Tuesday's City Council Meeting

Our meeting on Tuesday will begin with recognizing the students and staff members of the month for January at Fruita Middle School. After that, the Council will consider eight items on the consent agenda before moving to manager and council updates, concluding with public hearings. We have two public hearings scheduled, the first on a special event liquor license application and the second on a planning and development application. Highway 6&50 Sewer Replacement Project Update

Work started this week on the Hwy 6&50 Sewer Replacement Project. The contractor installed the first two manholes and enough pipe to continue through the parking lot of Fiesta Guadalajara. Wave's drive-through is open again but it's a tight fit, so caution is still needed for vehicles. Plum St. is mostly complete but intermittent closures will continue for at least another week. Vehicular access to businesses along Highway 6 & 50 will be open either from Plum St. or Mesa St. this weekend but expect intermittent full closures on Plum St. and Mesa St. next week as construction progresses. Walk-up traffic to both Wave and Fiesta Guadalajara is and will remain open.

General Updates

• *Financial Reports.* In November of 2021, sales tax collections continued to be strong both locally and regionally. City sales tax in November were up 12% from the previous year, and is still trending about 15% higher than 2020. Use taxes on motor vehicles were up 94% (up 22% year-to-date when compared to 2020), use taxes on building materials was down 100% (trending at an 8% decrease from 2020), and lodging taxes were up 49% (trending 95% above 2020). County sales taxes were also up and increased 19% from the previous year and up 21% year-to-date. Honor the Past – Envision the Future FRUITA

- Mesa County Economic Development First Responders. This week our regional team kicked off phase 2 working with Economic Planning Solutions as our consultant (paid for by the state in the program) to work on economic development strategies to leverage county-wide resources to bolster activity countywide.
- **December Waste Management Report.** In December 2021, Fruita residents recycled 56 tons of bottles, cans, paper and cardboard. Great job Fruita! Throughout 2021, Fruita residents recycled 621 tons of recyclable material. The full reports from Waste Management (from December and 2021) can be found below.
- Mesa County Records Highest Daily COVID-19 Case Count Since the Beginning of the Pandemic. From Mesa County Public Health (MCPH) on Tuesday – Mesa County has seen a recent significant spike in COVID-19 transmission and cases. On January 9, 2022, 532 cases were reported. That is the highest single-day case total. Previously, the most cases reported in a single day was 322 in November 2020. MCPH continues to urge prevention methods in a layered (the more, the better) approach for all Mesa County residents, regardless of vaccination status. All Mesa County residents are asked to stay home and do not go to work, childcare, public places, or gatherings if you have symptoms of any kind, even if you are vaccinated. If you have symptoms, even if they seem mild, please get a COVID-19 test. The full report from MCPH can be found here.
- Grand Junction Mountain Bike and Film Festival. Last week, the Greater Grand Junction Sports Commission announced the inaugural "Grand Junction Mountain Bike and Music Festival" event. The festival will take place on May 20-22, 2022, and more information can be found <u>here</u>. It includes several different races, including 15 miles, 30 miles, and 40 miles, in different categories. We look forward to seeing this event! If you are interested in participating, there is a special "locals only" registration scheduled to take place on Monday, January 24th, at Ramblebine Brewery from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Engineering

- **2022** Chipseal Project. The 2021 Chipseal Project will go out to bid on February 18th. More information will be available on the City's website in the coming days.
- **2022 Street Striping Project.** Street striping for 2022 will also go out for bids on February 18th. The city historically refreshes all the striping in the city annually. In 2021, with the shortages of paint, the city opted to skip a year and plan for a refresh in 2022.

Marketing and Promotion

- **Bookends of the Grand Valley Digital Marketing Campaign.** Staff is working on closing out the grant from the Colorado Tourism Office (CTO) for the "Bookends of the Grand Valley" digital advertising campaign with the Town of Palisade. The campaign was highly successful, and the digital advertisements ran from April December of last year. We received the data from the campaign this week, and here is a summary of it:
 - 6.3 million total impressions of the digital advertisements (1.9 million for Fruita specific advertisements, 1.2 million for Palisade, and 3.2 million for combined advertisements).
 - 5,465 combined clicks on advertisements for people to learn more information and send them to our joint website.

- Conversions the contractor shared that 1,615 people confirmed travel to the area and estimates that they spent \$121,000.
- The total amount spent on the campaign was \$42,000, and the costs were shared between Fruita, Palisade, and the CTO Grant. Overall, a very successful campaign! Staff will continue to work with Palisade on upcoming partnership efforts to leverage resources for marketing and promotion.

Parks and Recreation

- **Night at the FCC Canceled.** Unfortunately, due to the rising COVID-19 cases in the community, we have decided to cancel the January 21, 2022, Night at the FCC. The next one is scheduled for March 4, 2022.
- **Bimonthly Parks and Rec Newsletter.** The latest edition of the bimonthly Fruita Parks and Recreation newsletter can be found <u>here</u>, and it includes updated hours at the Fruita Community Center, upcoming youth and adult programming, information on the Sweetheart Run, and more.
- **CARA Basketball Challenge.** The Cara Basketball Skills Challenge (formally known as the Denver Nuggets Skills Challenge) is tomorrow, January 15th, at the Fruita Community Center. This event is open for ages 6-13 and is free to attend and participate. Registration opens at 8:30 a.m. tomorrow.
- **Fishing is Fun Day.** The Fishing is Fun event, which was postponed in the fall, is now scheduled for Saturday, April 2, 2022. Join us at Snooks Bottom for two hours of fishing@ More information can be found <u>here</u>.
- *Easter Egg Scramble.* The Easter Egg Scramble will be on April 13, 2022, at the Fruita Community Center, 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. As always, this event is free to attend.
- Youth Co-ed Volleyball and Youth Basketball. Practices begin next week with the first games taking place on January 29th.

Public Works

- **Road Maintenance Update.** Road Maintenance crew continued to work on clearing icy conditions throughout the city and responded to snow and ice issues. Completed cold patching on 19 Road repairing several potholes that developed due to the moisture and freezing temperature conditions. Crews are working on Hwy 6 sewer replacement project to deliver pipe and fittings when contractor is ready for material.
- **Building Maintenance Update.** Building Maintenance staff continue to monitor HVAC unit temperatures at the Civic Center, painted the storage room at the Civic Center. Currently working on obtaining quotes for several items at the PW Shop.
- *Fleet Maintenance Update.* Fleet Maintenance staff completed several maintenance items, repaired mag leaks, responded to the WWRF for genset.
- **Collections Update.** Collections crew has spent time training this week, hauled grease from I-70 lift station, cleaned John's Manville force main and updated backflush fittings, submitted updated sewer material list and completed maintenance on bypass pump on Hwy. 6 and completed 13 utility locates.
- *Wastewater Update.* Wastewater Treatment staff started and continued temperature study, completed biosolids report for the State.
- **Public Works Administration Update.** PW Director met with new employees who started on the Road Maintenance Crew, followed up with software company for work order system, participated in meeting to discuss grant funding opportunities, participated in the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment Permits Webinar and reviewed budget documents with the Road Maintenance Crew.
