Tuesday's City Council Meeting

We will kick off our meeting on Tuesday with two presentations, the first from the Fruita Arts and Culture Board for the "Art on the Corner" project, and the second is the annual update on the Fruita Chamber of Commerce from Chamber staff. After the presentations, the City Council will consider several items on the consent agenda and then move on to public hearings. We have two public hearings on the agenda, a Supplemental Budget Amendment to the 2022 Budget, and then the first reading of the 2023 Budget. As part of the first reading, staff will provide a presentation on the Budget Overview and the Economic Health and Development highlights from the budget. We will conclude our meeting with scheduling my upcoming review.

Arts & Culture Roundabout Project Ceremony

On Tuesday night, the Fruita Arts and Culture Board had a ceremony for the completion of the informational signage for the roundabout project at the Fruita Visitor Center. The board raised money to design, purchase, and install the signs. A special recognition plaque was presented to Bill Holstein for his support of the Fruita Arts and Culture Board. Snowstorm Tree Limb Drop Off Closes Today

Last Friday, Fruita Parks and Public Works utilized the Little Salt Wash overflow parking lot to collect fallen tree limbs from last week's snowstorm. The location was also open for the community to drop off fallen trees from their property. Today will be the last day to drop off fallen tree limbs. The drop off location will close at 5:00 p.m. today.

Trail Closure at the Little Salt Wash Trail under I-70 Starting November 14, 2022 (Continued)

Starting on Monday, November 14, 2022, the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) will be closing a section of the Little Salt Wash Trail under I-70 to perform structural maintenance. With the Little Salt Wash stream running near the I-70 bridge, fast-moving water can remove sediment from around the bridge abutments. When this happens, the structure can be compromised and affect the structural integrity. There are scour holes at both the Little Salt Wash and Big Salt Wash bridges for I-70. So, CDOT will be making repairs to both crossings which will result in a closure of the Lower Little Salt Wash Trail.

CDOT anticipates the closure to last through the winter. Access from the north to the Kokopelli section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail will remain open. CDOT will be sharing more information about the project and detour route next week on the project website - https://www.codot.gov/projects/i70-salt-wash-bridge-scour. CDOT is handling the notice on the trail to users and we have been following up with them to get the physical notice on the trails. A map of the 1.75 mile detour route can be found below.

- Question: Does the City of Fruita plow the streets after a snowfall?
- Answer: Yes! You can expect to see City crews out plowing the main roads throughout Fruita during and after snowstorms. When City crews are out plowing, please treat the vehicles the same way you would an emergency vehicle. Crews use extreme caution at streetlights and stop signs, but if there is no traffic in the area, they will proceed forward. Please never pass a snowplow and if you come across a snowplow, please give them the right of way.

General Updates

- First Reading of 2023 Budget. The first reading of the 2023 City of Fruita Municipal Budget will
 happen during the regular City Council Meeting on Tuesday, November 15, 2022. If you are

 with the Engineering Department on surveying land in preparation for the installation of fencing
 for the dog park. They showed me how they collect spatial information about the land to help
 choose the best design concepts for the project. As usual, I was completely impressed by their
 expertise and dedication to the work.

Police Department

Law Enforcement Records Personnel Week. This week was Law Enforcement Records Personnel
Week. We are thankful for our wonderful records staff who support us and keep the office
going.

Public Works

- Building Maintenance Update. The Civic Center second floor is going through shuffling of rooms. The Heritage Room moved to the old Rotary Room and the Rotary Room moved to the old Independence Room so that FWorks can expand their space where the Heritage Room was, which adjoins FWorks. We appreciate the cooperation of each group and the help of Building Maintenance and the Road Crew with the moves.
- **Fleet Maintenance Update.** The sprocket for the pump coupler and keyway were replaced on the Vactor. Two dump trucks were worked on, one for plow wiring and one for erratic engine oil pressure. The monthly forklift inspection was completed. Temperature sensors and wiring were replaced on the crack sealer.
- **Road Maintenance Update.** The crew continued to haul dirt for the Bike Park. The dirt road on the East side of Rim Rock Elementary was bladed and a road base was added. They also aided in shuffling the Heritage and Rotary Room at the Civic Center.
- *Utilities Update.* The I-70 Lift Station foul air fan was rewired, and connectors were replaced. The IIG Lift Station force main was cleaned, and priming sensors were replaced. After the snowstorm, the crew spent a lot of time cutting and hauling tree limbs off.
- Wastewater Treatment Update. Influent pump #2 was greased and pump #3 was cycled to primary. The ATAD (Autothermal Thermophilic Aerobic Digestion) motive was greased and transferred pump #1 motors. They flushed and swapped the solids processing feed and dosing pumps. Monthly cleaning and calibration checks on process instrumentation probes were performed. Oil heaters for ditch mixers were turned on.
