



Land Use Code Update Adopted by Fruita City Council

For the past year and a half, the City of Fruita has been in the process of updating its Land Use Code and Design Standards for residential and commercial development. The update was recently adopted by the Fruita City Council and the changes reflect the vision, goals and values set forth by the community in the Comprehensive Master Plan *Fruita in Motion*. The Comprehensive Plan was formally adopted by the Fruita City Council in February of 2020. The values and goals identified in *Fruita in Motion* were a result of community feedback during the extensive year-long engagement process that took place in 2019. While creating the plan, the City of Fruita hosted over 30 in-person public engagement opportunities in addition to online exchanges and we genuinely appreciate the invaluable input we received

from residents, businesses and partners.

The Land Use Code update reflects the very same public engagement and the community's vision for Fruita for the next decade. The update focused on zoning uses and

general requirements, the official zoning map for the City, density bonuses, design standards, parking standards and short-term rentals. These amendments to the Land Use Code not only make the Code more consistent with

the Community Plan, but also simplify the development process by incorporating administrative flexibility.

City Election News 2022

The next regular City election will be held on April 5, 2022. The election will be conducted by mail ballot and ballots will be sent out to registered voters in mid-March 2022. The ballot will include the election of one Mayor for a two-year term and three City Council members for four-year terms each.

CITY COUNCIL AND MAYOR

This is a great time to start thinking about getting involved in the Fruita community as an elected official. The best part about local politics is that you really do get to make a difference in the place that you live.

The City of Fruita is a Home Rule City with a Council-Manager form of government. The six-member elected City Council makes policy decisions and enacts legislation while a professional City Manager carries out the Council's policies and administers the city government. The Mayor

is the political head of city government, presiding over City Council meetings, representing the City at public functions and exercising other powers. In order to be eligible to hold office as Mayor or as a member of the City Council, you must be at least 21 years old and a registered voter residing in the City of Fruita. Nomination petitions for the Council and Mayor positions may be picked up at the City Clerk's office on or after January 4, 2022. The nomination petition requires signatures from 25 registered voters of the City of Fruita. Completed petitions must be filed with the Fruita City Clerk's Office by January 24, 2022. Additional information is available from the City Clerk's office.

Save Time and Money by Signing up for Automatic Payments for Utility Bills

As a reminder, the City of Fruita offers several convenient ways to pay your utility bill. Residents can pay online at Fruita.org and in person at the Fruita Civic Center, but a small convenience fee is applied if the payment is made with a credit/debit card. To save time and money, residents can sign up for automatic and recurring payments from a designated bank account. Your payment will be

automatically deducted from your account on the 5th of each month (or the day after if the 5th falls on a weekend or a holiday).

You do not need a Ring device to join Neighbors; anyone with a smartphone can download the Neighbors App in order to receive updates and have the option to post photos or videos from any device.
