#### **Tuesday's City Council Meeting**

Following the continuation of many public hearing items at the last meeting, we have a several items scheduled for Tuesday night. The meeting will begin with proclaiming January 18, 2021 as "Martin Luther King Jr. Day" in the City of Fruita. After that, there is one item on the consent agenda, and that is to approve the minutes from the previous meeting. We have several public hearing items scheduled, including two legislative hearings, and four quasi-judicial hearings. The meeting will conclude with reports and actions, and an Executive Session. 
#### **Coronavirus Update**

- *Update from MCPH on Vaccine Distribution.* This week's newsletter from Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) focused on planning for the COVID-19 vaccine. The full newsletter can be found <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>, but here are a few questions that were addressed:
- Question: Who will get the COVID-19 vaccine first?
- Answer: The Colorado distribution plan prioritizes groups of people who are most likely to get COVID-19. Front-line health care workers, for example, need to receive vaccines so they are able to care for patients who get sick. Priority is given next to people at higher risk because of age, underlying health conditions, frequent contact with the public as part of their job, and those who live in shared living situations where COVID-19 can spread easily.
- Question: I am not in a high-risk group. When will I be able to get vaccinated against COVID-19?

Honor the Past – Envision the Future  $\begin{cases} FRUITA \end{cases}$ 

- Answer: The general public will receive the vaccine after these priority groups, probably sometime in the summer of 2021.
- O Question: Why aren't children prioritized for COVID-19 vaccines?
  - Answer: Safety and effectiveness data from clinical trial is still needed before the vaccines are available for children under 16.
- Additionally, from MCPH: In Mesa County, 35 sites have signed up to distribute vaccines, including local pharmacies, health provider offices, and hospitals. In addition, the Mesa County Public Health Clinic will stock and have the vaccine available for distribution as outlined in the phases (graphic is below). Cost will not be an obstacle to getting the vaccine for Coloradans. Medicare, Medicaid, CHP+ and private insurance will all cover the cost of COVID-19 vaccines, and uninsured Coloradans will have access to free vaccines.
- **COVID Relief Package.** Staff continues to monitor the federal legislation regarding the COVID Relief Package. We will provide an overview once it is finalized. In the initial version, a few items to note, there is additional funding for the Paycheck Protection Program and Economic Impact Disaster Loans, updated guidance on the use of Coronavirus Relief Funds, and direct payments to eligible individuals and families.
- Updated Vaccine Timeline. Also, this week, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment released an updated COVID-19 vaccine distribution timeline to include new populations eligible for the vaccine in the first phase. #### **Parks and Recreation**

- The Fruita Community Center will be closing at 5pm on New Year's Eve and closed on New Year's Day.
- In anticipation of an increase in attendance after the new year, we may return to utilizing SignUpGenius for the fitness area upstairs at the Fruita Community Center. The current capacity for that space is 25 individuals and due to potential New Year's resolutions, we could reach capacity. Staff will monitor attendance, but patrons should be prepared for the return of SignUpGenius reservation system for 1 hour time blocks. We would continue to allow drop-ins only if we are within capacity limits, with registrants having priority. We will announce any changes on our Facebook page as well as the Fruita Parks and Recreation webpage.
- The indoor pool will be closed for a few days starting January 11 to repair the indoor circulation pump. The repair should only take three days and we should reopen the pool on Thursday of that week.
