Tuesday's City Council Workshop Cancelled – Moon Farm Visit Scheduled

Coronavirus Update

• **COVID-19 Vaccination Update.** As always, here are a few updates from Mesa County Public Heath's weekly update on COVID-19 Vaccinations. To view this week's full update, you can visit it <u>here</u>.

• The Mesa County Community Vaccination Site (CVS) is now located at the Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) building at 510 29 1/2 Rd.

- Hours of operation are Wednesday through Friday from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Next-day appointments are available for COVID-19 vaccination, visit the MCPH website for vaccine scheduling links available in <u>English</u> and <u>Spanish</u>.
- The Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine is approved for 12 to 15-year-olds.
- Mesa County Public Health administers Pfizer vaccine on Wednesdays and Saturdays. The scheduling website will only allow appointments for individuals age 12-17 on scheduled Pfizer days, and a parent or guardian must be present at the vaccine appointment.

 Mobile vaccination clinics will return to Mesa County through the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's #PowertheComeback bus beginning May 25.

 First and second doses of the Pfizer and single dose Johnson and Johnson vaccines will be available at locations across Mesa County. More information about dates and locations can be found <u>here</u>.

Fats, Oils, and Grease Issues

The City of Fruita continues to see a significant impact in its' collection system from FOGs. To help encourage the proper disposal of FOGs, staff is in the process of preparing educational materials for residents and business. Here is some information on FOGS and why it is important to dispose of them properly.

- What are "FOGs"? FOGs are fats, oils, and grease from food. Bacon grease, butter, margarine, lard, gravy, shortening, dairy products, fat scraps from meat, mayonnaise, cooking oil, fryer grease, salad dressing, milkshake mix and ice cream are All "FOG".
- How does FOGs get into the sewer system? FOGs enter the plumbing system through your sinks and floor drains AND dishwashers. FOGs stick to and coats the inside of the sewer pipes as seen in the picture.
- Why Should You Care? FOGs can disrupt your home or business which costs you money if you cause or contribute to a grease blockage in the sewer system. Fats, oils and grease clogging up the sewer pipes cause sewer overflows and raw sewage is a health hazard. FOGs will further increase the costs of the City's sewer services.
- How Can You Help? Kitchen grease control Best Management Practices (BMP) are inexpensive alternatives that can drastically reduce the amounts of gats, oils and grease (FOG) that enter the sewer system. For home or business:
 - Do NOT pour any grease, dairy products, milk shake syrups, cake icing, batters or gravy into sinks, floor drains or mop sinks. Instead, dispose of to an approved container, and do not dispose of to any storm water grate, drain or conveyance.
 - Use strainers in sink drains and floor drains to prevent large food particles from going into the sewer line.
 - Manually scrape and/or wipe off into a trash receptacle all visible accumulations of fat, oil, grease, and food residue from dishes, cookware and utensils.
 - In addition, businesses can:
 - Post "NO GREASE" signs above all kitchen sinks to remind employees.
 - After wiping, hot-rinse with a sprayer all dishes, cookware and utensils in a sink compartment that is plumbed to a grease interceptor before handwashing with detergent or placing in the dishwashing machine.
 - Do not allow an exhaust hood cleaner to discharge greasy water into your floor drains or outdoor drains.
 - Use paper towels to wipe down work areas. Use food grade paper to soak up oil and grease under fryer baskets.
 - Be sure you have a contract for grease interceptor cleaning and keep a file of all receipts.

• **Co2UT Race.** Heads up Fruita! Tomorrow, is the first Co2UT (Colorado to Utah) gravel bike race. There are 1,200 riders signed up for the event for five different races (ranging from 30 miles to a 185 miles). Each race starts in downtown Fruita, and riders will be heading up Maple Street (17.50 Road) before riding north on 18 Road to the desert. If you heading to downtown Fruita tomorrow morning, expect delays due to the event. Good luck to the riders! More information on the races can be found <u>here</u>.

- **SOTC Video.** The 2021 Fruita State of the City video is complete, and we are excited to share it sometime early next week. The video highlights several stories to celebrate some of the community's accomplishments during the past year. - *Class of 2021.* Congratulations to all of the D51 students that graduated this week!
- **Community Survey.** The 2021 Community Survey has closed. Thank you to all that participated in the survey! ETC Institute, the consultant administering the survey, is still scheduled to present the results to the City Council at the June 1st meeting.
- **Coffee with the City Manager.** Thank you to Dr. Korrey Klein for joining me at the Coffee with the City Manager on Thursday morning. We had a small group join us for coffee and discussed many of issues facing Family Health West and the current projects for the City of Fruita, as well as a detailed discussion on COVID-19 moving forward. Thank you to all who came out for the discussion! Our next event with on June 10, 2021, at 5:00 p.m. at the Copper Club Brewery, and I will be joined by Assistant Superintendent of School District #51, Dr. Brian Hill.
- State of the Grand Valley. On Wednesday, Mayor Kincaid and I joined several of our partner agencies as speakers at the Grand Junction Chamber of Commerce State of the Grand Valley Luncheon. We discussed the economic outlook of Fruita during the pandemic and looking ahead, affordable/attainable housing, the progress of our long-term planning efforts, and current projects to implement the goals and values identified in those master plans.
- Summer Bus Pass Program for High School Students. The Mesa County Workforce Center and Grand Valley Transit (GVT) are partnering this summer to help teens go to work, classes, camps, or spend time with friends. D51 high school students can ride a GVT-Fixed Route free from May 21, 2021 to August 31, 2021, all that is required is a GVT sticker on their school student ID. GVT stickers are available at D51 High School Officers and at the D51 Administration office.
- **Continued Decline in UIB Claims and Return to Work Incentive.** On Thursday, the Colorado Dept. Of Labor released a press release announcing a continued decline in initial unemployment claims and a return-to-work incentive. The release can be found at this <u>link</u>.
- **REDI Grant.** Today, staff submitted a REDI (rural economic development initiative) grant application through the Department of Local Affairs to help fund a process to determine what it would take to transition the temporary outdoor space on Mulberry St. into a permanent plaza. This would include engaging the public and having the information necessary to make decisions on whether or not to keep such a space long-term. Awards for the grant will be announced mid to late July. The City recently received a REDI grant to help with the maintenance costs of the two outdoor dining spaces over the winter.

Engineering

• *Mesa County Chip Seal Project.* Next week, May 24 to 28, the Mesa County chip seal project will take place at the following four locations: US highway 6 from Mile Point 11 to MP 20, CO Highway 190 from MP 0 to MP 6, US 50 Frontage Road from MP 33.8 to 36.2, and CO 141 from

MP 120 to 154. For the week, motorists should plan for alternating traffic and minimal delays. Work will consist of removing the old epoxy striping and replacing it with a temporary paint during construction. For more information, you can visit the project website <u>here</u>.

Parks and Recreation

- **Outdoor Pool Update.** The Outdoor Pool at the Fruita Community Center has been losing water over the day / night. Staff has been troubleshooting to determine where the leak is occurring. At this point, the leak has not been found and a Leak Detection company out of Cederedge is scheduled to come in on Tuesday next week to find it. While there is a leak, we are still able to open the pool tomorrow, on Saturday for the community to enjoy.
- **Presentation to FYAC.** Staff presented the PHROST Master Plan to members of the Fruita Youth Action Council. The intent was to get the students thinking about the issues and plans that Parks and Recreation has for the coming years and helping us determine solutions. The main take away was that the youth would help determine potentially successful programs and activities for middle and high school students.
