#### Tuesday's City Council Workshop

The focus of this workshop is for the City Manager and City Attorney to orient, provide training, and lead a discussion with City Council focused on general orientation, general Council procedures, open meetings laws, liability, and conflicts of interest. #### Fruita Spring Clean Up Event This Saturday

This Saturday, April 23rd, the City of Fruita is hosting a FREE Spring Clean Up. Fruita residents can drop off items they may want to dispose of at the City Shop (900 Keifer Avenue) from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. A dumpster will be onsite to haul items to the landfill. The city will accept box springs and mattresses but there is a \$25 fee for each that will be collected at the time of drop off. Cash or check accepted. The flyer can be found below.

The following items will not be collected: Aerosol cans, air conditioners, air/gas cylinders, ammunition, antifreeze, asbestos materials, asphalt rubble, batteries, concrete rubble, electronics, engines/motors, fluorescent lights, freezers, freon, fuel tanks, gasoline/grease/oil, hazardous waste, insecticides, items longer than 6', large drums, liquids of any kind, major appliances, medical waste, microwaves, paint/stain, pesticides, refrigerators, road flares, shingles, spa/pool chemicals, tires.

#### **Fruita Fourth Fridays**

The first Fruita Fourth Friday event is today from 5 pm-7:30 pm on Mulberry Street. Local artists will have art for sale and restaurants will be having special sales throughout the evening. These events will take place every fourth Friday until August.

#### CO2UT – Presented by Salsa Cycles - Event in Downtown Saturday

This successful annual gravel bike race is back and racers will be starting and ending at Civic Center Park before and after riding lengths of 30 ("Fruitadens"), 50

("Pterodactyl"), 75 ("Stegosaurus"), 100 ("Triceratops"), or 125 ("Utahraptor") miles through the Bookcliffs. In addition to the start and end of the races, there will be an after party in Civic Center Park as well. Riders will be arriving in the park from 7am – 7pm with the bulk of riders between 12-4pm. Alcohol will be served 11am - 6pm by the Rotary. They expect to have 5 food trucks that will be inside the parking area. There will be 10 porta potties on the east side of the Civic center. Parking for approximately 1500 racers will be at Fruita Monument High School and then folks will ride over to the park. They will ride out and in on Maple St. (17 ½ Rd) which will have a temporary parking lane closure that notice has been provided to residents by the race organizer Desert Gravel. #### **General Updates**

- Waste Management Monthly Report. In March 2022, Fruita residents recycled 56 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full report from Waste Management can be found below.
- Municipalities Dinner. I attended the dinner hosted by Mesa County for all elected officials and
  managers Thursday evening along with Council members Ken Kreie, Heather O'Brien, James
  Williams, Amy Miller and Jeannine Purser and Assistant to the City Manager. We heard
  presentations on the proposed clinic in Palisade, Mesa county's community halls and general
  updates from each town, City, County and school district.
- Beer or Rootbeer with the City Manager. This past Tuesday, we hosted a City Manager engagement event at Copper Club Brewing. We had nine members of the public attend for great conversation on current and future projects. Projects discussed included broadband, the Pine Street Bridge renovation, improvements to sidewalks for accessibility, housing and growth, communications, and updates to city plans including Fruita in Motion, the Circulation Plan, the PHROST Plan, and updates to the land use code. The next City Manager engagement event will be on May 4<sup>th</sup> at 7 a.m. at Civic Center Park, where residents can join me and Mayor Kincaid for a bike ride to celebrate Bike to Work Day!



- Presentation to Coldwell Banker Distinctive Properties. At their invitation, Dan Caris and I
  presented Fruita's comprehensive plan, community values, land use code updates and the
  status of growth in the community to Coldwell Banker Realtors.
- Western Colorado Economic Summit 2022. I will be attending and participating as a speaker/panelist for two sessions Tuesday, April 26, at Grand Junction Economic Partnership's annual Economic Summit. Information on the summit can be found here.
- Grand Valley Career and Job Fair. The Mesa County Workforce Center and Colorado Mesa
  University are teaming up to serve western Colorado by connecting qualified candidates to
  employers in need at the second Grand Valley Career & Job Fair. The event is at Lincoln Park,
  across from the Lincoln Park Barn, on Wednesday, April 27<sup>th</sup>, from 1:00 p.m. 5:00 p.m. With
  over 100 employers attending, job seekers will have a wide variety of full and part-time options
  to choose from. Anyone looking for a job is welcome to attend. The full flyer is provided below.
- **EV Chargers Update.** On Wednesday, staff hosted a site meeting with Xcel Energy to discuss the electrical upgrades needed at the Civic Center to install the two fast electric vehicle chargers, a capital project that is in the 2022 budget. Xcel Energy is going to start work on the design of the electric upgrades, and staff is working with them and the Colorado Energy Office to move forward with the project. Also, in other electric vehicle charger news, installation of the Level II Charging Station at Dinosaur Journey is scheduled to begin on May 2, 2022. Dinosaur Journey also received a grant from the Colorado Energy Office for this project and once completed, this will be the only charging station on the south side of Fruita.
- Mobile Mesa County Newsletter. The latest edition of the Mobile Mesa County newsletter is
  out now, and can be found <a href="here">here</a>. It includes an update on the GVT Saturday Service Reductions,
  information on Grand Valley Bike Month, a community spotlight, and more. It appears that due
  to driver shortages, the Mesa County Regional Transportation Office is proposing to make the

Saturday service reduction permanent indefinitely, as it is currently implemented, and also maintain the reduced Dash Service as well. More information can be found in the newsletter.

