Highway 6&50 Sewer Replacement Project Update

Construction on the Highway 6&50 Sewer Project is proceeding in the center and west-bound lanes of highway 6. Currently, Mulberry St. is closed at the highway and will remain closed for approximately 1-2 weeks, depending on construction conditions. Access to the affected businesses between Mulberry St. and Peach St. will continue to be open from the north. The city thanks you for your patience while we work to complete these much-needed sewer improvements.

North Fruita Desert Master Plan – Final NEPA Public Comment Period Open

The public comment period for the North Fruita Desert Trails Master Plan Preliminary Environmental Assessment is now open and online. The public comment period will be open until February 28, 2022 and can be found here. Once the NEPA study is complete, we can move forward with the North Fruita Desert Master Plan.

General Updates

- Kick-Off Meeting for Mulberry Street Outdoor Dining Space. This week, staff and I attended a kick-off meeting with Design Workshop, our consultant hired to plan for the Mulberry Street Outdoor Dining Space. We discussed goals, timelines, and community engagement opportunities for the project. Design Workshop was the consultant for our Land-Use Code update, and we are excited to be working with them on this project.
- *Grant Applications.* Staff turned in two grant applications this week to help offset the costs of potential City capital projects. The first grant application was to the Co. Department of Transportation for the second round of the Revitalizing Main Streets program, for safety improvements to S. Mesa Street (between Circle Park and Hwy 6&50). The second was to help with the costs of purchasing Electric Vehicle Charging Stations at the Fruita Civic Center through the Charge Ahead Colorado program. We hope that through installing two stations here in downtown Fruita, that will encourage electric vehicle owners to shop, eat, and work downtown, while their vehicles are charging. We should know more about the status of each of these grants by the end of next month.

- Housing TAC Meeting. The Housing Strategies Technical Advisory Committee you appointed met this week to receive a presentation from EPS (same as presented to Council Dec. 21 and I summarized in this update following the Dec 21 meeting a couple weeks) and discussed the housing strategies we discussed at the last Council workshop. They had great feedback and areas for EPS to research and vet. We will work with EPS to identify a schedule of milestones and updates in regards to their study and set dates for EPS to update the TAC prior to updates to City Council as the study progresses.
- **Housing Strategies Cont.** As the first EPS study finalizes we are working to summarize the data and efforts the City is researching to address the wage and housing prices gap in Fruita for Fruita workers into a newsletter to all residents. This will take a few weeks to make sure we have the final data.
- *City Link.* Staff is working on the next City Link that will highlight the bios of all candidates for the April 2022 election.
- **2022 Municipal Election.** Candidate bios and photos are posted on the website <u>here</u>. Monday at 6pm is the Candidate Orientation.

Engineering

- North Mulberry Concept and Design Project. Kickoff with the consultants for the project took
 place this week. Staff performed some survey work to collect existing conditions. More to come
 as a schedule for community engagement is developed.
- **2022 Chip Seal.** The annual chip seal project will bid next Friday, (2/11/22).
- 2022 Street Striping. The annual street striping will bid next Friday, (2/11/22).

Public Works

- Building Maintenance Update. Building Maintenance staff is compiling a building assessment for the Civic Center. Grand Mesa Mechanical was called out to service the City Shops welding shop heater.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Road Maintenance staff continues to fill various potholes throughout the City. Traffic Safety staff are working on evaluating and adjusting road signs. The crew is helping supply pipe and parts for the Hwy 6 sewer project. Two of our newest members of the team are attending a two-week CDL course and we wish them the best of luck on their driving test next Friday!
- Fleet Maintenance Update. Fleet staff are continuing multiple services on City vehicles and working on tuning up our summer equipment. They also completed their yearly state fuel inspection.
- **Collections Update.** Collections staff are currently updating standard operating procedures and operational and maintenance manuals for lift stations. Grease from the I-70 lift station was hauled and disposed of. The Collections crew is also helping with the Hwy 6 sewer project by maintaining the bypass pump. 46 utility locates were performed.
- *Irrigation Update.* Irrigation crew continues to prepare for the fast-approaching irrigation season by ordering parts for our canal trash cleaners.
- Wastewater Treatment Update. Wastewater Treatment crew is gearing up for their temperature study. The wastewater superintendent collaborated with Collections on the inflow and infiltration report submittal to the State of Colorado. The crew is currently developing a routine vibration test for motors and pumps and continues servicing equipment.
- PW Administration Update. City departments are working with Dude Solutions for the City's workorder system. PW Director participated in a Cybersecurity presentation for the Wastewater Treatment Facility. Met with Finance Department staff to review utility billing and usage. Participated in a meeting with CDOT to discuss federal grant opportunities for Western Slope CDOT Transit Agencies Local Governments. Preparing a grant application to the Colorado Department of Local Affairs for the sewer system.
