Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday night will begin with two presentations — the first from the Fruita Arts and Culture Board updating the Council on the Wellspring Project, and the second, on the results of the 2021 Fruita Community Survey. After those presentations, the Council will consider four items on the consent agenda and move on to four public hearing items. The four quasi-judicial hearings involve two planning and developments items, and two liquor license related applications. We will conclude the meeting with rescheduling our August workshop due to a conflict with a Town Hall meeting with the Mesa County Commissioners.

Coronavirus Update

- Mobile Vaccine Clinic Returning to Fruita Saturday. The Mobile Vaccination Clinic will be returning to the Fruita Civic Center tomorrow from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. First and second doses of the Pfizer and single dose Johnson and Johnson vaccines will be available, and the vaccine is completely free, and no insurance or photo ID is required. More information is available here.
- Vaccine Update from MCPH. Provided here are a few of the notes from the latest Mesa County Public Health weekly vaccine update. The full update is available here.
- As of week, ending May 22, 2021, 99,367 vaccines have been administered. A vaccine dashboard is updated weekly on the MCPH website.
- Widespread vaccination is a critical tool to help stop the pandemic. People who are fully vaccinated can resume activities that they did prior to the pandemic. Learn

- The Mesa County Community Vaccination Site (CVS) is located at the Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) building at 510 29 1/2 Rd.
 - Hours of operation are Wednesday through Friday from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
 - Next-day appointments are available for COVID-19 vaccination, visit the MCPH website for vaccine scheduling links available in English and Spanish.
- o Children 12 years and older are able to get the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine.
 - MCPH administers Pfizer vaccine Wednesdays and Saturdays. The scheduling website will only allow appointments for this age group on scheduled Pfizer days, and a parent or guardian must be present at the vaccine appointment.
- *First Pediatric COVID-19 Related Death in Mesa County.* Unfortunately, this week, MCPH was notified of a pediatric death related to COVID-19. We want to share our deepest sympathy to the child's family and friends. The full release is available here.

- Las Colonias Ribbon Cutting Celebration. A group of us were able to attend the celebration yesterday to support our neighboring City.
- Field Trip to Moon Farm. Thanks to all of you who were able to attend the field trip to Moon
 Farm Tuesday evening and learn about the Grand Valley Equine Assisted Learning Center's
 services. We have begun to identify if there are possible funding sources in external grant
 sources.
- Fruita Area Chamber of Commerce Member Appreciation Lunch. Thanks to the Fruita Chamber for hosting their annual lunch. Many staff were able to attend and enjoy catching up with local businesses.
- *Palisade Plunge*. Congratulations to the Town of Palisade, COBMOBA, and our federal land partners, on the opening of the first section of the Palisade Plunge! Beginning tomorrow, riders can now ride the final 18 miles of the trail, and the full trail is expected to open sometime during the summer. The Palisade Plunge is going to be an incredible asset for the Grand Valley, and we are excited for its opening.

- Basin Roundtables. On June 16, 2021 at 1:00 p.m., the Colorado Water Conservation Board (of the Co. Dept. Of Natural Resources) will be hosting a roundtable discussion on water management issues and the Demand Management program. Staff is planning on participating in these roundtables, but if any members of the Council are interested, please let me know.

Engineering

- Mesa County Chip Seal Project. Traffic Update from May 31 to June 4 the Mesa County chip seal project will take place at the following four locations: US Hwy 6 from Mile Point 11 to MP 20, CO Highway 139 from MP 0 to MP 6, US 50 Front Road from MP 33.8 to 36.2 and CO 141 from MP 120 to MP 154. Motorists should plan for minimal delays on US 6 with east and westbound one-late alternating traffic. More information on the project can be found here.
- *Iron Wheel Subdivision.* J Road should be open for this weekend, but 19 Road will continue to be close to through traffic until the waterline, sewer line work, and paving operations are complete.
- Big Salt Wash Trail Connections. Concrete work is complete for the trail connections to the Big Salt Wash Trail in Santa Fe Ranch, Evening Breeze, Comstock, and Orchard Ridge subdivisions.
- Maple St./Aspen Ave. Sewer Replacement. Sorter Construction has installed about 2/3 of the sewer main in Aspen Avenue through the end of the week.

Police Department

- **Body Worn Cameras Update.** The police department has begun the roll-out of body worn cameras, with 4-5 officers participating in the initial phase.
- **Memorial Day DUI Enforcement.** From CDOT: To combat impaired driving, CDOT, CSP, and local law enforcement agencies will join forces for the Memorial Day DUI enforcement from May 28, 2021 to June 1, 2021. The enforcement period aims to remind Coloradans to celebrate responsibly over the holiday weekend and throughout the summer. We hope that you celebrate the holiday responsibly!

- Graffiti. Crews removed graffiti on Wildcat Avenue
- Grease Update. Crews continue to complete grease inspections in the City's collection system
- Irrigation Assessments. Crews beginning irrigation valve inventory and condition assessment
- H2S Mitigation. Staff met to discuss H2S in collection system and identify next steps.
- **Storm Sewer Cleaning.** Crews are cleaning storm sewers due to elm seeds. Additional work will be scheduled next week for Aspen Avenue and Peach Street.
- **340 Lift Station Repairs.** Crews repaired damaged culvert at 340 Lift Station by extending the culvert and adding a guard rail.
