Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday will begin with proclaiming April 30, 2021 as Arbor Day in the City of Fruita. Following that, there are four items on the consent agenda, and two quasi-judicial hearings regarding short-term rentals (one withdrawing an application and the other applying for a conditional use permit). After those hearings, staff will present the final version of the Parks, Health, Recreation, Open Space and Trails ("PHROST") Master Plan. We are excited to share this final version of the plan and want to thank everyone that has been involved in the planning process. We will conclude the meeting with the City Manager's update, which will include introducing the new Public Works Director. This meeting will be held virtually.

Coronavirus Update

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow www.fruita.org/covid19 for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- Vaccine Eligibility. Beginning tomorrow, April 2, 2021, vaccine eligibility has now been expanded to the general public. Coloradans aged 16 and up are eligible to receive Pfizer Vaccine and those 18 and up are eligible for the Moderna and the Johnson and Johnson Vaccine. If you are interested in receiving a COVID-19 vaccine, you can sign up at Mesa County Public Health's website here, or through local pharmacies.
- Testing Sites Change. Effective next Tuesday, testing for COVID-19 at the Mesa County Fairgrounds will be moved to the Mesa County Public Health building at 29 ½ Road and North Avenue. In addition to getting tested at the MCPH building, people can still get tested at Colorado Mesa University, Fruita Monument High School, Grand Mesa Middle School, and the Peachtree Shopping Center. General Updates

- **Community Survey.** The Community Survey has been finalized and has been sent to print. We anticipate that residents should start receiving the survey next week or shortly after that. The survey is being mailed to all residential households, and we encourage all to participate. We will provide an additional update on this next week. We are putting together a short video invite from the Mayor encouraging all residents to participate.
- **Public Works Director.** We want to welcome Kimberly Bullen to the City of Fruita! Kimberly started today as the Public Works Director and brings an extensive amount of local government experience and expertise to the position. Kimberly is going to be a great addition to our leadership team, and we look forward to working with her. Welcome Kimberly!
- Food Bank Grant. Earlier this year, the City of Fruita provided Food Bank of the Rockies with a \$10,000 grant to help with increased need for food for Fruita families during the pandemic. Through leveraging other grants and donations, Food Bank of the Rockies estimates that for every \$1 donated, the organization can provide four meals. With that, it can be estimated that our grant aided in 40,000 meals for Fruita Area Food Banks. We are thankful for this partnership and all of their efforts during this past difficult year. If interested in reading, Food Bank of the Rockies provided us with a thank you letter for the grant, and that letter can be found below.
- Main Street Program. This week, the City of Fruita was accepted into the Colorado Main Street program as an affiliate member. The Main Street Program offers support for community-led downtown revitalization, and helps communities identify opportunities, resources, and programs available to help with goals. After hearing more about the Main Street Program, the Downtown Advisory Board expressed interest in joining and learning more about it. We look forward to this partnership and are excited about the opportunity to participate! More information about the program can be found here.

- **Roundabouts Update.** The setting of the first two sculptures is planned to be completed for the Highway 340 Roundabouts next week. The remaining sculptures will be completed and installed by late summer.
- Ash Street Project. The Ash St. trench will be paved next week finalizing that project.
- Maple Street Sewer. Sorter has constructed the sewer main and all but one sewer service on Maple Street south of Aspen Ave.

- North Fruita Desert Progress. Staff has been working with BLM, COPMOBA, Mesa County Public

 performed this Spring. The intention is complete all survey work, have BLM obtain NEPA
 approval and apply for a CPW construction grant in the Fall of 2021 with the hope of building
 new trail in 2022-2024.
