Tuesday's City Council Workshop

There are three items on the agenda for our workshop on Tuesday night. We will begin with a discussion regarding Boards and Commissions policies, then move on to an update on our COVID-19 response and a discussion on the City Council agenda and cover sheet formats. The meeting will conclude with a 2021 budget process and policy overview and discussion.

PHROST Open House Recap

Our Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails Master Plan consultant, GreenPlay, was in Fruita Wednesday and Thursday to present findings from various community feedback methods, including a community wide survey, a Youth Activities and Nutrition Survey, stakeholder interviews and an exhaustive GIS inventory of our Park and Recreation facilities. We met with the City Council and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board on Wednesday night, held stakeholder interviews throughout Thursday, and hosted an open house at the Fruita Community Center on Thursday night to share the results of these with the public and to gather additional feedback. Thank you to everyone that participated in this week's meetings. Coronavirus Update

• First Mesa County COVID-19 Death. On Tuesday, Mesa County Public Health confirmed the death of a Mesa County resident as a result of COVID-19. MCPH Executive Director Jeff Kuhr stated that "We are deeply saddened, and the entire MCPH team sends our sincere condolences to the family and loved ones. We must continue to take action against COVID-19 by protecting each other and our entire

- community. This loss shows the gravity of the situation; we need to remain diligent." The full release can be found here.
- **CVRF Funding.** Internally, we are working on a lot of potential options on how to best utilize the Coronavirus Relief funding that was appropriated to the City of Fruita. We will discuss this more at the workshop on Tuesday night.
- **Update on Special Events.** On Wednesday, the Fruita Chamber of Commerce announced that the Fruita Fall Festival is cancelled this year. Also, we announced that both the Mike the Headless Chicken Festival (was tentatively rescheduled to August 29th) and the remainder of the Thursday Night Concert Series are also cancelled. This was a difficult decision based upon COVID 19 health order restrictions and we are super bummed to have to cancel this year but look forward to big events next year.
- Resources for Small Businesses. Main Street America has launched a grant program to help fund solutions for small business owners to respond and adapt to the COVID-19 pandemic. Grants of \$5,000 to \$15,000 will be available, and will be awarded on a first-come, first served basis. More information on the program can be found here. Applications for this program open next week. In addition to this, the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") has been extended until August 8, 2020, and as of last month, \$130 billion in federal guarantees for the loans were still available. General Updates

- **Update on Task Force.** The Grand Valley Task Force, which Councilman Harvey is a part of and has been participating in, met last night and decided that we will host the next meeting at the Fruita Community Center ("FCC") on August 13, 2020 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The valleywide Task Force was recently formed to address issues of inequality. The group is comprised of community leaders, elected officials, social advocacy representatives, and our police.
- Livable Communities Radio Show. Earlier this month, John Rodwick (Chair of the Fruita
 Livability Commission) and Shannon Vassen (staff liaison to the commission) went on KAFM to
 discuss Age Friendly Communities and mobility in Fruita, as part of the monthly Mobile Mesa
 County radio show. If you are interested in listening, you can find the segment at this Link.
- Boards and Commissions Meetings. I was able to meet with both the Fruita Tourism Advisory
 Council ("FTAC") and the Livability Commission on Thursday. The FTAC received an update on
 our current marketing efforts and the status of the marketing and promotion fund (the lodging
 tax has been hit particularly hard the last four months). The Livability Commission discussed
 multi-modal Transportation with Public Works Director Ken Haley and potential projects the
 Commission could create and participate in.
- **Grand Valley Free Press.** Shannon and I had the opportunity to meet with and get to know the writers of the Grand Valley Free Press to assist in how they can obtain information or receive a quick response from the City when creating news articles.

Engineering

- There was a minor delay with the Overlays project as we anticipated the completion of the paving last week. The United Company crew were able to get those paved this week.
- Engineering conducted a walkthrough on the completed K.4 Road Improvements project this week.

Human Resources

Parks and Recreation

• The Fruita Community Center has re-instituted the requirement to wear a mask at all times while in the FCC as required by the state's mask order. Several fitness classes have been moved to the backyard so they can continue without mask wearing and patrons have been respectful of wearing masks inside, although we have had few passes cancelled. Usage of the indoor and outdoor pools remain strong as people are still beating the heat at the FCC. We will continue to monitor our visitation levels.
