Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting begins with two proclamations recognizing Juneteenth and Pride Month, followed by a presentation on Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL) appeal process by Carrie Gudorf with Mesa County. Following the consent agenda, there is a quasi-judicial hearing for the liquor license at the Riverfront Concert series and then administrative updates on capital projects and pending grant requests and the City's sewer plan. Mike the Headless Chicken Festival This Weekend!

The Mike the Headless Chicken Festival returns this weekend to downtown Fruita! A full schedule of events can be found at the festival's new website here. Head downtown for games, vendors, live music, the Wheels West Colorado Exhibition Car Show, the Run/Walk 5k, and more. Please note that due to the festival, there are a few traffic impacts in downtown Fruita throughout the weekend. Beginning today, Friday June 3, 2022, the Civic Center Parking lot, as well as Elm Street and Peach Street (between the Civic Center and Aspen Avenue) will be closed. Additionally, Aspen Avenue will be closed (between Peach and Elm) for the festival. We hope to see you there, Fruita!

City of Fruita Awarded Revitalizing Main Streets Grant for S. Mesa Street Improvements

This week, it was announced that the City of Fruita was awarded a \$1.7 million grant from the Colorado Dept. Of Transportation (CDOT) Revitalizing Main Streets program, for improvements to S. Mesa Street (from Circle Park to Hwy 6 &50). This project is the second phase of our Fruita Civic Center Memorial Park and Downtown Streetscape Improvements Plan and will increase safety along S. Mesa Street. Improvements include converting on-street parallel parking to diagonal parking to increase the number of spots, consolidating some of the access drives, constructing a continuous sidewalk, adding planting islands to enhance the street scape, and replacing approximately 600 feet of sewer line. We are excited to partner with CDOT

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on these much-needed safety improvements and thank them for their continued partnership with the City of Fruita. More information can be found <u>here.</u>

Fruita Adopt a Street/Trail Program

The City of Fruita, via the Fruita Livability Commission, has created an Adopt a Street/Trail program for our community. The program allows local families, businesses, and community groups to perform a valuable community service by adopting a section of a Fruita street or trail to keep clear of litter and debris. We hope that the program will help beautify the City, encourage greater participation in the City affairs, and foster civic pride. A list of 15 trails and roads that can be adopted has been created, and if you are interested in participating, more information can be found on our website here.

N. Mulberry Street Community Engagement Outcomes

Between April and May of 2022, the City of Fruita engaged with the community on whether or not the space on N. Mulberry Street should be a permanent plaza with new amenities. The community had the opportunity to provide feedback through an online survey and in-person at the Fat Tire Festival. There were over 1,200 responses to the online survey and over 125 participants at the Fat Ture Festival. In addition, the City of Fruita held meetings and met with businesses one on one to collect input from stakeholders. Street Repaying Project (Continued)

Last Thursday, June 2, the City began the 2022 road overlay/paving project. The community can expect to see road repaving on the streets listed below. Partial road closures occurred yesterday, June 2, and today, June 3 while full road closures will occur on June 12 and 13. In between these dates, roads will be fully open, but users can expect the roads to be bumpy. The following streets will be affected: W. Ottley Ave. From Highway 6 to the Co-Op Country Entrance; Mesa St. From Ottley Ave. to the north end of the bridge on Ottley Ave.; Cherry St. to Mesa St.; and Pabor Ave. from Coulson St. to Cherry St. Project timelines may change depending on the weather. - City of Fruita's response to the Mesa County Land Use Code Text Amendment/Ordinance for Licensing and Regulation of Marijuana Businesses in unincorporated Mesa County. Below is the letter we sent to the Mesa County Commissioners on the Land Use Code Text Amendment for the Ordinance for Licensing and Regulation of Marijuana in unincorporated Mesa County. We are requesting that the Mesa County Commissions exclude marijuana cultivation, manufacturing, production, and testing within the AFT zoned parcels with in the Fruita Urban Development Boundary/201-10.

The Fruita City Council is requesting the Mesa County Commissioners exclude marijuana cultivation, manufacturing, production, and testing within AFT zoned parcels in Fruita's Urban Development Boundary/201-10.

The City of Fruita and Mesa County have a rich, longstanding history of cooperation in long-range planning efforts for the benefits of Mesa County residents. The Mesa County Land Development Code Table 7-1: AFT Density stated purpose reads:

"In order to provide more certainty regarding appropriate levels of development on land within the Rural Planning Area, the County has adopted the provisions of this section to govern density in the AFT Zoning District."

Table 7-1: AFT Density recognizes the future land use classification of Fruita's Urban Development Boundary/201-10 as likely to urbanize within the City of Fruita. The City has conducted several long-range planning efforts led by the community. In fact, the recent update to the City's Comprehensive Plan, which reviews and establishes the future land use map and is a process that the City engaged Mesa County in, over 4,000 Fruita and County residents engaged during a year-long process. Subsequent master plans have since been updated to reflect these values, priorities, and future land uses. Fruita's Urban Development Boundary/201-10 encompasses a significant land mass of existing County AFT zoning with the future land use designation of Community Residential. In the proposed ordinance and text amendment, Mesa County excludes residential zone districts from cultivation, manufacturing, processing, and testing; whereas the City of Fruita's future residential areas have not received the same consideration.

Mesa County's proposed ordinance and text amendment will result in a less predictable development pattern by negatively impacting large financial investments in sewer and street infrastructure and create more probability of leapfrog development. In this scenario developers and builders will be solely responsible for the extension of infrastructure along the frontage of cultivation, manufacturing, processing, and testing sites.

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The Mesa County 2021 Ballot Question 1C read,

"Shall Mesa County permit optional premises cultivation operations licenses to allow marijuana cultivation, manufacturing, and testing facilities within unincorporated areas of Mesa County, Colorado?"

The above ballot language does not contemplate the zoning will be specific to the AFT. The ballot language merely posed the question of whether cultivation, processing, manufacturing, and testing should be allowed in the unincorporated areas within Mesa County. It seems reasonable to assume voters were expecting the regulating agency "Mesa County" to determine if there were specific areas to allow this within the unincorporated area as evidenced by the current process.

The City of Fruita strongly urges Mesa County to consider the long-term planning, financial decisions, and community engagement that has resulted in decades of planned residential development within Fruita's Urban Development Boundary/201-10. In the County's Land Development Code precedent has already been set to handle land use decisions differently in the 201-10 than the rest of AFT.

The Fruita City Council requests the Mesa County Commissioners exclude marijuana cultivation, manufacturing, production, and testing within AFT zoned parcels in Fruita's Urban Development Boundary/201-10. In the event exclusion is not considered, the Fruita City Council requests a continuance to better understand the future implications of this land use decision.
