# **General Updates**

- **Pine Gulch Fire.** As of Wednesday, the Pine Gulch Fire is officially 100% contained! Thank you to all of the firefighters and personnel that made this happen.
- **Fruita Fall Weekend.** It is going to be a busy weekend in downtown Fruita! Tonight, the Fruita Chamber is hosting the Fruita's Brew Festival at Civic Center Park from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Tomorrow (Saturday), the Fruita Farmers Market continues at Reed Park, and really exciting, has been extended through the end of October. Fruita Fall Weekend will conclude with the Dinner Downtown event, which is tomorrow night at Civic Center Park. The events have been approved by the Mesa County Public Health Department by incorporating specific restrictions. More information on these events can be found at the Chamber's website here.
- Palisade Plunge Update. On Thursday morning, Mayor Kincaid attended the "sneak peek"
  event on the Palisade Plunge. The Plunge is nearing completion and will be a great addition to
  the trail systems in the Grand Valley. We happy to support this project and excited for it to
  open. I was able to meet with the Outdoor Recreation Coalition and state officials to lead a
  discussion on regional tie-ins to the Plunge.
- Fall City Link. The Fall City Link design is being finalized and will most likely be sent out to residents and businesses next week.
- Livability Commission. The Livability Commission met on Thursday and heard an update on recycling from Waste Management, and continued discussion on current projects/ideas that the

- commission is working on. Also, congrats to the Chair of the Livability Commission, John Rodwick, for being awarded the AARP 2020 Andrus Award for Community Service. Congrats!
- **Fworks.** Fruita's coworking space in Civic Center has demand and a waiting list for permanent desks. We are working with the Business Incubator Center to arrange add 7-8 more.

## **Engineering**

 The selection committee has reviewed all of the submission on the Active Circulation Plan and narrowed the consultant to two earlier in the week. Video interview were conducted and Fehr & Peers was selected to prepare the plan.

### **Marketing and Promotion**

- Staff is in the process of submitting a joint grant application with the Town of Palisade for the
  Colorado Tourism Office's Matching Marketing Grant program. This grant project is focused on
  two key parts, and that to promote the "book ends" of the valley through a paid advertising
  campaign, and to continue building our photo and video library next year. We should know
  about the status of the grant in the middle of November.
- On Thursday, the Fruita Tourism Advisory Council met to review the proposed Marketing and Promotion budget for next year and to review special event funding applications. After reviewing the applications, the FTAC recommended that the Fruita Farmers Market and the Rim Rock Rodeo be funded next year. For all other events that were funded this year and cancelled, it is recommended that those funds be carried over into next year.

#### **Parks and Recreation**

- The indoor pool is replastered and full of water ready to re-open. We are just waiting on the
  new play feature that will go in the shallow kids area. The hope is it will arrive on Friday and
  gets installed on Saturday. We don't want to re-open the pool, close it for the installation and
  re-open again. As soon as the play feature is install the indoor pool will be re-opened to the
  community.
- Dog Daze will be this Sunday at the Fruita Community Center outdoor pool from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.! Donations will be accepted for Roice-Hurst Human Society and Arrow Veterinary Hospital. Since it is in the outdoor pool, we are asking that guests enter through the north gate. Looking forward to seeing the pups!
- Next Saturday, October 3 is going to be busy in Fruita once again. Starting in the morning at Snooks Bottom, Fruita Parks and Recreation is hosting its annual fishing derby. There are already over 100 youth registered for the event. Later that afternoon, the Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament is scheduled to start at 1:00 pm. We are still taking registrations for golf players and team see flyer attached below. Also occurring is the Cruise and Booze car show hosted by a local radio station at Reed Park Farmers Market is taking a week off for the Car show and will resume the following week on October 10<sup>th</sup>.
- Halloween is still happening in Fruita it just looks a little different. The annual Truck-n-Treat
  event has been moved the City Shops facility (900 Kiefer Avenue) and will be a Drive-Thru event.
  Many of the same trucks, cranes and crazy vehicles will be on hand for people to look at while
  still getting candy and treats. People must register for a time slot to drive through see the
  attached flyer.

The conduit repair project at the I-70 lift station continued this week. The cracked conduits that were under the generator have been excavated and repaired. This was an 8-foot deep hole in unstable soils (reason for settling that caused damage) and we are optimistic that the repairs are progressing so that no further damage occurs.




