Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday will begin with proclaiming September 2021 as "Hunger Action Month" in the City of Fruita. After that, there are six items on the consent agenda, and one legislative hearing item regarding budget amendments. After that, the Council will consider four quasi-judicial hearings on special event liquor permits and will receive an update on the Total Daily Maximum Loads (TMDLs) from Public Works and our City Attorney. The meeting will conclude with the formal review of the City Attorney.

MTHC Festival Recap



It was a fun weekend at the Mike the Headless Chicken Festival last week! It was great to see the community enjoy the activities and to have the festival back. A few

highlights from the festival – 252 runners participated in the "Run Like Your Head is Cut Off" 5K, 39 people participated in the Disc Golf Tournament, there were 139 cars on display at the Wheels West Car Show, and 179 chickens at the chicken show at the Civic Center. The MTHC shirts sold out on the first night, and the store sold more than \$17,000 of MTHC merchandise. Thank you to all of the vendors, staff, volunteers, and of course the community, for coming out and making this another memorable festival.

Localized Flooding Following Rain

Early on Thursday morning, Public Works crews responded to reports of flooding in Holly Park following the rain. Crews began pumping the water out of the area early in the morning around 7:30 a.m., pumping approximately 250,000 gallons. On Wednesday, the U.S. National Weather Service office in Grand Junction estimated that the area received 0.76 inches of rain, which broke the previous daily record for rainfall on that day. Whenever the area receives that much rain, it is anticipated that there will be some localized flooding. Public Works and Engineering will continue to investigate the cause of the flooding and may CCTV (closed circuit television inspection) to inspect the lines to see if there are any blockages/issues.

General Updates

- Coffee with the City Manager. A reminder, I will be hosting a Coffee with the City Manager at
 Aspen Street Coffee next Thursday (September 9, 2021) at 8:00 a.m. I will be joined by Chief
 Cavalier of the Lower Valley Fire Department. As always, these events are an opportunity for
 residents to come and ask questions and have a casual discussion with City officials.
- **COVID-19 Update.** No COVID-19 update this week we hope that you all have a safe Labor Day weekend!
- GOCO Application. This week, with the help of Ross Mittelman from Mesa County Public Health, we submitted a small grant to Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) for four weeks of trailing building at the North Fruita Desert. If the grant is awarded, GOCO will pay for a conservation corps group to complete the work. We estimate that in the four weeks, around 4 miles of new trail can be constructed. Decisions will be made in December, and we will keep the Council updated on the status of the grant.
- *Open Burning Season.* From MCPH: Fall Open Burn Seasons began on September 1 and runs through October 1 in Mesa County. Permits for everyone in the County are issued by Mesa County Public Health. Once a permit is obtained, residents must monitor weather and other safety alerts to ensure burning happens on days where the conditions are favorable for smoke dispersal and suitable conditions for fire safety. A permit is not valid if there is a red-flag warning, fire restriction, or an air quality alert in place. More information from the County can be found here.
- **Food Truck Friday Canceled.** Just a heads up, Food Truck Friday at Reed Park tonight has been canceled. Upcoming dates can be found on the Grand Valley Food Truck Facebook page here.

• **Pine Street Bridge**. Public Works crews potholed utilities this week to identify any conflicts and so the design could progress to completion. Anticipate a final design by the end of September.

- Active Circulation Plan. All public input has been received and the online survey has closed. We anticipate a draft in the middle of October.
- *Fremont St. Design.* Anticipate 90% drawings by the end of September and working on scheduling a review with CDOT.
- **CDOT Wrong Way Detection.** Crews were in this week installing bases for new signage on the ramps at I-70 and Hwy 340. Signage will be installed in the coming weeks.
