Tuesday's City Council Meeting

The meeting begins with a mini-town hall with Mesa County Commissioners. The town hall will consist of a brief presentation by the commissioners, questions of the commissioners from council members and discussion and comments from the public. We will devote approximately no more than 30 minutes to this town hall. Next will be the consent agenda and five quasi-judicial public hearings related to zoning and annexations and a liquor license renewal, ending with the City Manager's informal review. Waste Management Update

Earlier this month, Waste Management announced the roll out of a new program for automated trash collection in certain areas of the city. This change improves safety for Waste Management personnel, helps improve cleanliness in Fruita, and reduces litter in the environment. Residents who are a part of the program will receive a 96-gallon cart next week (week of August 15, 2022) on your regular trash pickup day. Originally, residents impacted by the change could only use the 96-gallon carts provided by Waste Management. We realize this change is significant for our community and have been working with Waste Management to resolve the issues we've heard from residents. **Now, as part of the program, if a household has more trash than can fit in the 96-gallon cart, additional trash containers may be placed on the curb (loose trash bags or plastic bags are not a container).** We apologize for the confusion and the frustration this has caused and we hope these changes will help ease this transition.

2022 Sidewalk Replacement Project (Continued)

The 2022 Sidewalk Replacement Project is scheduled to begin this Fall and conclude in December of this year. The focus of this year's project will be in the Village at Country Creek and Heritage Meadows subdivisions, with various other, smaller locations around the city. Areas of damaged concrete sidewalk, curb, gutter, and curb ramp will be removed and replaced according to City code. We will work to keep disruption to the public as limited as possible but please be aware that there will be

Weekly FAQ


In every weekly update, we will be answering one question we get asked often from the community. These questions will cover a variety of topics from all city departments. If you have any questions, you think would be valuable for us to share, let us know by emailing communications@fruita.org.

- **Question:** Can I have an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) on my property?
- **Answer:** There are multiple variables to review to determine if a property can have an accessory dwelling unit (ADU). The first variable to be considered is what zoning area the property falls under. Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) are permitted on property with a single-family detached house in the following zones: Rural Estate (RE), Large Lot Residential (LLP), Community Residential (CR), South Fruita Residential (SFR), Monument Preservation (MP), Neighborhood Commercial Overlay, Downtown Mixed Use (DMU), and Commercial-1 (C-1). If you don't know what zoning district your property is located in, take a look at the City's GIS Map [here](#). In the map's "Layer List," make sure the "Existing Zoning District" option is selected. In addition to meeting zoning requirements, an ADU must meet setback requirements, height requirements, and lot coverage requirements. Property owners looking to have an ADU need to know where easements are on the property and follow HOA guidelines if in a neighborhood with an HOA. General Updates

- **Financial Reports.** The Financial Reports for June 2022 can be found in this week's Council packet. Quick overview of sales tax collections in June, when compared to the previous year, City sales tax was up 12% and is trending at a 7% increase for the year. Use tax on building materials (up 13% in June, trending at 48% increase of 2021), the City lodging tax (up 4% in June, trending at an increase of 14% year-to-date), and County sales tax collections (up 8% in June 2022, at an increase of 9% when compared to 2021) were also up and trending higher than 2021. Use tax on motor vehicle was down 13% in June, but is still at an increase of 10% through June year over year.
- **Radio Show about Wayfinding and Livability Commission Tuesday, August 16 at 12 pm.** The Discover Fruita will be having its next episode live next Tuesday, August 16 at 12 pm. Tune in to KAFM 88.1 to learn about wayfinding, adopt a street/trail program, and livability commission.

- **Monthly Waste Management Report.** In July, Fruita residents recycled 46 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard. Great job Fruita! The full report from Waste Management can be found below.
- **Mesa County Safe Routes Mobile App.** This week, Mobile Mesa County launched the Mesa County Safe Routes app for families to find the safest routes to school. The app also has recommended paths and sidewalks, safety tips, and fun games to increase healthy habits. The app can be downloaded on the App Store and Google Play store.

Public Works

- **Building Maintenance Update.** Building Maintenance staff have been working on fixing up the Chamber of Commerce Building owned by the city with a gutter repair, and building reseal. They also replaced bay door seals in the fleet shop. A crew member also assisted the City of Grand Junction with a paving project. For the Police Department kennels for runaway dogs, staff installed a watering misting system to keep them nice and cool while waiting for their family.
- **Fleet Maintenance Update.** Fleet staff performed multiple services and repairs on Parks, Public Works, Police and Civic Center Admin vehicles such as replacing shocks, a fuel pump, a drive belt, tires, an axle boot, a battery, trailer plugs, and flat tire repair. They also scheduled two vehicles to be sent in to take care of recall notices.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Road Maintenance staff fixed the Welcome to Fruita sign on I-70 and installed a new safe route sign for the 8/9 school. They also laid down some new thermal plastic crosswalks near Circle Park. Staff also assisted Grand Junction with a paving project for Grand Junction at 23 Rd and G Rd.
- **Utilities Update.** The Utilities crew jetted all sewer lines around the schools. Close circuit television (CCTV) inspections were performed on new tap installations around the city. Dam inspections were completed with the State of Colorado dam safety engineer for our reservoirs on Glade Park.
- **Wastewater Treatment Update.** Wastewater Treatment staff had to troubleshoot their supervisory control and data requisition (SCADA) software that was not communicating but the issue was resolved. Routine maintenance was performed on equipment. Monthly metals were sent to Seacrest Lab for analysis. Gas monitors passed their monthly calibration. Staff are currently experimenting to reduce poly usage running the RDTs, current is 8-10 lbs. per ton and 7-9 lbs per ton is the goal.

Avoided 126 Metric Tons (MTCO₂E) of GHG Emissions

This GHG reduction is equivalent to removing annual emissions from 27 passenger vehicles!

225,080 Gallons of Water

Represents enough saved water to meet the daily fresh water needs of 3,001 people!
