Monday's City Council Meeting

As a reminder, our regular City Council meeting was rescheduled to Monday, June 20, 2022, because we have a few members of the Council attending the annual Colorado Municipal League Conference next week. On the agenda for the meeting, we do not have any proclamations or presentations scheduled to begin the meeting. The Council will consider ten items on the consent agenda, before moving on to our only public hearing, considering a resolution to opt-out of the Family Medical Leave Insurance program. After that, Finance Director/City Clerk Margaret Sell will provide the Council with a presentation on the 2021 Financial Statements. We will then formally cancel our August 2, 2022, meeting and schedule our strategic planning retreat for the same night. See you on Monday night!

\$964,050 Awarded in Grants this Week!

It paid off to travel in person to present to the Energy & Mineral Impact Committee in Golden recently. This week we received awards in our full requests for two important projects: Broadband Middle-mile & H2S Mitigation Sewer. Staff did an outstanding job writing these grants and we appreciate the Department of Local Affairs for recognizing these projects' importance to the Fruita community. For the *Middle-mile broadband project*, once finish up the last portion of design work for the lateral connection, we can then put the work out to bid later this year to ultimately to complete fiber to the community and allow for open access for last mile (to residents & businesses). For the **H2S Sewer Mitigation Project**, we were awarded \$600,000 from the Department of Local Affairs. This funding, paired with our match, will help the City replace multiple manholes and several miles of sewer lines that have deteriorated to the high presence of H2S Gas.

- **Question**: What is the biosolid program the city's Wastewater Reclamation Facility offers?
- Answer: Biosolids can be used as a low-grade fertilizer or can be added to soil to
 improve the quality of soil on lawns and flower gardens. These biosolids are carefully
 treated and monitored to meet all requirements of the health department. Interested
 Fruita residents can pick up biosolids for free at the Wastewater Reclamation Facility.

General Updates

- Financial Reports. City financial reports for April 2022 are now available and can be found in the council packet for our next meeting. A few highlights from the report in April 2022, City sales tax was 12% higher than April 2021, and is trending at an increase of 6% year-to-date. We also saw increases in use taxes on motor vehicles (up 40% compared to the previous April, up .5% year-to-date), use taxes on building materials (up 62% in April, trending at 51% above 2021), and the County sales tax collections (up 3.5% in April, year to date up 9%) all increased. Lodging tax collections decreased 15% when compared to April of the previous year but is still ahead of 2021 by 3.5%.
- **2023 Budget Preparation.** We are in full swing of budget season with departments combing through long-term plans, operations, 2021 community survey results and performance measures to begin drafting a proposed priority based 2023 annual operating budget.
- Discover Fruita Radio Show Premiers Next Week! The City of Fruita is now hosting a monthly radio show that will take you behind the scenes and highlight what is going on in our community. Our first episode is next Tuesday, June 21, at 12:00 p.m. on KAFM 88.1. If you miss it, we will be posting links of each episode in a podcast format after the shows. We look forward to discussing our community and hearing from residents about what they love about Fruita!
- Grand Mesa, Uncompaghre and Gunnison National Forest (GMUG) Implements Stage 1 Fire Restrictions. At 12:01 a.m. Friday, June 17, 2022, Stage 1 Fire Restrictions were implemented on the Uncompanding and Gunnison National Forests and the Fruita Division of the Grand Mesa National Forest. Police Department

• Junior Citizen Police Academy. The Fruita Police Department is bringing back the Junior Citizen Police Academy! This program is for 12-17 year olds interested in learning about what it's like to be a Police Officer. Students will learn about DUI detection and enforcement, crime scene investigation, and the importance of community involvement. This is a great opportunity for youths and officers to build a stronger relationship with each other. Public Works

- **Building Maintenance Update.** Building Maintenance staff corrected all CIRSA safety issues concerning electrical and roofing.
- Fleet Maintenance Update. Fleet Maintenance staff worked on a mower blade replacement belt for one of the Parks Department's mowers. They fabricated a convenient sign and tool holder for our Traffic Safety department. The asphalt roller's radiator has been shipped out for repair and they're also beginning the process of a hopper liner replacement for the street sweeper, for Road Maintenance.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** All City dirt roads were treated with Earthbind, a dust control application, last week. The crew is beginning asphalt patching this week.
- *Utilities Update.* Utilities staff performed maintenance on the Vactor truck. They hauled grease from the I-70 lift station, responded to 8 citizen irrigation calls and completed 26 utility locates.
- Wastewater Collections Update. Wastewater Collections staff have installed a new ditch pump. They have also been replacing multiple pop-up sprinkler nozzles and filters. The crew has also greased all HVAC unit's blower motor and shaft bearings.
- **Admin Update.** In preparation for 2023 budget staff reviewed the capital equipment replacement fund information and capital project lists.