- **Question**: Do Parks and Recreation offer scholarship opportunities for recreational sports and activities?
- Answer: Yes! You can fill out an application on our website <a href="here">here</a>. To be eligible, the program participant must be under 18, live in Mesa County, and needs to provide a current free/reduced lunch approved letter from School District 51, or a Medicaid card, Marillac Clinic Card, or a CHP+Card.

#### **Engineering**

- Right of Way Acquisition RFP. The bid/RFP for providing right of way and easement acquisition services for the Maple Street Bridge at Little Salt Wash and Fremont St. From Highway 6 to Wildcat Ave. Closes today at 5 pm. There are a few responses, but we will not know the final total number of responses until after 5 pm today. An updated number will be provided in next week's update.
- 2022 Peach Street Storm Drain Project. Crews finished the underground work and concrete
  work this week on Peach Street and Peach Way. Paving will begin next week, and crews expect
  this project to finish up in the next two weeks. We appreciate everyone's patience while we
  complete this project.
- Pine Street Bridge Reconstruction Project. Originally, this project was scheduled to occur early this year, but engineering/design and obtaining right-of way and easements took longer than anticipated. At this point, the City of Fruita has plans in place to reconstruct the Pine Street Bridge over the Little Salt Wash. The existing two-lane bridge will be replaced with a three-lane bridge including curb and gutters and five-foot wide sidewalks on each side. This reconstructed bridge will provide much-needed safety enhancements to what is currently a constriction to traffic flows on Pine Street. A full road closure of Pine Street north of K.4 Road and south of K.6 Road will start in early October. This road closure is necessary to facilitate the work for the Pine Street Bridge Reconstruction Project. The full road closure is expected to last through May of 2023.

#### **Parks and Recreation**

- July 3<sup>rd</sup> Fireworks. We will be working with Zambelli fireworks for our July 3<sup>rd</sup> fireworks display. Canvas Credit Union, formerly Western Rockies Federal Credit Union has agreed to sponsor the 2022 Fireworks display at Snooks Bottom.
- Snooks Bottom Update. We have had reports of some fish kill at Snooks Bottom. The District Wildlife Manager and Local Fish Biologist confirmed this week that the lake turned over depleting oxygen levels causing fish kill. Colorado Parks and Wildlife will not perform the next stocking of fish in hopes that the spring runoff will help fill the lake with more water.

- **Saturday, May 7**<sup>th</sup> **Basketball Court Closure. On** Saturday, May 7, the Basketball Courts will be closed from 4:30pm-6:00pm for the Dance and Art Showcase.
- *May 9<sup>th</sup> -19<sup>th</sup> Water Aerobics Class update.* All Water Aerobics Classes will be Cancelled for end of year school swim sessions. Please expect increased attendance of school aged children in the pool from 10:00am-3:00pm during this time.
- Bike to work day. Starting at 7 am, on May 4, join city staff for free breakfast at the Civic Center, provided by Family Health West, followed by a ride on city trails to celebrate Grand Valley Bike Month.
- **New Adult Cornhole League!** Games will be on Wednesdays from 5:30pm-6:30pm at the Fruita Community Center Backyard with two divisions (16-59 and 50+). Registration closes on May 15 and the fee is \$40.

#### **Public Works**

- **Building Maintenance Update.** Building Maintenance staff have updated all SDS (safety data sheets) materials for all hazardous chemicals in all City buildings. The crew supervisor and administrative technician sat down with CIRSA to review all safety meeting requirements and are preparing for further inspections for our upcoming annual audit.
- **Fleet Maintenance Update.** Fleet Maintenance staff performed an annual inspection and service of our forklift and performed multiple heavy equipment DOT inspections.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Road Maintenance staff attended the 2-day APWA Annual Street Conference this week. Jesse McClaskey passed his Wastewater Collection I exam and Michael

Bramlett attended a conference for Traffic Control Supervisor training and passed his exam. Congratulations to Jesse and Michael!

- **Utilities Update.** It's week two of irrigation water turning on so staff are still busy turning on water for residents and making City valve repairs. 61 utility locates were completed.
- Wastewater Treatment Update. Wastewater Treatment Staff performed repair work on their Oxidation Ditch Aeration system. The crew also loaded 29 yards of Biosolids.
- Admin Update. Public Works Director participated in a call with the Grand Valley Watershed Plan Update and USGS regarding the E.Coli presentation.
