their field work for the annual budget.
- We are working on finalizing the steps for opting-in to the CARES Act distribution.
- It is budget season and the calendar for the 2021 budget process is being finalized.

Engineering

• Fremont Street and K.4 Road were both paved to Carlotta Court this week. The remainder of the concrete curb gutter and sidewalk are continuing to the west with progress to Locust St.

- Evaluations of the submissions for the request for qualifications for the Fremont St. Design project are underway. Six consulting firms submitted their qualifications.
- Trail connections from the Kokopelli Trail to 16 Road and up to Cipolla Road are complete. The Cipolla Road connection extends from 16 Road westward along the north side of the lake at Imondi Wake Zone and then north to Cipolla Road.

Parks and Recreation

- In regards to the question from a Little League coach about water for players, we did confirm
 with Mesa County Public Health and passed the info on that it is okay to have large jugs of water
 for players as long as they use individual cups. Players may also bring more than one water
 bottle.
- Fruita Community Center ('FCC") staff is working on a special July Activity Guide that will released on Monday, June 29, 2020.
- Since the expansion of the FCC, visitor count to the facility has been very steady. This week, the FCC averaged over 300+ patrons per day.

Land Use Code Update:

The Planning Staff hosted a Land Use Code Update meeting on 6/18/2020 with Design Workshop (Planning Consultant) and our Code Focus Group. The Discussion included zoning, density, and update timeline. We anticipate to have drafts of the plan out for review by the third week of July. The draft Code text amendments will be made available to the community, which will include several opportunities for the public to engage via Workshops, Planning Commission and City Council hearings. We are very excited for this project and look forward to the completing this update to better align with the Fruita In Motion: Plan Like a Local Comprehensive Plan.

Police Department

- The Police Department and City leadership are actively working to evaluate and develop implementation strategies for Senate Bill 20-217 as well as other legislation taking effect July 1.
- We continue to have daily, in fact several times a day, visits and interactions with our wonderful community members who express their gratitude in words, food deliveries, notes and cards, and many other wonderful gestures. What an awesome community we get to be a part of!!
- On Friday morning, State Patrol engaged in a pursuit with a stolen vehicle that came into the state from Utah. The chase came into Fruita and the suspects abandoned the stolen car in the parking lot of the FCC then fled on foot. Fruita officers assisted in the searching for the suspects along with a number of Colorado State Patrol Troopers and Mesa County Sheriff's Office Deputies. Several area facilities were in a brief shelter in place, including the FCC, Family Health West, Shelledy Elementary, and others. The suspects were not located after a search of the area, and the State Patrol is asking the community to be vigilant. - United Companies completed application of chips this week for all planned streets for this year's chip seal project and the contractor will be returning next week to apply the final fog seal. City road and utility crews have been providing all traffic control for this project.
- Dam Safety Engineers are scheduled to complete inspections of the Fruita Reservoir #1, Reservoir #2, and Enoch facilities this coming week.
- Fleet crews were busy this week upfitting police vehicles with new equipment and hope to get them into service soon, which will allow for rotating out and disposal of three older fleet vehicles.
