Tuesday's City Council Workshop & Special Meeting

Please remember Tuesday night we begin earlier at 6:15 to hold a special meeting for a special event liquor license hearing for the CO2UT race event. The following workshop is a full agenda with updates and discussions on the following items: (1) the Draft 2022 –2025 Strategic Plan, (2) the 2023 Draft Annual Budget and Budget Process, (3) the Draft Code of Ethics, (4) the Drafts of the Norms of Conduct & Rules of Procedure, and (5) a review of the Council Candidate applications and details for the interviews on Oct. 10. Fruita Community Center Maintenance Week

The annual maintenance week for the Fruita Community Center will be held from Monday, October 10- Sunday, October 16. In addition, the indoor pool will be closed from October 5 – October 16 for crews to install a new filter system. The full facility (excluding the Fruita Branch of the Mesa County Library) will be closed during this time for maintenance, repairs, and cleaning. If you have questions or need to register for an activity, please call our front desk throughout this time. Regular facility hours will resume Monday, October 17.

Pine Street Bridge Road Closure Begins Monday, October 3

A full road closure of Pine Street north of K.4 Road and south of K.6 Road is scheduled to begin on October 3, 2022. This road closure will facilitate the utility relocation work during October in support of the Pine Street Bridge Reconstruction Project at the Little Salt Wash bridge crossing. GA Western is scheduled to begin work on the bridge reconstruction on October 31, 2022. The full road closure is expected to last through June of 2023. The City of Fruita Engineering Department

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requests that all citizens respect the full road closure as hazardous conditions may exist within the construction area and will be intermittent during the utility relocation portion of the project.

Bike Park Construction Began on September 19, 2022 (Continued)

September 19, 2022, the Fruita Bike Park closed to the public for renovations, and it is anticipated that renovations will complete at the end of October. The trail building team from Singletrack Trails will start the process of updating and adding new features to the park. Given the amount of use, there has been wear to some of the features as well as erosion from weather. To keep the park in a desired condition, reworking some of the elements is required. The project will provide a more durable and longer-lasting set of features and make it more attractive to the users of the bike park. We ask the community to please respect the closure so crews can work safely and efficiently to get the construction done and the bike park back open to the public. We are excited to see this project begin!

Weekly FAQ

In every weekly update, we will be answering one question we get asked often from the community. These questions will cover a variety of topics from all city departments. - Question: When does City irrigation turn off for the season?
- **Answer**: Typically, City irrigation water turns off mid to late October. This date range could change based on predictions for extreme cold weather.

General Updates

- Monthly Financial Reports. The July 2022 Financial Reports were approved at this week's City Council meeting. A few quick highlights from the reports, in July 2022, City sales tax was 8.5% compared to previous year, and year-to-date, is trending at an increase of 7%. County sales tax collections were up 7% in July and are trending at an increase of 9%. The County public safety tax also increased when compared to the previous year, 6% in July, and is trending at an 8% increase over 2022. Use taxes on motor vehicle (decrease of 19% in July, trending at an increase of 5% year-to-date), building materials (decrease of 21% when compared to July 2022, still trending at an increase of 39% year-to-date), and the City's lodging tax (down 26% in July, at 6% increase overall) were all down in July. - **Remembering Dick Pippenger.** We are very sad to hear that Dick Pippenger passed away this week. We want to share our condolences to his family and everyone at the Lower Valley Fire Department. Dick spent over 21 years with the Lower Valley Fire District, and our staff worked with him often on a number of projects during his time as Fire Marshall. Dick was a great Fire Marshall, and he will be missed.
- ICMA Annual Conference. Assistant to the City Manager and I attended the annual International City/County Manager's Association conference Saturday – Tuesday. The conference was full of great keynote addresses, pertinent sessions on our current efforts, leadership and much time to network with colleagues in many other cities to share best practices to shared challenges cities are facing.

- **Colorado Tourism Conference.** Communications & Engagement Specialist Ciara DePinto represented the City at the Governor's Tourism Conference this week.
- *Monthly Waste Management Report.* In August 2022, Fruita residents recycled 56 tons of bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard (10 more tons than July). Good job Fruita! The full report can be found below.
- **City Manager Engagement Event.** I appreciate the engaged group we had in Circle Park and the delicious cupcakes from Sweet & Simple Cupcakery across the street. Join Planning & Development Director Dan Caris and I next Thursday (Sept. 29) at 9am for a walk about downtown to discuss the many projects underway.



• **Guest Speaker at Shelledy Elementary.** Mayor Kincaid and I enjoyed the vibrant third graders at Shelledy Elementary as we discussed the form of government and services provided by the City of Fruita.

- *Highway 340 Trail.* Two proposals were received for the Highway 340 Trail connection. The Engineering Department is currently reviewing these proposals.
- **Pine Street Bridge Pre-Construction Meeting.** This week, the Engineering Department hosted the pre-construction meeting for the Pine Street Bridge project starting on Monday, October 3.

- *Fruita Community Center Pool closed October 5-16.* The Pool will be receiving a new filter to help improve efficiency in our facility. During this time, the pool will also receive its annual maintenance and repair. The pool will reopen on Monday, October 17.
- **Registration for Youth Girls Basketball.** Grades 3rd-6th can join this interleague youth basketball. Practices will begin the week of October 17 with games starting week of November 5.

Public Safety

• **Professional Development.** Several police department members had the opportunity to attend professional development training recently. One officer attended Crisis Intervention Teams training learning how to recognize and communicate with individuals in crisis, and refer to appropriate resources. Lt. Peck attended executive leadership training at the FBI Rocky Mountain Command College. Chief Krouse attended the Level Up Conference learning more about mental and physical health for first responders.

Public Works

- **Building Maintenance Update.** Staff repaired plumbing and doors at the Civic Center. Peterson Masonry completed the chimney repair for the Civic Center.
- *Fleet Maintenance Update.* New cutting edges were installed on the loader bucket and tires on the Wastewater skid steer. The windshield and a door panel were repaired on a police vehicle. Fuel filters were replaced on a generator and multiple other services were performed.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** Staff patched asphalt on Fremont St., replaced signage and completed Bike Park dirt work.
- **Utilities Update.** Staff took a trip up to the reservoirs on Glade Park, took water readings and started to work on dams. The IIG lift station experienced PLC (programmable logic controller, a computer control system) and power supply failure, Browns Hill Engineering assisted in wiring troubleshooting. 34 utility locates were performed.
- *Admin. Update.* Public Works Director presented a grant presentation to the Mesa County Federal Mineral Lease District requesting funds for (2) variable message signs. Staff met with

Hensel Phelps representatives and initiated a task order for preconstruction services for the H2S Mitigation Project.

273,287 Gallons of Water
