Coronavirus Update

Below are a few updates, but I would strongly encourage all to continue to follow www.fruita.org/covid19 for all updates we are posting. This also links to important Mesa County Public Health sources, as well as many others.

- MCPH Announces Big Shot Giveaway to Encourage COVID-19 Vaccination. This week, Mesa County Public Health announced a community vaccination effort in the form of a cash incentive campaign. Cash prizes, including twice a week \$500 dollar prizes and a grand prize that could up to \$90,000 is up for grabs. Plus, unlike any other contest, the more people who are vaccinated the bigger the prize. For more information from MCPH, including how to enter, you can visit the release here.
- *MCPH Weekly Vaccination Update.* Every Thursday, MCPH posts a vaccination update. This week's report can be found at this link, and here are a few highlights from it:
- Individuals may enter the Big Shot giveaway in addition to the Colorado
 Comeback Cash initiative through the State of Colorado, the first \$1 million Colorado
 Comeback Cash winner will be announced Friday, June 4.
- Widespread vaccination is a critical tool to help stop the pandemic. People who
 are fully vaccinated can resume activities that they did prior to the pandemic. Learn
 more about what you and your child or teen can do when you have been fully
 vaccinated.
- The Mesa County Community Vaccination Site (CVS) is located at the Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) building at 510 29 1/2 Rd.
- Hours of operation are Wednesday through Friday from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Next-day appointments are available for COVID-19 vaccination, visit the MCPH website for vaccine scheduling links available in English and Spanish.
- Children 12 years and older are able to get the <u>Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19</u>
 Vaccine.
- MCPH administers Pfizer vaccine Wednesdays and Saturdays. The scheduling website will only allow appointments for this age group on scheduled Pfizer days, and a parent or guardian must be present at the vaccine appointment.

 Approximately 38% of Mesa County residents age 12 and older are fully vaccinated, meaning they have received both doses in a two-dose series, or a single dose vaccine.

2021 Fruita Community Survey Results

Thank you to all of the residents that participated in the 2021 Fruita Community Survey! The results of the survey are now available and show that residents have a very positive perception of the city. 93% of residents rated the quality of life in Fruit as "excellent" or "good", and 84% rated the quality of services as "excellent" or "good". Fruita also rated above the United States average in 32 of the 37 areas that were assessed, and the satisfaction with the overall quality of services rated 25% above the U.S. average and the overall value received for taxes/fees rated 21% about the U.S. average. Results of the survey will be used to inform decision making and to identify budget priorities moving forward. The full report and the presentation that was delivered to the City Council can be found at this Link, and highlights from the survey include:

- 93% of those survey indicated rated the overall quality of life in Fruita as excellent or good.
- 85% of the respondents indicated that the overall feeing of safety in Fruita was excellent or good.
- 84% of participants gave excellent or good ratings for the quality of services provided.
- 93% of respondents stated that the "small town atmosphere" needs are very well met or met, as a reason to live in Fruita.
- The major categories of city services that had the highest levels of satisfaction were the overall quality of garbage collection (92% very satisfied or satisfied), the quality of sewer service (81% at least satisfied), the overall quality of City parks (79% very satisfied or satisfied), and police services (78%).
- The overall value of services received for taxes and fees rated 21% above the U.S. average.
- When asked if the City Council should add a question permitting the retail sale of cannabis in Fruita on the April 2022 ballot, 55% of respondents answered no, while 45% answered yes. Out of those 45% that voted yes, 9% stated they would not vote for a question permitting the retail sale.

- Waste Management Report. In May 2021, Fruita residents recycled 51 tons of cans, bottles, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! See summary report below.

- **CPW Commission Meeting.** If interested in attending, Colorado Parks and Wildlife will be hosting a hybrid virtual/in-person meeting on June 10th and June 11th to hear an update on wolf reintroduction planning best management practice for solar power, and a timeline on big game license allocation and preference points. - SHIFT. The SHIFT Summit, annually held in Jackson Hole, WY, which then Mayor Buck and I attended when Lori was a speaker, approached us about hosting in the Valley. Due to the size and needs for venues, we worked with our Valley partners and it will now be held in Grand Junction in 2021, October 18-20. We are on the planning committee and will likely assist with excursions and sessions. The theme is Ensuring Access to Nature—For Human Health and the Environment. This annual Summit brings together researchers, funders, educators, retailers, and conservationists, along with outdoor recreation, health, military, and nature therapy professionals who share experiences, evidence, and ideas for better linking of both humans and nature. - Landfill Delays. Just a heads up, construction on a new inbound scale began this week at the Mesa County landfill and delays are expected. It is anticipated that the construction will take around one week to complete. The full release can be found here.

Engineering

- **BSW Trail Connections Project.** Big Salt Wash Trail connections should be completed with landscape rock by early next week.
- 19 Road Update. 19 Road remains closed for waterline work associated with Iron Wheel Subdivision.
- **Aspen Street Closure.** Aspen Avenue Sewer continues. Sorter is nearing the last manhole at Ash St and will begin to connect the sewer services along the south side and finish up with paving. This work will likely continue for 3-4 weeks.

Parks and Recreation

- **FCC Facilities Update.** The Fruita Community Center is mostly back in order on May 30th all fitness equipment was moved back into its original location. Fitness classes have moved back into the group exercise room, RecRats reopened on Tuesday, June 1st (Mon Fri, morning hours only) and on June 7th the Senior Center will reopen with limited hours.
- *FCC Visitation Update.* The FCC had 11,610 visits this year compared to 329 in 2020 and 14,873 in 2019. This year's May visitation at the FCC was at 78% of June 2019 woohoo. See report below.
- **Outdoor Pool.** Staff has been working diligently on locating the leak in the outdoor pool and we now believe the leak may be in the auto-fill line to the pool. If this is the case, we can cap that line and fill the pool manually for the summer and maintain our operations as normal.
- **Programming Update.** This week Little Salt Wash Park hosted the FMHS baseball camp for youth and this coming weekend it will host a Triple Crown Baseball Tournament at Little Salt Wash Park. Busy, Busy...
- Concerts Return Next Week. The Thursday Night Summer Concert Series start on Thursday, June 10th at Civic Center Park. Please note there is a change in entertainment. Instead of the Williams Brothers Band, the Lincoln Pants Band (Jam Rock) will be kicking off our season. Staff will be getting the word out to the community early next week.

Public Works

- Grease Update. Public Works staff continue to see grease problems in the City's sewer system, and has prepared education materials for residents and businesses on how to properly dispose of grease and other materials. Here is the latest update:
 - WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH GREASE IN YOUR SEWER SYSTEM? When you pour leftover grease from cooking down your sink drain, you are introducing a damaging substance to your sewer system. Grease leaves residue on your pipes and congeals with other waste particles further down the line, causing blockages. These blockages lead to sewer backups, floods, and contamination of your sewer system that requires costly repair.
 - O HIDDEN GREASE AND HOW TO DISPOSE OF IT. Grease leftover from cooking is obvious, but did you know grease can be found in a variety of foods? Salad dressings, mayonnaise, cheese, frosting, and even milk carry harmful grease. It is best to scrape these items into your garbage can than pour them down the drain. If you have grease left in your cooking pan, let it cool down so it congeals and becomes easier to throw away.
- **Summer School Schedules.** Staff updated the safe routes to schools program to meet summer school schedule.
- **Dinosaur Museum Updates.** Traffic Safety staff Installed a van accessible handicap parking at Dinosaur Museum.

Avoided 141 Metric Tons (MTCO2E) of GHG Emissions


The recycling of these materials prevented these GHG emissions!
