Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We have a full agenda. We will begin the meeting with a presentation from the Arts and Culture Board, and then five proclamations on "Massage Therapy Awareness Week," "National Chiropractic Health Month 2020," "National Code Compliance" Month, "Indigenous Peoples Day," and "Mental Health Awareness Week." After that, there are four items on the consent agenda, including the adoption of the revised Mesa County Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan. We have two public hearings on amendments to the Land Use Code. We will then begin budget presentations (Marketing, Planning and Development, and then the Police Department) and end on Manager and Council reports. Coronavirus Update

• **Resources for Businesses.** As a reminder, Energize Colorado continues to accept applications for the Gap Fund, \$25 million in loans and grants for small businesses that have been impacted by COVID-19. The next round for this funding starts on October 5, 2020 and the final around will likely start in November. More information the grant program can be found here.

Be Well. Be Fruita. New signage is being added to both downtown dining spaces. Still to come shortly are bistro tables with umbrellas, a yurt on Mulberry St., porta-potties and handwashing stations. More work will be done based upon feedback of the group prior to bring through the public hearing process with Planning Commission and City Council. The next working group meeting will be scheduled in November.
- Fruita Roots. Mayor Kincaid and I participated with the Fruita Area Chamber of Commerce on • their monthly KAFM radio show Fruita Roots to discuss the Be Well. - McInnis Canyon NCA 20-Year Celebration. The Bureau of Land Management will be hosting the McInnis Canyons National Conservation Area 20-Year Anniversary on October 24, 2020. The event will be at the Devils Canyon Trailhead, and will be at 1:00 p.m. I will be a speaker as well as many of our other partners and partner agencies.

Events such as a history hike to Skinner Cabin, a wilderness hike along Flume Canyon, or even a retro bike ride along Moore Fun (only bikes pre-2000 allowed) with Over the Edge and Colorado Canyons Association. - The 2020 Concrete Replacement project is well under way.
- The Active Circulation Plan is slated to go over the scope and fee negotiation with the selection of Fehr & Peers later next week.
- Initial data collection will begin on the Fremont Street Design Project. Conversations with CDOT on traffic data collection and existing data use took place this week.
- City Engineer Sam Atkins attended the virtual 2020 Annual CASFM Conference (Colorado Association of Stormwater & Floodplain Managers) Tuesday through Thursday. By attending the conference, continuing education credits are earned towards Floodplain Managers certification.
- Bid opening for the Highway 340 Roundabouts project is Oct. 16.

• Please welcome Torie Tucker to the Public Works team. Torie was a seasonal in the Parks Department and joined the Public Works Team on Monday, September 28, 2020 as a full-time employee.

Parks and Recreation

- The Fruita Community Center ("FCC") indoor pool has been reopened and is being used. The kiddie play feature is still needing to be installed and should be completed soon.

- A Colorado Parks and Wildlife Non-Motorized Planning grant was submitted on Thursday to fund biological survey work in the North Fruita Desert. If awarded in the spring of next year, the bio surveys would be completed in hopes to submit a construction grant to build and reroute trails in the NFD in 2022. The stars must align...

- The Youth Scholarship Golf Tournament is this Saturday afternoon at Adobe Creek Golf Course. We are nearing 100 players as of the time we are drafting this memo. Should be a great day with good weather and lots of players. We'd like to thank our Title Sponsor, the Fruita Rotary Club for their support. With them and support from others we are able to scholarship many youth into programs, activities and FCC use throughout the year.
- The 2nd Annual Fishing Derby is also this Saturday in the morning. We have 140 registrants who will be fishing Snooks Bottom. Thanks to Colorado Parks and Wildlife for supporting the event with free fishing poles and staff at the event.
- Brews and Cruise Car Show (minus the brews) will be held a Reed Park this Saturday also.
- When compared to the start of the pandemic, the FCC continues to see increase visits each month. In September, the FCC received 43% when compared to 2019, up from 40% in August. Full report and information can be found below.

- Bids were received for replacement of HVAC units on the Civic Center building this past week and are being evaluated with the goal of replacing prior to the end of the calendar year.

• The lack of precipitation this summer has resulted in Reservoir #3 being completely drained and Reservoir #1 nearly empty to serve the Glade Park water users, and will require the Glade Park water system to be shut down a couple weeks earlier than normal.


