Tuesday's City Council Workshop

Our meeting on Tuesday will begin with a brief Executive Session (6:30-6:45 p.m.) to follow up on one of our discussion items from the retreat. After that, we have two items on the Workshop agenda, and those are discussions on building inspections and an overview of recent legislation passed regarding plastic bags. See you on Tuesday!

Irrigation and Rain

After this week's rainfall, residents may have noticed an excessive amount of mud in their irrigation systems. This can happen when it rains in the high country where there are burn scars caused by wildfires. Without trees and shrubs in these burn areas, there is no vegetation to catch the silt, therefore, running into the Colorado River which supplies Fruita's irrigation canals. When this happens, irrigation water will be muddy until the silt settles. Unfortunately, with the amount of mud traveling into irrigation systems, you will find that your filters clog easily. We highly recommend waiting until the mud settles or you will find yourself constantly cleaning out your filters.

Road Patching Near Mica Drive and Jasper Drive Monday Morning

On Monday, August 22nd from 6:00 a.m. - 2:30 p.m., the intersection between Mica Drive and Jasper Drive will have narrow lanes as crews will perform patch work in this area.

Heritage Park Restrooms Closed

The restrooms at Heritage Park are currently closed for repair. Crews hope to have the restrooms open in the afternoon on Monday, August 22nd.

Waste Management Update (Continued)

Earlier this month, Waste Management announced the roll out of a new program for automated trash collection in certain areas of the city. This change improves safety for Waste Management personnel, helps improve cleanliness in Fruita, and reduces litter in the environment. Residents who are a part of the program received a 96-gallon cart this week (week of August 15, 2022) during their regular trash pickup day. Included with the cart, residents received a flyer answering frequently asked questions from Waste Management (Click here to read about the frequently asked questions). Originally, residents impacted by the change could only use the 96-gallon carts provided by Waste Management. We realize this change is significant for our community and have been working with Waste Management to resolve the issues we've heard from residents. Now, as part of the program, if a household has more trash than can fit in the 96-gallon cart, additional trash containers may be placed on the curb (loose trash bags or plastic bags are not a container). We apologize for the confusion and the frustration this has caused and we hope these changes will help ease this transition.

Weekly FAQ

- Question: Why doesn't Fruita have a Fall/Spring Clean-Up Program?
- Answer: Due to the small population size of Fruita, and to save costs for residents, the city's trash services are contracted out to a private company instead of being as a municipal program. In the past, the City of Fruita has evaluated the costs of providing a spring and/or fall clean-up for residents like the program in Grand Junction (where residents can leave an unlimited amount of trash on the curbs to be collected, with exception of certain items), but the cost from the contracted provider was too prohibitive at the time. Since the City's trash fund is fully funded through user fees, this additional cost would have to be passed on to residents in significantly increased monthly fees, and the City decided against that. To help with spring trash collection, however, the City last year started hosting clean-up events at the City Shop building, which is advertised on the city's website, social media, and here in the Weekly Update. This year, Fruita residents filled up two 30-yard dumpsters as part of the program, and it is scheduled to continue next year. We will, however, continue to look into options to bring a fully operational spring and fall clean-up to Fruita and will share widely if this service becomes available.

General Updates

- **Engagement Event at Wave.** This Tuesday, City Councilor Jeannine Purser and I engaged with community members at Wave Drinks. We discussed current and future development projects, plans for the expansion of Fruita roads, and growth in Downtown Fruita. We always start the event with questions from the community which guides the conversation for the event. These events are a fantastic way to answer questions from the community in a casual setting.
- **Partner Engagements.** This week I was able to meet individually with the new directors of the Grand Junction Economic Partnership, the Mesa County Enterprize Zone and the GJ Small Business Development Center to discuss shared values and priorities.

- Reed Park Project Not Selected to Move Forward in GOCO Grant Process. Last month, we
 applied for the second time this year for the Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) Resilient
 Communities Grant for the improvements to Reed Park. We learned this week that we were
 not invited to move forward in the process. Because of that, staff and I are evaluating
 alternative funding options for the improvements.
- Discover Fruita Radio Show. This week, Livability Commission members Michael Handley and Dave Karisny, and Assistant to the City Manager Shannon Vassen, joined the Discover Fruita Radio Show to discuss the City's recent wayfinding project, the Adopt a Street/Trail program, and the Livability Commission. - **Brief Closure of Highway 340.** On Wednesday, there was a brief closure of Highway 340 at Redcliffs Drive due to a reported gas leak. Crews from Xcel Energy and the City responded to the issue quickly, and Highway 340 was reopened in the afternoon.

delayed by one week due to a change in the scope of the project. The new bid date is Friday,
August 26, 2022.

Public Works

- Building Maintenance Update. The Building Maintenance Division repaired a gutter for the
 Chamber of Commerce, completed a door repair for the Parks Division, and a plumbing repair
 for the Civic Center. The crew also called Grand Mesa Mechanical to repair an HVAC unit at the
 Police Department.
- **Fleet Maintenance Update.** The Fleet Maintenance Division serviced vehicles for the Police Department this week. They also replaced idler and tensioner pulleys on a dump truck and made modifications to two dump truck tailgates for the Public Works Department. The crew also replaced a mower belt for the Parks Division.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** We want to thank Treyvon Mclean, our seasonal employee, for all of his hard work and dedication this summer. He will be missed but we are happy for him and

- his new adventure in joining the Navy! This week, the Road Maintenance Division completed three patches on McCune Ave., one on W. Meadow Ave, and one on David Ct.
- **Utilities Update.** Dam inspections for Reservoirs #1, #2, #3 were completed in coordination with Colorado Dam Safety Engineers. On Monday, the crew performed an emergency repair to the Encanto irrigation system that affected a large section of the city. Multiple lift stations and irrigation calls were responded to, and the division jetted over 2,000 feet of sewer line.
- Wastewater Treatment Update. Construction Management at Risk (CMAR) and Tetra Tech will do a site walkthrough on Monday, August 22nd. This past Tuesday, August 16th, the Wastewater Reclamation Facility Director met with Browns Hill about their SCADA instrumentation proposal. The Wastewater Treatment Plant is shifting from summer sewage flows to a school schedule type flow which is reaching about one million gallons per day. One ditch is designed for 1.165 millions of gallons per day (MGD) which means we are hitting 85% of the design and nearing the use of our second ditch. This week, SoilTek picked up 12 yards of biosolids from the plant, clearing the plant's pad of all biosolid inventory. In addition, the semi-annual metal samples have been shipped out for testing, a new Rotork valve arrived at the plant, and the division performed a minor repair on the grit pump belt guard. After housekeeping, the division made a trip to the Hazardous Waste Facility for recycling.
