# City offices will be closed next Thursday and Friday, November 24<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup>, for Thanksgiving.

We hope that you have a great Thanksgiving, Fruita! The Fruita Community Center will be closed on Thursday but open on Friday from 5:30 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. (no water aerobics or fitness classes on Friday), and trash and recycling scheduled for next Thursday will be delayed until Friday.

### **Community Meeting for Skate/Wheel Park Design**

Join us on Tuesday, November 29 from 6:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. at the Fruita Civic Center to provide input and ideas on the conceptual design of a future skate/wheel park at Reed Park. After the meeting, the City of Fruita and Design Workshop will utilize the input received to create different design variations. The community will then have the opportunity to review the design options and provide more feedback. In 2020, the City of Fruita completed the PHROST Master Plan to understand community needs when it comes to parks and recreation services. Based on the Master Plan, Reed Park was identified as a prime location for a skate/wheel park in Fruita. Learn more about the project here.

## Trail Closure at the Little Salt Wash Trail under I-70 Starting November 14, 2022 (Continued)

On Monday, November 14, 2022, the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) began closing a section of the Little Salt Wash Trail under I-70 to perform structural maintenance. With the Little Salt Wash stream running near the I-70 bridge, fast-moving water can remove sediment from around the bridge abutments. When this happens, the structure can be compromised and affect the structural integrity. There

are scour holes at both the Little Salt Wash and Big Salt Wash bridges for I-70. So, CDOT will be making repairs to both crossings which will result in a closure of the Lower Little Salt Wash Trail.

CDOT anticipates the closure to last through the winter. Access from the north to the Kokopelli section of the Colorado Riverfront Trail will remain open. CDOT will be sharing more information about the project and detour route next week on the project website - <a href="https://www.codot.gov/projects/i70-salt-wash-bridge-scour">https://www.codot.gov/projects/i70-salt-wash-bridge-scour</a>. CDOT is handling the notice on the trail to users and we have been following up with them to get the physical notice on the trails. A map of the 1.75-mile detour route can be found below.

#### Weekly FAQ

In every weekly update, we will be answering one question we get asked often from the community. These questions will cover a variety of topics from all city departments. If you have any questions, you think would be valuable for us to share, let us know by emailing communications@fruita.org.

- Question: How many lights go into the holiday displays around downtown Fruita and how long does it typically take to put them all up?
- Answer: Each year, our Parks Crews start hanging up holiday lights the last week in October and typically finish up in mid-November. The lights are on display from Circle Park, down Aspen Avenue, to the Fruita Civic Center. There are over 700 strands of lights or 70,000 bulbs that light the streets of Fruita each year! We appreciate the hard work the team puts into making this a yearly tradition for the Fruita community.

#### **General Updates**

- Financial Reports. The Financial Reports for September 2022 were included in the packet for our last Council meeting, and can be found <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>. Quick overview of the report, when compared to September of 2021, City sales tax collections were up 8%, and are trending at an increase of 9% for the year. The County sales tax (up 8% over the previous September, trending up 10%), Use taxes on building materials (up 103% in September, up 46% year-to-date), and Use taxes on motor vehicles (up 28% in September, 1% year-to-date) were all also up. The City's 3% lodging tax was down 5% in September but is still at about a 1% increase for the year overall.
- Discover Fruita. Another episode of Fruita's radio show, Discover Fruita, aired on Tuesday. This
  episode covered information on the holiday lights and the work the parks team puts into the
  displays. Lieutenant Nick and Sergeant John talked about safety tips during the holiday season
  including the Police Department's Porch Pirate Program where Fruita residents can have their
  packages shipped to the Police Department to help prevent theft. The episode will be available

- **Senior Potluck.** On Thursday, staff and I had the opportunity of serving food at the Senior Thanksgiving Potluck. The Senior Program is run through the Parks and Recreation Department and hosts a potluck every other Thursday at the Fruita Community Center. It was amazing to see how involved the community is in the Senior Program. We loved helping out and getting the chance to meet and mingle with this great group of individuals.



• Clean-Up Event with Livability Commission. On Thursday afternoon, I joined the Livability Commission for their first Adopt a Trail Clean Up Event of the Co. Riverfront Trail from Kokopelli Blvd to South 18 Road. We had a great turnout for the event, and the clean-up efforts only took about a half an hour. Fortunately, there isn't a lot of trash on that section of the trail! Thank you to the Livability Commission for letting me join the event, and the new Adopt a Street/Trail program has been a great addition to the community.



#### **Engineering**

• **Pine Street Bridge Update.** The Pine Street Bridge Reconstruction Project has entered the bridge demolition phase. All utilities that required relocation have completed their work and GA Western has mobilized to the site and is actively working on the existing bridge demolition. The safety guardrails and fencing have been removed from the bridge. The City of Fruita wants to ensure the safety of all residents and the construction crew working on the bridge demolition and kindly requests that all residents respect the road closure. This road closure pertains to all modalities; including vehicular, bicyclists, and pedestrians. Thank you for your consideration.

• Important Fruita Community Center Billing Information. With the recent software update, customer Credit Card information did not transfer over because of security encryption. We

#### **Police Department**

• Calls for Service Statistics. Grand Junction Regional Communications Center data shows the Fruita Police Department responded to 949 calls for service in October 2022, compared to 743 in October 2021, accounting for a 28% increase. Year to date, the Fruita Police Department has responded to a total of 7,243 calls for service in 2022, compared to 7,348 in 2021, resulting in a total 1% decrease year to date.

#### **Public Works**

- **Update on TMDL (Total Maximum Daily Load).** USGS presented the e.coli study results/load analysis for TMDL's to the MS4 Stakeholder Group and discussed the potential to increase sampling and the number of sites.
