City offices will be closed on Wednesday, November 11, 2020, in observance of Veterans Day.

Coronavirus Update

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow www.fruita.org/covid19 for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- *Mesa County Moves to Safer at Home: Level Orange.* Effective tomorrow, November 7, 2020, Mesa County will be moving to level orange (high risk) of the Safer at Home phase. Full information can be found in the graphic below or at this link, but here is a brief overview of the changes:
- Capacity Requirements Per Industry:
- Restaurants Indoor seating limited to 25% capacity or 50 people; outdoor setting requires 6 feet of distance between parties
- Retail 25% capacity
- Personal Services 25% capacity or 25 people
- Gyms/Fitness 25% capacity, 25 indoors, or outdoors in groups less than ten
- Indoor Events 25% or 50 people (unseated), seated is the same with six feet of distancing
- Outdoor Events 25% or 75 people with distancing
- Businesses certified with a 5-star rating through the Variance Protection
 Program are allowed to operate with less restrictive conditions and should continue to work with MCPH to ensure safety for customers and employees.
- \circ $\,$ Also, no changes to the mask requirement of multi-family gathering requirements.
- *MCPH Releases Public Health Advisory.* Mesa County Public Health ("MCPH") has reported that COVID-19 cases have increased significantly over the past two weeks with 44% of the county's total cases being reported in the last 14 days. Dr. Jeff Kuhr stated "This is a call to action for our entire community. "I've said previously that we are headed in the wrong direction. Looking at the data it is clear; we now find ourselves far down the road, going the wrong way. We need an abrupt turn. I urge each member of our community to take action to protect yourself and the ones you love." The full public health advisory can be found here.

Honor the Past – Envision the Future $\begin{cases} FRUITA \end{cases}$

- In addition to the five best practices MCPH recommends avoiding the three Cs:
 - Closed spaces with poor ventilation
 - Crowded places with many people nearby
 - Closed-contact settings such as conversations in close proximity to others.
- Capacity Requirements Graphic. This week, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment released a graphic showing the updated capacity requirements per activity for all levels of the state's reopening plan (Safer at Home Level, Stay at Home, etc). That graphic can be found at this link and is also provided below.
- Additional Resources for Businesses. The Colorado Restaurant Foundation has established an emergency assistance grant program to help restaurants prepare patio spaces for outdoor dining this winter. Colorado restaurants can apply for up to \$10,000 in funding to help with several types of winter-related expenses, such as heaters/heating equipment, tents, furniture, lighting, cold weather gear for staff/patrons, and more. General Updates

- Waste Management Update. In October, Fruita residents recycled 53 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! Full report can be found below.
- **Fruita for Equality Event.** On November 14, 2020, Fruita for Equality will be hosting an online event on the topic of implicit bias and how it relates to perceptions about race. For more information, and to register for the event, you can visit the Mesa County Public Library's website here.
- **Resources on Veteran's Day.** In light of Veteran's Day next week, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs has released a teaching guide on the holiday. That guide can be found here, and provides great information on the holiday and more.

Engineering

- Coloramo opened their new facility this week.
- A contract was executed and a Notice to Proceed was issued by CDOT to the City for the Active Circulation Plan.
- Traffic counters are out collecting data for the Fremont Street design project.
- The City received the 2020 bridge inspection reports for the 7 off-system bridges in the City of Fruita. 2 bridges remain with load restrictions, Maple St. at Little Salt Wash and Fremont St. at Little Salt Wash.

Parks and Recreation

- This week, the Fruita Community Center received a 5-star facility rating from the Mesa County's
 Variance Protection Program! This rating recognizes the Community Center's commitment to
 protecting our community from the virus and allows the facility to operate at greater capacity
 limits despite the change in phase (from down to Safer at Home). Thank you to Mesa County for
 this recognition, and all of the staff for their hard work during the pandemic.
- FCC staff have been working with MCPH to determine operating procedures for the recreation center. With the 5-star rating, the FCC is allowed a little more flexibility in operations and

- patron usage. Staff has consistently been working hard to provide a clean and safe facility for our community
- Staff has been preparing for Draft PHROST Master Plan presentations to the Steering Committee as well as our health, local school and Fruita youth Initiative partners. The meetings have been moved to a virtual format and are scheduled on Monday and Tuesday, November 16th and 17th.
- Parks staff participated in a virtual Colorado Community Forestry Conference where we learned more about tree inventorying which we have been doing for the past couple of months.

- Building maintenance will begin contracting out some of the custodial cleaning services at the
 Civic Center and Police Department starting next week now that seasonal employees are no
 longer able to assist with this. The proposed 2021 budget includes hiring a full-time custodian
 after the first of the year.
- Downtown heaters for the temporary outdoor dining areas were functional starting this past weekend. Road crews will be monitoring and refilling the propane for these 2 times/week.
